## BORDEN GOVERNMENT WANTS U.S. IMMIGRANTS

The following is an extract from the Hansard report of a debate on American immigration which took place in the House of Commons a few days ago:

Mr. Turriff—I wish to put a question to the minister of the interior. It is generally reported through the American press that the present government is opposed to American immigrants coming into Canada, and that report has been circulated in a manner to do a great deal of harm to Canadian interests.

Mr. Speaker—Order. The hon. member is quite out of order in trying to discuss a question like that at this stage, or to place before the House any subject that may be of controversial character, and which may lead to discussion.

Mr. Turriff—I shall not transgress any further, but I think I am entitled to ask a question, and I want to ask whether the government is opposed to immigrants coming in from the United States. I could have put the matter a great deal plainer, if I had been allowed to explain it a little.

Mr. Speaker—Order. This is a very important question and in case it might be misunderstood, I hope I will be allowed to answer the question put by my hon. friend (Mr. Turriff). I may say in the first place that I regret to learn from him that the American newspapers have given expression to the statement that this government is opposed to American immigrants coming into Canada. We want to get as many settlers from the United States as we can, believing as we do, Mr. Speaker, that we will get a class of immigrants from the United States who will make highly desirable settlers in this country, because, as we know, they have a knowledge of the conditions prevailing here. I want to say to my hon. friend that we will continue in that course in the hope that we may bring about a very large immigration from the United States, feeling as we do that these immigrants will better their conditions in this country as have those who have already come to us.

## THE RENFREW CAMPAIGN NEARING ITS CLOSE

(Toronto Globe)  
Only one newspaper in South Renfrew—namely the Arnprior Chronicle—is supporting Dr. Maloney. All the rest, Conservative and Liberal alike, are standing for the agreement being kept in the letter and in the spirit. The Renfrew Journal, Cobden Sun, and Eganville Leader, as well as The Renfrew Mercury and The Arnprior Watchman, have been coming out, every week with strong editorials and strong articles urging the election of Mr. Graham.

Renfrew, Feb. 18.—That the South Renfrew bye-election in which polling takes place Thursday, is regarded by both parties as most important is indicated by the energy displayed in holding meetings all over the riding and securing strong speakers. The "Government" candidate, as Dr. Maloney is styled by Liberals in recognition of his not being the nominee of the Conservative convention is supported by Hon. J. D. Reid, Messrs G. H. Ferguson, M.P., for Grenville; W. H. Bennett, M.P., for East Simcoe; J. J. Donnelly, M.P., for South Bruce; Wm. Smith, M.P., for South Ontario; G. H. Baker, M.P., for Bromley; Willis of Manitoba; Davidson of Nova Scotia; Peter White of Pembroke; John Webster, M.P., for Brockville; C. J. Thornton, M.P., for Durham; and Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Hon. J. D. Hazen, Hon. L. P. Pelletier and Mr. W. J. Roche, M. P., for Marquette, Man., are billed to speak here during the last three days of the campaign.

### AIDING MR. GRAHAM

On the other hand Hon. Mr. Graham has had the assistance of Senator J. H. Ratz, Messrs Geo. McCraney, M.P., for Saskatoon; Dr. B. Neely, M.P., for Humboldt, Sask.; W. M. Martin, M.P., for Regina, and F. F. Pardee, M.P., for West Lambton while Hon. Chas. Murphy, E. B. Devlin, M.P., for Wright, Que., E. M. Macdonald, M. P. for Picton, N. S.; Hon. W.M.L. King and Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself are coming during the remaining days. It is significant that up to the present scarcely one local man has appeared on Dr. Maloney's platform except Dr. J. E. Murphy of Arnpour who nominated him, while Mr. Graham's meetings have been addressed by Mr. Thos. A. Low, ex-M.P. Dr. B. G. Connolly, Mr. W. E. Smallfield, Mr. Wm. Jamieson and Mr. S. T. Chown, all of Renfrew; Mr. Jas. E. Thompson and Mr. R. J. Slatery of Arnprior, Mr. John S. Gillies and Mr. T. W. McGarry, M.P.P., after his honorable stand in the Conservative convention on the 19th of January, has taken no part in the contest honestly standing by his word and the honor of his friends, and he was not at home on nomination day, nor is it said, will he be back till election day.

### A RIDICULOUS REPORT

A report emanated from Quebec that Mr. Armand Lavergne, Mr. Monk's Nationalist lieutenant in Quebec, was coming—in fact had started—to assist Mr. Graham, was he thought the Opposition in the House should be strengthened by his presence. This is not true. Mr. Lavergne is not coming into the riding. "It would," says Mr. F. G. Inwood, "be manifestly absurd."

### A DIFFICULT CAMPAIGN

This is one of the hardest constituencies in the Province for campaign-

ing. The railway service is nearly all at one side of the riding which is about a hundred miles long by forty wide, containing nineteen townships, each about ten miles square. The mere legitimate expense of an election campaign runs close to a thousand dollars for each party, so that to enter into a contest with no political issues at stake, and when the weather is ordinarily the most inclement for driving. Another reason freely stated by men on both sides is that they desired to avoid a contest because of previous experiences of corrupt use of money and other political influences.

