FINANCIAL and COMMERCIAL

CANADA CEMENT

Mr. F. P. Jones, general manager of the Canada Cement Company, has returned from Winnipeg. He says that the Winnipeg plant will be ready about June, when the output at that point will be about two thousand barrels a day, and with the two other plants at Calgary and Exshaw the company will reach an output west of the lakes of, say, 140,000 barrels a month.

The year of the Canada Cement Company will end the 31st of the present month, and yesterday the general manager announced that although the months of November and December had not been good from a sales point of view, the years' business will probably show an increase over the previous year of about 30 per cent.

Prices in Canada, says Mr. Jones, are lower than they had ever been in Winnipeg, except during the financial depression. In 1905-6 cement in Winnipeg was selling at from \$2.26 to \$2.25 per barrel. In 1907 from \$2.35 to \$2.74, while in 1911 the figures are from \$2.05 to \$2.21.

WHAT BANKERS' THINK OF BUSINESS

We don't require to be told what the Canadian bankers think of the business situation. The contemplated new issues of bank stock indicate clearly enough what their opinion is.

THE LA ROSE DIVIDEND

The 10 per cent. dividend basis will not likely be declared on La Rose stock until March next, when the quarterly payment will be 2½ per cent. There may be some official announcement regarding the purchase of a mining property, which is not in the Porcupine district.

1912 CANADA'S YEAR

From a business point of view 1912 will be Canada's Year. During that year the great Dominion of Canada will do more to demonstrate its unique resources than in any previous year in the history of the country. This may sound like prophecy, but there are a dozen and one indications that the year will be Canada's Year.

NEW MONEY FROM ABROAD

Of the \$27,000,000 which the C. P. R. will receive from its stock issue of \$18,000,000 at 150, it is stated that over \$20,000,000 will come from English and European shareholders—Greenshields & Co., letter.

NEW BANK STOCK

It is expected that the Merchants Bank will issue \$1,000,000 of new stock within the next few days. This was authorized some months ago. The stock will be offered at 175 or 180 in proportion of one to six.

C. P. R.'S BIG CROSS

Canadian Pacific had a remarkably fine increase in gross earnings for week ending December 14, of \$623,000. The earnings were, \$2,522,000. It is surely not more than five or six years ago when the company was looking forward to \$1,000,000 weeks, and here we have a two and a half million week, as a mere matter of course.

VETERAN CIVIL SERVANT DEAD IN ONTARIO

Toronto, Dec. 20.—Matthew Teffy, who died yesterday aged 89, was Canada's oldest civil servant, having held office as postmaster of Richmond Hill, since long before confederation. He assumed the office in 1851 while carrying on a merchandise trade. Three years ago he became rather feeble but not until three weeks ago did he break down. He had a remarkable memory for and grasp of public affairs. In his home public documents dating back as far as 1800 which he had collected. He possessed valuable historical books of Canada, speeches of the public men of the country since 1800.

TRAGIC DEATH OF MADAWASKA GIRL

Perth, N.B., Dec. 19.—While standing watching her brother-in-law clean a gun, Miss Martha McLaughlin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William McLaughlin, of Ortonville, was accidentally shot and killed in a lumber camp, twenty miles up Green River, Madawaska county, and about thirty miles from Edmundston, early Sunday afternoon. She lived but three hours after the accident.

Frank Crane, also of Ortonville, was the accidental cause of her death. Crane was taking charge of a crew of men in the Madawaska woods for William McLaughlin, his father-in-law and the father of the girl who was shot. Miss McLaughlin was living at the camp and was assisting in the cooking.

After the mid-day meal on Sunday, Crane got out his Winchester rifle and placed it on the table for the purpose of cleaning it. He threw several shells out of the magazine, when one struck and was accidentally discharged. Miss McLaughlin was standing on the opposite side of the table at the time. The bullet struck her first on the hand, ripping off three fingers and passed through the lower part of her body.

The accident occurred in the heart of the woods and no physician was available. The frantic crew did everything possible for her relief, but the young woman died within three hours. The body was brought to Ortonville by train today.

Her brothers, who are in scattered lumber camps throughout the country, were informed by specially dispatched teams, in an effort to hold the funeral on Thursday.

Crane has not been arrested, and it is believed that no charge will be made against him unless the coroner's jury bring in a finding against him. The date of the holding of the inquest has not been determined.

The victim was but twenty years of age and was a handsome girl. She is survived by her parents, two sisters, Mrs. Crane and Mrs. Esther Dee, both of Ortonville, and four brothers, John, Ernest, Newman and Eldon.
