SAN FRANCISCO READY FOR TAFT

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—The most elaborate arrangements have been made for the reception and entertainment of President Taft from the hour of his arrival in San Francisco this evening until his departure for Los Angeles Sunday night. A citizen's banquet at the Palace Hotel is the initial feature of the programme. Tomorrow morning there will be a great parade to Golden Gate Park, where the President will be the central figure in the ground-breaking ceremonies for the Panama-Pacific Exposition. In the evening there will be a carnival and general illumination of the downtown district. After attending church Sunday morning the President will be taken in charge by an entertainment committee and escorted about the city.

MANY CABINET CHANGES
IN PAST FIFTEEN YEARS

While there have been numerous changes in the Laurier cabinet, it is worthy of note that the four who took office in 1896 and were defeated in the recent contest held the same portfolios continuously. The withdrawal of Mr. Tarte through a disagreement with Sir Wilfrid in 1902, after Sir Wilfrid's return from England, is still fresh in the public mind, as is that of the resignation of Mr. Blair, the former premier of New Brunswick, which occurred in 1904, due to opposition towards the government's policy in handing over the National Transcontinental Railway to a private company. Sir Louis Davies was elevated to the bench, Hon. Clifford Sifton resigned shortly after a disagreement in connection with the Autonomy Bill. Sir Oliver Mowat and Hon. David Mills both have passed away, while Sir Charles Fitzpatrick is chief justice of the Supreme Court. Sir William Mulock was elevated to the bench and Sir Henry Joly became lieutenant governor of British Columbia. Of the ministers who came in later than 1896, Hon. James Sutherland died in office, Hon. Charles Hyman resigned as did Hon. H. R. Emmerson.
