PREMIER FLEMMING

Hon. J. K. Flemming, provincial secretary, has won out in the race for the premiership over Surveyor General Grimmer. At St. John last evening Hon. J. D. Hazen, who has been called to the Borden cabinet, waited upon His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, tendered his resignation as premier, and recommended Hon. Mr. Flemming as his successor. Hon. Mr. Flemming afterwards met the Lieutenant Governor and accepted the task of forming a new administration. He asked for a few days of grace, but it is understood that on Monday he will submit his slate to His Honor for approval.

Although he lacked many of the qualifications necessary for successful leadership, the withdrawal of Premier Hazen has undoubtedly weakened the provincial administration. The late premier was able to keep the warring factions under subjection, but his successor may not be quite so successful. He can only succeed by developing qualifications for leadership which up to the present time has not been much in evidence in his make-up. However, we have no wish to discourage the new premier; he has a big contract on his hands and his work will be closely watched by a critical public.

Having been beaten out in the race for the premiership, it is by no means certain that Hon. Mr. Grimmer will consent to take the portfolio of attorney general. He may decide to retain the department of crown lands which he has administered with a fair degree of success. In case he should do this the premier would either be compelled to go outside of the Assembly for an attorney general or promote Solicitor General McLeod to the position. If he adopts the first alternative it would mean trouble, and if he resorts to the latter it would mean more trouble. The promotion of the present surveyor general would therefore, seem to be the only solution of the problem. Hon. Mr. McLeod would then become surveyor general, and Mr. Slipp or some other Tory lawyer would succeed to the office of solicitor general. The other ministers will probably retain their present portfolios, while the Hon. Robert Maxwell, whether he likes it or not, must remain in the forecave.

The new premier was born in Woodstock parish in 1866 and is therefore, in his forty-fourth year. He was elected to the Legislature at a bye-election in 1900 and was re-elected in 1903 and 1908. For several sessions he acted as financial critic for the opposition and upon the return of his party to power he became provincial secretary. The new premier is a fluent and graceful speaker and a man of kindly disposition who does not put on airs. If he makes good as premier he will provide a pleasant disappointment for many of his own political friends.

The following from the Boston Herald of Sept. 29 may help to explain the defeat of Mr. Fielding and other liberal candidates in the fishing counties of western Nova Scotia: "My trip home was worth \$75 to me," remarked a fisherman who returned on the Prince Arthur yesterday for Nova Scotia whither he went to vote against reciprocity agreement. He was but one of the 350 others who had been shipped home it is stated to vote negatively. Everybody who returned to the province reported a "bang-up" vacation.

It looks as if Mr. Borden had already dug his own political grave.

The arrival in Canada of His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, to take up the duties of Governor General will be hailed with pleasure by Canadians of all classes. The new Governor General is well qualified for the duties of his high and exalted position and that he will acquit himself in a manner eminently satisfactory to the people there is not the slightest doubt. He will eventually make a tour of Canada and will be assured of a rousing welcome from the people.

Tory papers have been telling us all along that Hon. Robert Rogers the new Minister of the Interior was to seek election in Saskatchewan. Now we have the announcement that he has been offered the Winnipeg seat and will probably accept it. This means that Manitoba with ten members will have two portfolios while Nova Scotia with eighteen and New Brunswick with thirteen will have one each.

Earl Grey who took his departure from Canada today has had a remarkably successful career as governor general and has endeared himself to all classes of people. He carries with him to his home across the best wishes of Canadians of every class and creed.

Hon. Mr. Hazen has already broken one promise. During the recent campaign he promised to remain in local politics until the Valley Railway question was settled. His anybody heard of a contract being signed.

The Minister of labor in the Borden cabinet is Hon. T. W. Crothers an Ontario lawyer who has been three years in parliament. What he doesn't know about labor problems would make a good sized volume.

Hon. W. T. White of Toronto, Minister of Finance in the Borden Government is the first Liberal to receive his reward for jumping the political fence.

Have you heard of a single Conservative speak of the Borden cabinet in term of admiration? Even our old friend A. D. Thomas says that he is disgusted with politics.

The New Brunswick Minister being "weak-kneed and back boneless" is scarcely likely to exercise a very potent influence in the Borden Cabinet.

A she bear robbed of her cubs is a very mild proposition in comparison with certain York County Tories at the present time.

Hon. Mr. Hazen was fighting the battles of the Conservatives in the House of Commons years before O.S. Crockett left the Liberal party.

New Brunswick exchanges Pugsley for Hazen and it exchanges the portfolio of Public Works for marine and fisheries.

An Ottawa despatch to the Tory organ states that Premier Borden has only one Protestant Minister from Quebec and he is without portfolio.

Mr. Bourassa seems to be making good as a dictator. Mr. Borden has taken three French Nationalists into his cabinet.

Mr. W. T. White a Toronto millionaire specially chosen by the special interests will have control of the fiscal policy of the Borden government.

Hon. J. D. Hazen may yet become lord high admiral of the Canadian navy.

Premier Hazen's elevation to the cabinet has not enthused the local Tory junta.

SELECTING

A JURY FOR McNAMARA

Los Angeles, Calif., Oct. 13.—Examination of Talsman Z. T. Nelson at Pasadena was the first proceeding set before Judge Walter Bordwell in the superior court today, in the murder trial of James B. McNamara. Questioning of talsmen frequently regarded as a dismal proceeding furnished in this case, interest to spectators and partisans because it was expected to define in advance of the opening arguments, some of the essential issue of the trial, which is designed to show whether the defendant is responsible for the death of Charles J. Haggarty, who with twenty others, was killed in the Los Angeles Times explosion. For 19 deaths, James B. McNamara is held on indictment but the state has elected to go to trial on Haggarty's case.

Nelson's attitude toward labor organizations and their members touched upon at the preceding session of court, was the subject of further inquiry for the defence under attorney Clarence S. Darrow, and the ruling of the court on objections interposed by district attorney John B. Fredericks and his aides, awaited at as showing what confines would be placed upon the examination of other talsmen.


