## ATHLETICS WON THIRD GAME FROM NEW YORK GIANTS, 4 TO 2

Mathewson Batted out of Box by Philadelphia--Barry Athletic Short-stop Heavy Hitter of the Day--Winners Outplayed New York in all Departments

Philadelphia, Oct. 24—Hitting the great Mathewson to all corners of the field, the Philadelphia Americans defeated the New York Giants at Shibe Park this afternoon for the third successive time, by the score of 4 to 2, and the American League champions now need but a single game to again give them the world's baseball honors for the second year in succession.

The victorious team not only outbatted the champions of the National League but also outfielded them and showed more alertness on the bases. It was a finely played game sensational in spots and gave the crowd plenty of opportunity to cheer. New York, getting the jump in the first inning, the Athletics came from behind, passed them in a fierce onslaught in the fourth inning, and were never again headed. Nearly 25,000 persons witnessed the contest.

Mathewson the mainstay of the Giants was fairly crushed under the fusillade of hits, and at the end of the seventh inning he retired in favor of Wiltse. The latter pitched but one inning against the heavy hitting Philadelphia team, and escaped with one two-base hit out of four men up. Ten hits for a total of sixteen bases were made off Mathewson in six innings. In the seventh he gave his only base on balls to Baker.

BENDER OPINED BADLY

"Chief" Bender the Athletics' sterling pitcher, while he did not equal the wonderful game he twirled in New York on the opening day of the series, was never in trouble except in the first inning. New York got but seven hits off him, only two of them coming in one inning. He struck out four men and gave two bases on balls. In the opening round the top of the New York batting list jumped on the Chippewa in a manner that made the timid ones fear that all was lost.

The Indian settled down, however, after New York had scored two runs on a single by Devore, a triple by Doyle, and a sacrifice fly by Snodgrass, and had New York at his mercy practically all the way.

PLAYERS' SHARE \$127,916.61

The total attendance was 24,355 and the total cash taken in \$40,957. This was divided as follows: Players \$22,116.78; national commission \$4,095.70 each club, \$7,372.26.

Today's game ends the players' participation in the receipts. They will receive \$127,916.61. Of this amount the winner will receive 60 per cent and the loser 40 per cent. Twenty-one men in each team are eligible to participate in the division of the money of each club.

## DALHOUSIE--WANDERERS GAME ABOUNDED IN SCRAPPING

Saturday's Rugby match at Halifax between Dalhousie and the Wanderers at stages presented an appearance very similar to Donnybrook Fair according to the Acadian Recorder. That paper says the game was not good football but that Dalhousie showed a tendency to adapt the style of play of the Cornwall's backs. The announcement is interesting in view of the fact that U. N. B. say play "Dal" at Halifax on the Nova Scotia tour. "Babe" Church saw the same and sizes Dalhousie's playing in the second half as "punk"

SCRAPPING GALORE

The Recorder has the following: "There was again a large crowd present, and they witnessed a most peculiar contest as far as the play was concerned, while they failed to see a good exhibition of football. There were, of course, many brilliant flashes, and some remarkable plays, but the game as a whole was a decided contrast to the exhibitions the Cornwall's have been giving. There was not only too much falling on the pigskin, but altogether too much desire to play the man instead of the ball. There was "scrapping" galore; there was no real stand up fights, but there were many clips at one another; there were a number of occasions where players drew off to strike each other; there were a number of exhibitions of temper and words exchanged, and in one instance the many ladies and others present who object to boxing, saw as complete a knockout as ever in the ring, when a Wanderer landed on a Dalhousians jaw, and the latter, who was dazed for a few moments, began to stagger back and completely crumpled up. The difference in a sparring match, however, would be that, if the contestant could not rise in ten seconds he would not be allowed to continue again, while this player was given his own time to rise and then resume play. He was not seriously hurt, and the incident and the other mix-ups were not objected to by those who like that

style of play. But English Rugby was never intended for scrapping, and the players who offend are making a mistake in forgetting that it is football they are playing. "The game itself was also uninteresting through the players being poked up in a heap over and over again."

DALHOUSIE BACK PLAY

"The Wanderers' team, failed to play in any systematic form, and their failure to follow up lost the game quite a lot. They had any number of opportunities, of which they failed to take advantage. Dalhousie's work was quite a contrast; their following up being among their best work, and the half line, with their splendid passing, in which they introduced some of the Navy's style of play behind the scrim, showed they had benefited from the Cornwall's visit. "Church, former full back for Dalhousie, who is now coaching the University of New Brunswick team, was a spectator at the game. He was not impressed with his old team's playing in the last half."

The U. N. B. Rugby Squad had its first work-out of the week yesterday afternoon and the second team gave the senior XV all it could stand. The first half showed the Varsity team playing in very stale/slow style which improved as time went on. The halves during the greater part of the practise fumbled and slipped around. Lack of proper cleats was one reason for this exhibition but poor passing due on the part of the quarters was also to blame. The second half of the practise showed great improvement, however, and toward the last of a long and hard work-out with Coach "Bobe" Church right after the men all the time the passing improved and the halves pulled off some good plays, long bouts of passing and hard straight bucks being mixed up together. Hal. Murray was playing right inside on the half-line of the first team Maiman being on the second team with Willis Balkam back at their old positions on the wings. McFadden and Lotie were the quarters but Church will probably try-out some other material in the back division. "The first team forwards h-e-le-d and dribbled in good style. O'Halloran played at "loose" forward" a position in which he is making good, picking up the points of the English Rugby game in short order. The general opinion was that the team as a whole had an off day. The coach will make some changes in today's work-out and hopes to better the team for the first big game of the season with Mt. Allison Friday afternoon.
