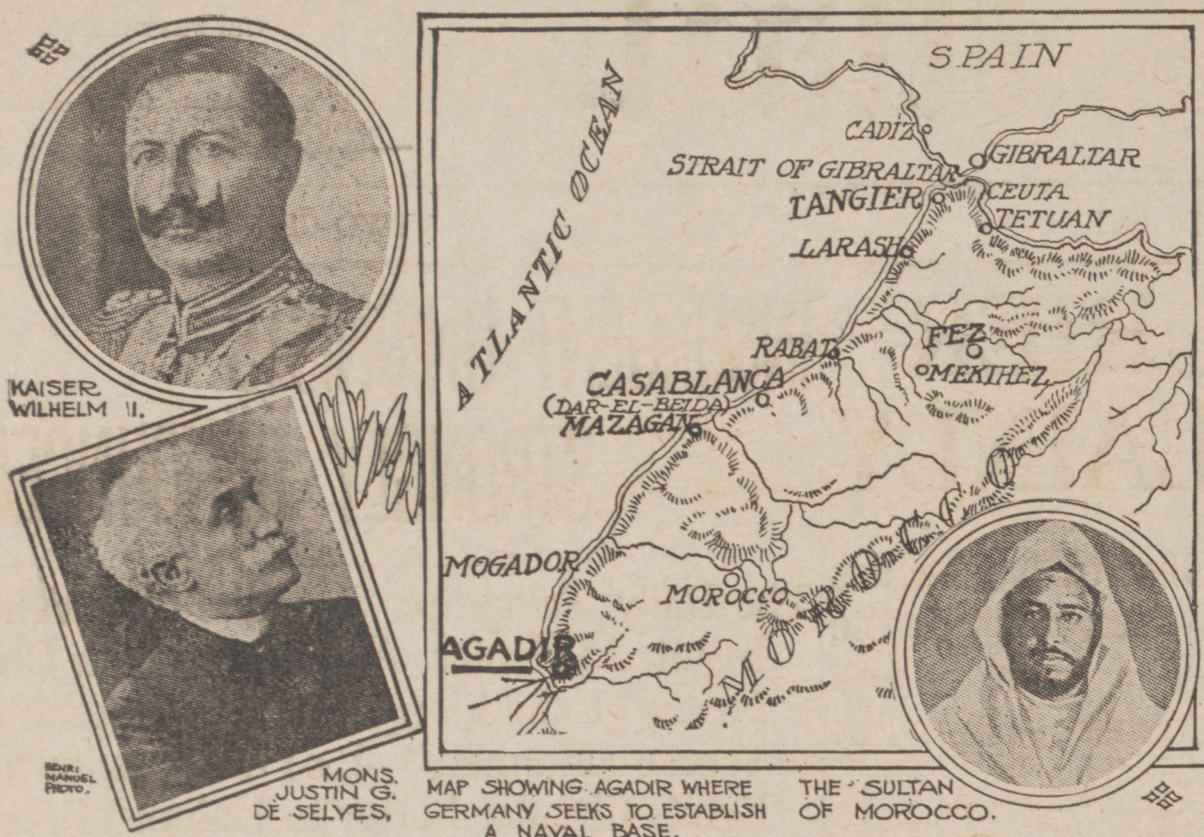


MOROCCAN IMBROGLIO ATTRACTS ATTENTION OF GREAT POWERS.



The situation in Morocco has reached such an acute stage that intervention on the part of the great powers seems likely. The German Emperor is personally looking after the interests of his government. The Emperor is anxious to establish a German naval base at Agadir, on the Atlantic coast of Morocco, but there seems to be some objection to this action on the part of the United States and France. Mons. de Selves, the French Foreign Minister, at a Cabinet meeting declared that the Cabinet would uphold the dignity and interests of France in the Moroccan question.

TO CONSECRATE NEWFOUNDLAND BISHOP

St. John's, N. F., July 24.—Several eminent prelates and numerous priests of the Roman Catholic Church in eastern Canada and Newfoundland have arrived in St. John's to attend the consecration of Rt. Rev. Michael Power as bishop of Bay St. George, West Newfoundland. The impressive ceremony will take place in the Cathedral tomorrow morning.

"Follow my white plume" may be the latest battle cry in the impending general election. Addressing his French-Canadian compatriots on the Champ de Mars at Montreal last Tuesday, Sir Wilfrid Laurier exclaimed:

"Henry of Navarre at the battle of Ivry said 'Follow my white plume and you will find it always in the forefront of honor.' Like Henry IV., I say to you young men 'Follow my white plume—the white hairs of sixty-nine years—and you will, I believe I can say without boasting, find it always in the forefront of honor.'"

Sir Wilfrid is eager for a battle of ballots. When his Government was returned to power in 1908 on the cry "Let Laurier finish his work!" he said he probably never would run again, but he has no other idea now but to press the fighting.

