MANY ASPIRANTS  
FOR VACANT SEAT  
IN LOCAL HOUSE

Dr. Morehouse of Keswick Believed to Have Best Chance—O. S. Crockett Called Home to Fix Things up.

While local government heelerers are announcing Dr. O. E. Morehouse of Keswick as the party candidate at the approaching bye-election, there is reason to believe that the matter has not yet been settled by any means. There are a number of other aspirants for the vacant seat who are pushing their claims, and with Mr. Pinder and the Solicitor General at swords points things are not going along as smoothly as certain people would have the public believe.

Dr. Mullin of St. Mary's is putting up a stiff fight in the face of the opposition of Mr. Pinder and his satellites, but his chances for winning out do not seem to be of the best. It is quite likely that he will drop out of the race if given a positive assurance that he supplant Mr. Young on the party ticket at the next election.

Other names mentioned in connection with the nomination are those of Coun. George L. Colter of Keswick, Warden Rogers of Douglas, Coun. John F. Timmins of Queensbury, Ex-Warden M. B. McNally of Kingsclear and John A. Humble of Stanley.

Mr. Humble thinks that he should be tendered the nomination as a matter of courtesy. He points out that his application for the shrievalty was turned down and the reward that has come his way for a life time of faithful party service is a \$10 a year office in the Parish of Stanley.

The friends of Ex-Coun. M. B. McNally of Kingsclear, say that if there is such a thing as gratitude in the Tory party in York they will tender Mr. McNally the nomination. They point to the fact that he has been a faithful party worker, and like Mr. Humble was turned down when he applied for the office of sheriff. They also point to the fact that there is not a single farmer on the government side in the Legislature, and for this and other reasons they are urging Mr. McNally's claims.

Ex-Coun. John McKeen was in the city last week. "I am going to attend the convention on Wednesday" he told a friend. "I have been voting the Tory ticket for fifty-five years and it is about time my services were recognized in some way. I think they should offer me a nomination for the Legislature."

Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., arrived from Ottawa on Saturday. He has been called home to try and manipulate things so that his friend, Dr. Morehouse will be assured of a nomination at the Tory convention on Wednesday. Mr. Crockett works hand in hand with Mr. Pinder and pretends to be in sympathy with the Solicitor General.

## SUSSEX DAIRY SCHOOL

WILL OPEN ON 20th INST.

The Dairy School at Sussex opens on the 20th inst. with courses in butter-making, both creamery and home dairy, soft cheese making in the home and milk testing with which are included lectures upon the Care of Dairy Animals, embracing the prevention and cure of diseases, and information as to feeding, etc.

These courses are free to all residents of the Maritime Provinces and provision is made for ladies, who are especially invited. The Intercolonial Railways give a round trip to and from the School at single fare on the standard certificate plan. The courses conclude on the 31st of March and the two weeks' course in factory cheese making begins on the 4th of April.

CIVIC ELECTION  
DAY VERY QUIET,  
LARGE VOTE POLLED

Citizens' Ticket Claims Big Lead in No. 2 Division—Much Splitting of Tickets.

The main feature of today's civic election is the heavy vote which is being brought out in both divisions. In No. 2 division, which comprises that part of the city east of Carleton street, there was a remarkably heavy vote polled during the first hour the poll was open. At one o'clock about four hundred votes had been polled at the Court House and considerably more than that number at the City Hall, where the electors of No. 1 division vote. Workers for both the Citizens' and Good Government tickets were active all day and the various candidates divided their forces between the two polls.

## SPLITTING THE TICKETS.

It is expected that the result will show that many electors split their vote among the members of the two tickets and on that account it is difficult to make any forecast concerning the result. The members of the Citizens' Ticket and their supporters claim to have gained a big lead on the Good Government ticket in No. 2 division and also to be satisfied with the way the vote has gone in No. 1 division. The members of the Good Government ticket, on the other hand are confident that the result will not be victory for their opponents.

## MANY LADIES VOTE.

One prominent feature of the election has been the voting of a large number of qualified women voters. Special efforts have been made to bring out this vote and the supporters of the Good Government ticket claim that their candidates are getting it.

## ATTEMPTED IMPERSONATION.

The election has been quiet in spite of the heavy vote polled and the keen interest manifested in the outcome. There was one case of attempted impersonation at the City Hall, when a man belonging to Kingsley tried to vote in his brother's name. He did not succeed.

The polls close at 4 p.m. On account of the heavy vote of the large number of names on the ballot, it is probable that the returns will not be in until about seven o'clock. City Clerk McCready will announce the result of the election in the City Council Chamber. The candidates will follow with brief speeches.

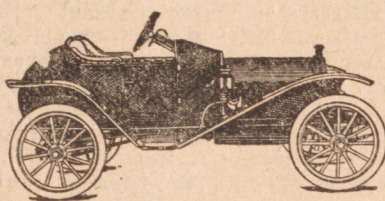
LOCAL MOTORISTS  
MAKE RECORD RUN  
FROM ST. JOHN

Albert C. Smith and Wm. Vaughan Make Trip on River-Ice in Four Hours.

A new winter-travel record by auto was made this morning by Mr. Albert C. Smith of the Fredericton Garage and Chauffeur Wm. Vaughan, who made the trip from St. John to Fredericton via Rothesay in four hours. Messrs. Smith and Vaughan travelled in a 20 h. p. Hupmobile, a cut of which appears below. The trip to St. John was made by the same route as the return journey to this city, the party leaving Fredericton at 4.30 Sunday morning and arriving in St. John six hours later. On the return they left St. John at 7.30 this morning arriving at 11.30.

## MET DIFFICULTIES

Mr. Smith speaking of the behavior of his car on the trip said it was excellent. The return trip of course breaks all records for travel at this time of year. On the journey to St. John the car travelled partly on the ice of the river and partly on the river road. The latter as might be



expected was in bad condition. The occupants of the car before leaving this city supplied themselves with shovels, jacks and other implements necessary for extricating the car from snow-banks. They found it necessary to use them on several occasions having to shovel their car out and lift it up on the road.

## ICE STILL STRONG

Messrs. Smith and Vaughan on their record trip today followed the Marsh Road from St. John to Rothesay. At that place they took to the ice of the river on which they travelled practically all the way to Fredericton. The ice was in good condition at all points. The exploit will probably tempt other motorists to try for records at winter-auto-travel.