### THE UNCERTAIN ELEMENT

Frequently the remark is heard from men of both parties that there is a large element of the population particularly in the sparsely settled western and northwestern portion of the riding susceptible to the "flesh-pots" and that there are quite a number of men in the towns these days looking for the "lang greens" so the issue of the election borrows a good deal of its uncertainty from the problematic effect of efforts made to induce these people to support the Government, if not for immediate reward, at any rate with the prospect of expenditures upon roads, etc., in their districts.

### MEETINGS AT MANY POINTS

The meetings held during last week by the Liberals were at Arnprior, Guran School (McNab township), Clay Bank, Braeside, Renfrew, Horntownship, Town Hall, Bonnechere Point, Shamrock, Mount St. Patrick, Burnstown, White Lake, Calabogie and Springtown. This week there will be big meetings at Eganville and Arnprior, addressed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and others, and smaller ones at Wilno, Brudenell, Killaloe and Barry's Bay. The Conservative meetings have been seen so far at Plaut's Schoolhouse (near Eganville), Brudenell, Rockingham, Quadale, Palmer Rapids, Combermere, WhiteLake, Sand Point, Castleford, Braeside, Schoolhouse No. 9 (McNab), Northcote, Scotch Bush, Stewartville Martip's Schoolhouse (Admaston township), and Admaston. Arnprior, Eganville, and Renfrew are listed for next week.

### INTIMIDATION CHARGED

Dr. Maloney openly tells his audiences that even though Mr. Graham should be elected he (Dr. Maloney) will have all the patronage. He and his supporters speak of large schemes of rural free mail delivery, rural telephones, and road improvements, all arguments which appeal strongly to the farmers of this county. Nor is intimidation thought beneath the dignity of some of Dr. Maloney's active supporters, though they say nothing about this in open meetings. But Mr. Low has openly stated in public meetings that men are being told that if they, and in some cases even their brothers-in-law, did not vote for Dr. Maloney they would lose their public positions.

Meetings were held last night by the Liberals at Dacre, Scotch Bush and Esmond, Mr. Graham speaking at the three places, and Mr. Devlin also at Dacre.

Hon. Chas. Murphy and Dr. J. P. Molloy, M. P. for Provencher, Que., spoke at Calabogie. The Conservatives had meetings at Stewartville and Caldwell's tonight.

C., Feb. 21.—The initial steps looking to the merger of three of the largest cotton mills in the South were taken today at a meeting of the stockholders of the Langley Manufacturing Company at Langley. The three concerns which it is proposed to combine are the Langley Manufacturing Company, the Aiken Manufacturing Company and the Seminole Manufacturing Company. The mills have a total valuation of \$1,669,500. The combined textile enterprise will have a spindleage a little in excess of 100,000.

### Y.M.C.A. PROSPERING

New York, Feb. 21.—One of the most interesting features of the biennial convention of the Young Men's Christian Association in New York State, which met at the local headquarters here today for a two days' session, consists of the reports of officers and committees showing the remarkable growth and prosperity of the organization. According to these reports the total membership in this State now exceeds 60,000, while the association owns 86 buildings with an aggregate value exceeding \$10,000,000.

### ALPHA DELTA PHI MEETING

Springfield, Mass., Feb. 21.—The Alpha Delta Phi fraternity, founded at Hamilton College in 1832, began its eightieth annual convention here today as the guest of the Amherst chapter. The meeting will last three days and will have as speakers President Benjamin Ide Wheeler of the University of California, President Harris of Amherst College, and Chas. S. Whitman, district attorney of New York City.

Provision has been made by the International Seamen's Union for the appointment of nine organizers, seven on the lakes, one on the Pacific and one on the Atlantic.

## CONVICTS AND GUARDS IN BLOODY FIGHT

Mexico City, Feb. 20.—Twenty-seven prisoners and prison guards were killed yesterday at Pueblo in the State of Puebla, in a fight which followed an attempt by the prisoners to escape from jail, a cording to a special despatch received by the Mexican Herald from that city. Twenty of the men succeeded in escaping.

A force of cavalry which was hurriedly despatched to the assistance of the prison guards had a severe fight with the escaping prisoners.

## REORGANIZING LAWRENCE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Lawrence, Mass., Feb. 20.—With a new city marshal at the head of the local police, a re-organization of the force began today and the effort will be made to render the department capable of dealing with the situation that has developed as a result of the strike of textile mills operatives. The new city marshal, Capt. John J. Sullivan, succeeds James T. O'Sullivan, who was retired yesterday by order of the commissioner of public safety. Although the department is to be re-organized thoroughly the militia will not be withdrawn from the city for the present. It is expected however, that the military force may be reduced when the re-organized police department is considered to be sufficiently strong. The mill officials reported today that more officials reported for work today than at any time since the strike began.