WESTERN BISHOP
ON NE TEMERE DECREE

(Montreal Herald.)

No church should claim the right to cut across the civil laws of the country, and it would be a good thing if all marriages were celebrated by magistrates as well as by churches, is the opinion of Bishop Perrin, of British Columbia, who is at the Windsor Hotel.

Speaking to The Herald this morning about the vexed question of mixed marriages and the Ne Temere decree, the Bishop said that he had not gone very deeply into the subject, but he thought it was foolish on the part of the Roman Catholic Church to attempt to interfere with the civil laws.

"In the matter of burial," he said "it would be different. Then it would not matter so much—I mean that the person is dead and cannot go on actively in the community. And it seems reasonable for a church to refuse burial to a non-member. But the marriage tie is the foundation of everything. If it is broken, especially when there are children, it means that so many things are upset. It seems to me that the simplest way out of this difficulty would be to have marriages celebrated legally, and then have the blessing of the church sought afterwards. If a marriage is legal, then it should stand."

Speaking of the coronation, which he saw, the Bishop said that the two things which impressed him most were the intense solemnity of it all and the bearing of the Queen.

"So many people spoke about the Queen," he said, "and the far-away, uplifted look on her face I shall never forget. It seemed to mean a great and spiritual thing to her. It was beautiful."

Speaking of the present crisis through which England is passing, he said:

"I am confident that the common sense of the people will see them through. It was almost funny that at a time when the country was facing a more serious thing than had troubled it for centuries, that they were a great deal more concerned about their seats for the coronation than about the Lords."

"BACK TO FARM" CAMPAIGN

Chicago, Ill., July 24.—Governors of States, national philanthropists and State immigration commissioners assembled in Chicago today to formally launch the "back to the farm" campaign. The object of the movement is to aid workingmen and others living in congested districts in large cities, as well as State charges, in obtaining farms in northern, southern and western States. It is proposed to maintain a permanent bureau for the dissemination of information relative to conditions existing in the various States.

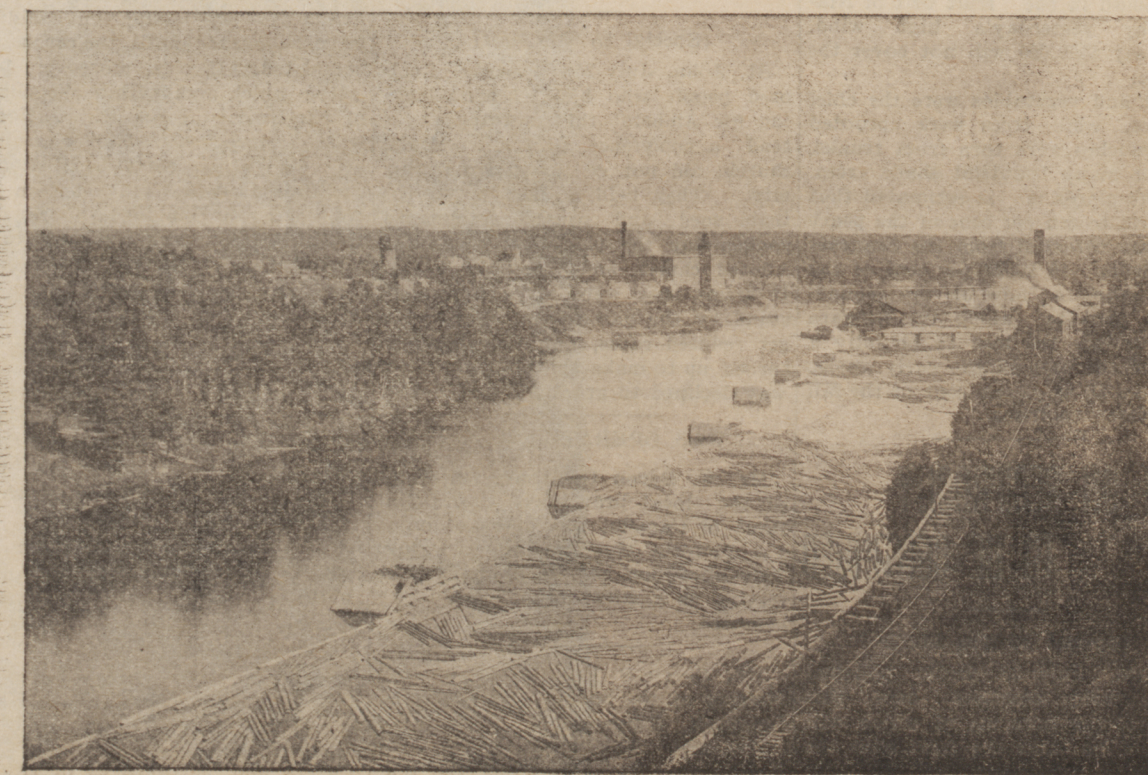
INTERSTATE TENNIS TOURNAMENT
