## FATHER FOUND MISSING DAUGHTER AMONG DIVING GIRLS

One of the Troupe that Were at Local Exhibition in Amusing Incident at Brockton Fair

An incident occurred last week at the Brockton, Mass., Fair which is of considerable interest to Fredericton people as it concerned no other than the Diving Girls who were one of the great attractions at the Fredericton exhibition last month. The incident was the discovery among the troupe of girls by her father of a girl seventeen years old who had been missing from home for some time. The parent was rather astonished to find his daughter in such a position and at once ordered her to leave the show. His action caused a clash between himself and the manager of the troupe but he eventually compelled his daughter to return home.

## FATHER WAS ANGRY.

The Mirror and American of Manchester, N.H., has the following account of the incident:

John A. Galvin, who said he hailed from Boston, was among the hundreds huddled close within the enclosure opposite the grandstand, where the vaudeville stages are located. It was three o'clock and the canvas had been drawn from the top of the tank in preparation for the aquatic stunts of the diving girls. Galvin pushed forward to the front row of standees. The five girls had indulged in rapid-fire dives and were lined up, dripping, ready for another plunge when John Galvin let out a roar.

"Come down out of that, Irene!" he gasped, as he caught sight of his 17-year-old daughter, whose whereabouts of late had been unknown to him. None of the show sirens were encumbered with apparel, but Irene and another girl had tight abbrevi-ated from the thighs down.

"Come down out of that and put on your clothes, Irene Galvin!" once more came in pre-emptory tones from the astonished parent. When Irene took refuge behind two of her moist companions instead of hurrying to the dressing room, her father proceeded to climb upon the stage.

## MANAGER OBJECTED.

"She doesn't go with you until she refunds the \$3 I paid her in advance," argued Lew Walker, the manager, notly.

"Three collars he hanged!" snarled John Galvin. "That's my child and she's under age and I never dream I'd find her under these circumstances when I came down here a spectator. Stand aside, man, and let me have her!"

Instead, Galvin claimed, the manager let him have a staggering right on the jaw, which knocked him off the stage and plump into the crowd that had pressed eagerly forward. Galvin got a policeman. Irene is no longer among the mermaids.

## EXHIBITION BLDG. BEING PREPARED FOR CATTLE-JUDGING

Steam Heating Apparatus to be Installed—Poultry Show May be Held Next Winter

The Exhibition Association is taking steps to place the addition to the main exhibition building erected last summer in condition for use by the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association for cattle judging. This is being done in accordance with the request of the Provincial Department of Agriculture that a building suitable for cattle judging be erected.

To furnish the necessary accommodation the Exhibition Association will have a temporary partition erected separating that portion of the addition which is floored with concrete from the remainder. Tenders will probably be called in the near future for the piping of this portion of the building in order to heat it by steam. The boiler of the powerhouse on the grounds will be used to generate the steam. The cost of installation of the heating system will be five or six hundred dollars.

## WINTER POULTRY SHOW.

In addition to cattle judging in connection with the annual meeting of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association, it is probable that the York and Sunbury Poultry Association will hold a poultry show. This Association, although formed but a short time ago, is strong and active and will no doubt have a very creditable show. This will also be in the new part of the exhibition building.

## IMPROVEMENTS AT GROUNDS.

This fall the exhibition grounds will be further improved by ploughing and leveling that portion where the old ring was. The space will probably be used for concessions. Secretary Hooper is not yet in a position to make any statement concerning the finances of the exhibition of 1911.

## BRIDGE BROKEN DOWN.

The travelling public is lord in complaint of the condition of the Sterling Bridge, which is unpassable. Howard Holland recently purchased a boiler from the Marysville Cotton Mill and attempted to haul it to a mill a few miles down river. The boiler went through the Sterling Creek Bridge Wednesday afternoon, and up to last evening had not been removed. Vehicles are compelled to make a wide detour in order to pass the obstacle.

## MGR. O'CALLAGHAN, WELL KNOWN HERE, IS SERIOUSLY ILL

Catholic Clergyman of South Boston, Who has Preached in Fredericton to be Operated Upon

Word has been received here of the serious illness in Boston of Rt. Rev. Monsignor Denis O'Callaghan, rector of St. Augustine's Church, South Boston, a Roman Catholic clergyman who has frequently visited Fredericton and who has preached at St. Dunstan's Church. Mgr. O'Callaghan left Boston for Baltimore yesterday morning to consult a specialist with regard to the advisability of an operation.

Mgr. O'Callaghan is suffering from bladder trouble and an operation may not be sufficient to bring about his recovery. His friends in Fredericton however, hope for the best. The specialist to be consulted is Dr. Young specialist of John Hopkins Hospital.

Mgr. O'Callaghan was last in Fredericton in the summer of 1910 when he stayed at the Barker House for some time. While in the city he preached at St. Dunstan's Church and is remembered as an eloquent forceful speaker. He was ordained to the priesthood at Baltimore June 29, 1865 and immediately was assigned to a church in South Boston where he since has attained a high position among the Catholic clergy and as a citizen.

## PREMIER FLEMMING IS VERY MUCH SOUGHT AFTER

Hon. J. K. Fleming, New Brunswick's new premier, arrived in the city this morning and registered at the Barker House, where he received the hearty congratulations of numerous friends of both political parties. There is much conjecture as to what will be the nature of the premier's announcement on Monday with regard to the composition of his cabinet. Shipp, M.P.P. of the local Conservative party waited upon Premier Fleming today and had earnest discussions with him on certain important matters.
