INTERESTING GOSSIP ON FADS AND FASHIONS

(Special Correspondence.)

New York, July 8.—Delightful summer frocks in bewildering variety are shown in the shops at this time and those who make the rounds of the shops with a view of purchasing one of these frocks, find it extremely difficult to choose. All waist-lines are high; not high enough to be empire or directoire, but sufficiently above the normal to give a cunning, youthful look to little summer frocks.

This accentuating of the high waist line is due, some dressmakers insist, to a reaction from the straight front corset, which, while it has wrought marvels in the improvement of mature figures, lengthens the waist and gives a heavy effect between bust and belt-line. The high waistline is really more youthful and on slender figures it is charming. Sashes seem to belong rightfully with girlish, short-waisted frocks and almost every mid-summer costume this season has its sash bow, with or without ends, at the back of the bodice.

The velvet sash may seem a bit cumbersome for midsummer wear in America, where the humidity brings a weather condition absolutely unknown in Paris; but in Paris, just now, these velvet sashes are considered extremely chic.

A Paris frock, worn in London during coronation week, had three very limp, scant flounces of black chiffon on a white chiffon skirt, and, of course, other touches of black in the costume balanced this arrangement of flounces at the foot. Everything that comes out of Paris this year has the touch of black that proclaims it Parisian. There may be only a tiny line of black piping at the neck, or a sprinkling of black buttons on a chiffon vest, or perhaps the sash. Chiffon sashes are extremely graceful, but, of course, the material must be substantially weighted in order that it shall not fly about and spoil the lines of the frock.

Just now there seems to be a perfect craze for a certain deep, brilliant red shade, the royal red of coronation cloaks. Some of the Paris dressmakers have turned out whole frocks in this blazing color, and as everybody with an observant eye has noted, red hats are a fad of the summer. But red is not a color that is comfortable to have about in dog-day weather in America, however much they may like it in London for patriotic reasons, or in Paris, where humidity is unknown. Green is more favored in America, and many of the handsomest costumes for summer wear, that are shown in the shops, are of that color.

The long straight lines which, as already stated, are inseparable from the modern mode, adapt themselves admirably to the slimmest of the youthful figure, and the debutantes this year may be congratulated upon the fact that they are not required to exploit fashions that are in the least degree exaggerated or outre. On the contrary, they are even now being encouraged to attire themselves in garments which show none of the eccentricities of the hobble skirt on the one hand or the jupe culotte on the other.

A happy medium as regards both length and width will characterize all the skirts of those frocks which are intended for young people, while in the matter of color only the daintiest and most delicate shades will be in request. Pale Quaker-gray will be one of the favorite tints for young girls' summer frocks, and some of the prettiest of these dresses are carried out in gray silk voile, and trimmed with Cluny lace insertions dyed to match the color of the voile. These frocks are worn with gray suede shoes and gloves and gray, openwork silk stockings.

CONCLAVE OF IOWA TEMPLARS

Spirit Lake, Ia., July 8.—With flying banners and waving plumes hundreds of Knights Templar from all over Iowa gathered here today for the convocation of the grand commandery and the state encampment of the uniform rank of the order. TO TRY PASTOR FOR HERESY

Pittsburg, Pa., July 8.—The first heresy trial held by the Reformed Presbyterian Church in more than half a century is scheduled to begin here Monday, with the Rev. Dr. John H. Dietrich, pastor of St. Mark's Memorial Reformed Church of this city, as the defendant. Dr. Dietrich has professed to represent the newer ideas of progress and advancement in church and scriptural doctrine. He has said that he does not believe there ever was a fall of man. This and similar utterances from the pulpit form the basis for the heresy charges.

RUSSIA INTEREST IN MORROCAN SITUATION

Berlin, July 7.—The Russian ambassador called today at the foreign office and had a long talk with Baron Von Kiderlin Waechter, the foreign secretary. He had been directed by Emperor Nicholas to enquire in a friendly spirit concerning Germany's intentions in Morocco. There has been no intimation of what Germany's pretensions will be in the eventual bargaining between the powers over Morocco. Officials here adhere to the point of view that France first of all should state her intentions in the premises. There is some reason to believe, according to a well-informed and friendly diplomat, that the ultimate basis of negotiations will concern Germany's participation in railroad and industrial concessions in Morocco and the extension of the Kaerun-Congo railway while in anti-German diplomatic circles, the opinion is expressed that Germany first will try to secure a position in South Morocco and fall back upon a demand for railroad concessions if she should fail therein. The brunt of the opposition to the first proposition would, it is believed, rest with Great Britain since France is less concerned over Germany securing a foothold on the Atlantic coast of Morocco.

Berlin, July 7.—The Lokai Anzeiger makes what is apparently an inspired comment today on Premier Asquith's declaration that a situation had arisen in Morocco through which British interests might be affected more directly than heretofore and that Great Britain in whatever part she took in the matter, would have due regard for the protection of those interests and the fulfillment of her treaty obligations toward France. The paper makes a reassuring view of the English position, saying that Mr. Asquith favors a policy of moderation and calm, commonsense and that his statement indicates that the British government will pursue a more active policy than heretofore and be guided by the interests of Great Britain rather than by the Morocco entente.
