### MIKE TWIN SULLIVAN AN EASY VICTIM FOR BOB MOHA

Sullivan Was Not in Condition to Fight and Had Trouble to Avoid Punishment.

Milwaukee, Mar. 11.—Going into the ring in no condition to fight, Mike (Twin) Sullivan last night proved an easy victim for Bob Moha. It was a rough and tumble affair, but neither showed any serious results at the finish.

Sullivan, it is said, had not done any training for the fight and went into the ring fat and out of form.

The men put in the first round feeling each other out, and Sullivan had a shade. The second saw Sullivan showing far more boxing ability in the third he landed several jolts to the body. Only two good blows were delivered in the fourth round, Sullivan putting a stiff one to the ear and a short right to the stomach. The fifth round was easily Moha's. He put in three hard ring swings to the ear, with some hard drives to the body, and Sullivan was kept busy covering up. The sixth was also Moha's, and Sullivan's lack of condition showed plainly here. The seventh was marked by much stalling by Sullivan, and in the eighth there was much roughing, with Sullivan showing well in covering up. Sullivan had the better of the clean hitting in the ninth round, but Moha's roughing and infighting gave him the advantage easily. In the 10th Sullivan was forced to stall throughout to keep away from severe punishment.

## SPORT

### TORONTO PAPERS HAND BOQUETS TO U. N. B. BASKETBALLISTS

Local Collegians Weak on Penalty Throws—Their System of Passing and General Play Praised.

The Toronto News has the following concerning the U. N. B. basketball team and its game against Toronto West End Y. M. C. A. last week.

"The University of New Brunswick basketball team fully lived up to expectations in their game with West End on the latter's court last night, the home five winning out by the bare margin of one point, the final score being 35 to 34. The visitors had considerable of the play although the Torontonians had hard luck in their shooting. The Blue Noses clearly showed they were bothered by the size of the floor and by the conditions of the game. Until they struck Ottawa on Monday night they had never played on a court which was not caged or walled in—the throw-in being an entirely new play with them. The Eastners were very neat and quick in their passes which were nearly always short and straight. Moreover they never attempted any long shots, always working the ball up close to the goal by means of combination plays which they had down fine.

### FAST MATCH

"That the match was exceedingly close and exciting is evidenced by the fact that the score was tied no less than six times, the teams being on even terms on four occasions in the second session. It was the best seen match ever seen in this city. The locals started off like a cyclone notching six points, before the visitors smelled the basket, but as soon as they struck their bearings they held their own. Slow in starting, the Blue Noses came stronger every minute of the time and during the last period were nearly always in the lead. On one occasion the New Brunswick-31 to 26, but by desperate playing the Y. M. C. A. crew forged to the front.

### ONE FAULT

The visitors were tall, rangy men. They handled the ball in a manner that showed they had had lots of work together. Their only fault was inability to score on foul throws, only four points being made in this way. McKnight, forward was chief scorer for the losers, although, Kinghorn, Alexander and Rigby were all conspicuous in this respect. Robertson, the local star was as usual, in the limelight, while Montgomery was always in the thick of the fray.

### ARCLIGHT, FAMOUS OLD STALLION, DROPPED DEAD

Arclight, a horse that in his day was one of the greatest racers in the Maritime Provinces, dropped dead in Truro last week. The stallion was owned by John Fraser for the past seven years.

The Truro News has the following concerning the horse:

"Arclight was 26 years old, sired by Old Rampart, his dam was by R. R. Morris, an American stallion of good repute, and he had a record of 2.19, made in Halifax.

"This horse was raised by Dr. Taylor, of Hampton, N. B., and was bought by J. A. Johnson, of Halifax, and afterwards by A. H. Learmont, Truro, Mr. Fraser being the last owner.

Arclight has won many races in his career, and at one time was well to the front among the speedy trotters of the Maritime Provinces."

### AMHERST RAMBLERS TRIMMED ST. JOHN EASILY 6 TO 2

Nova Scotia League Leaders Completely Outclassed N. B. H. L. Winners—St. John Without Some Players.

St. John, March 13.—The St. John hockey team champions of New Brunswick were defeated on Saturday night by the Amherst Ramblers, leaders in the Nova Scotia league by a score of 6 to 2.

The game was below the expectations of the four hundred enthusiasts. The ice was in poor condition, due to mild weather. The game, while lacking sensational play, was quite fast at times.

The St. John boys played a good defence game but were off color in their stick work. The stars in the local team were P. McAvity, Gilbert and Parker. Twaddle and Black were the conspicuous ones of the Amherst team.

The visitors play a fast game, are good skaters aggressive and expert stick handlers. St. John did not play their usual good game, but some individual rushes and good checking marked the locals' work. St. John was handicapped by the absence of Art Tully and B. McAvity two of the local stars, and Mooney and Philips were in poor condition on account of sickness, so that the local boys could not be expected to justify the expectations of their admirers; nevertheless they played a good steady game.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
