OCEANS OF WINE AT TORY BANQUET

(Halifax Chronicle)

The correspondent of the Toronto Star, in a despatch on the Borden banquet, reports that no less than "one thousand dozen of oysters and 750 chickens" were provided to satiate the fastidious appetite of the faithful Flag-Flappers who assembled to do honor to the new Premier and his ministers at the Mayflower Rink on Thursday night last. There were huge quantities of other good things in addition of which the Star's correspondent makes no mention, but the solids were a mere bagatelle, as compared with the other essentials of a Tory feast, especially a feast in celebration of a party victory. Ardent Tory partisans are still congratulating one another upon the lavish provision which was made for their jollification. Some of them, it is said, are still "celebrating."

MR. HAZEN'S SHOT

It was Hon. J. Douglas Hazen, who disclosed the fact that the usual aids to good cheer were taken in plentiful measure. Speaking of the superabundance of water in Halifax Harbor—in retort to Mr. Crosby's inane witticisms, Mr. Hazen remarked that there certainly was "no lack of other liquids" on and around the festive board. Mr. Hazen's innocent remark grated on the ears of the smug politicians who had hoped that their prohibition allies would believe that nothing more insipid than pink lemonade was used to toast the Premier and his Cabinet.

MR. GRANT'S TIMELY REQUEST

Indeed, the story is told that Rev. H. R. Grant wrote, before the event, expressing the hope that no liquors would be served at the banquet, and that the ingenious managers sought to reassure him as to the unswerving and deep-rooted prohibition convictions of the Tory party by sending him a copy of the printed menu, which, of course, contained no wine or anything of the kind.

And so Mr. Hazen's chance remark was a clean give-away. It may have been indiscreet on the part, of poor Mr. Hazen, who was not schooled in the peculiar temperance principles of the Nova Scotia Tories, but it was only too true.

Indeed, Mr. Hazen might have said

that there were oceans of the "other liquids." A gentleman who was in a position to speak with authority about the provision made to stimulate the "patriotic" and "loyal" exuberance of the banqueters, made the proud boast that "it was the greatest collection of liquors ever got together in Canada for any function." So on this score, the Borden banquet established a new record.

FLOWED LIKE WATER

The exact quantity taken to the banquet hall is not disclosed, but it is known that two large truck loads were delivered at the rink on one lot, and that from start to finish, sherry, champagne, whiskey, to say nothing of beer flowed like water. The following is a careful estimate of the quantity and cost of the liquid refreshment required to stimulate the spirits of Mr. Borden's loyal followers:

A \$6,000 "BLOW OUT"

Altogether it is estimated that, in eating and drinking, the sum of six thousand dollars was expended in celebrating Mr. Borden's victory. But the cost was a matter of small concern. It was the aim to make the Borden banquet "the biggest thing of its kind ever held in Eastern Canada," and so far as the feature noted by Mr. Hazen goes, it was a magnificent success. As a "blow-out" of the genuine Tory kind it probably has never been matched in Canada.

THEIR LAST JAMBOREE

The last great gathering of Tories in the City of Halifax was on the occasion of the funeral of Sir John Thompson. The drunken orgy in which they then participated shocked all Canada. Nothing like it was ever witnessed in the Dominion. They assembled here ostensibly for the purpose of paying a last tribute to the memory of a great statesman leader whose name and fame all Canadians honor, and they so far forgot what was respectful and decent as to make the solemn and tragic event an occasion for a drunken carousal.

IN THE SAME OLD WAY

Now seventeen years later they assembled again, this time to celebrate the first victory of the Tory party since that time, and they celebrated it in the same old way. The occasion was different but the character of the celebration was the same.

A HIGH OLD TIME

Many of the out-of-town Tories made the visit to Halifax, the occasion for a big spree. The celebration started on Wednesday as soon as the visitors began to arrive in the City and it continued to the end of the week. The amount of liquor consumed during the three days cannot be calculated, but the "drunk" was the biggest thing of its kind ever seen in Halifax. The bars did a rushing business, and in some cases extra help had to be employed. During the day the visitors had things pretty much to themselves, but in the evening they were ably assisted by their city friends, the bars were packed to the doors, and the jubilant Tories had a high old time, so much so that some of them had to be carried to their rooms. A goodly number of gratis to each guest during the dinner. For those who could not be satisfied with that a reserve stock was at hand, within easy reach, which those who desired could purchase at the banquet were unable to do so—some because they could not secure a ticket and others because, when the hour arrived they were hors de combat.

POURED OUT LIKE WATER

The lovers of the flowing bowl who did attend the banquet did not suffer from thirst. In plain view of men who had been elected to the House of Assembly, pledged in favor of Provincial Prohibition, wine was opened and served. Over four hundred quarts of champagne, three hundred bottles of port and sherry and vast quantities of whiskey were consumed. A certain quantity of wine was given those who came to Halifax to attend the regular tariff. Although a very large staff of waiters and bottle openers were employed some of the celebrants could not be served with enough drinks and left the banquet hall for places where they could be more speedily served. Nova Scotia Tories will henceforth be able to remember the Borden banquet of 1911 as the time of the biggest drunk ever seen in Halifax. As Mr. Hazen, the Minister of Marine, said, "there was no lack of other liquids."

TWO MORE DIED OF POISON

Chicago, Nov. 11.—Poison found in the viscera of two more of the ten persons who have died mysteriously beneath the roof of Mrs. Louise Vermilya made more tangible today the suspicions and accusations made against the woman. At the county jail hospital, where she lies ill from attempts to take her own life, she was not informed of the new evidence the police will bring to bear in charging her with murder.

Toxicologist Walter L. Haines today communicated his report to the coroner's office. The finding was that arsenic was present in large quantities in the viscera of Conductor Richard T. Smith and of Frank Brindamy

the latter being Mrs. Vermilya's son. These two bodies were exhumed after poison had been found in the remains of Policeman Bissonette, the last of the ten to die, when relatives and friends told the coroner that the circumstances of their deaths were similar to those of Bissonette. Coroner Hoffman said he was disposed to open still more graves of those whose deaths had occurred beneath Mrs. Vermilya's roof. There were at least three others whose deaths were, he said, recent enough for poison to be apparent if they had so died. Whether he would go into these cases, he said, depended upon the advice of the state attorney.

Mrs. Vermilya was near death during the day. She is suffering from valvular heart disease.
