TRANS-MISSISSIPPI CONGRESS

Kansas, City, Nov. 13—A thousand or more delegates are in the city to attend the annual meeting of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress which will begin its sessions in Convention Hall tomorrow. Among the participants will be the governors of several States, mayors of cities, prominent railroad officials and representatives of commercial, industrial and agricultural organizations throughout the West. Many matters of importance will be considered during the meeting. The principal ones, however, will be the great reclamation projects of the West, the development of Western trade, immigration and river transportation.

FINANCIAL and COMMERCIAL**MONTREAL STOCKS.**

It may not be generally known, or probably forgotten, that sometime in March last, Mr. I. G. Ogden of the Canadian Pacific Railway staff, estimated the value of Montreal Power at 190 a share. At the same time he estimated the value of the Montreal Street Railway stock at \$300 a share. Mr. Ogden had been asked to make a special report to the old regime of the Street Railway Company, with the object of offering shareholders of both companies an alternative plan to that offered M.S.R. shareholders by the Canadian Light and Power interests, who subsequently got control. At the time of Mr. Ogden's statement that Power was worth 190, that figure looked a long way off indeed, but today's advance brings it to less than 50 points of 190, when we add the dividend of 2 per cent.

SHORT ON STEEL BROKERS FAIL

New York, Nov. 10.—Announcement was made on the Stock Exchange this morning of the failure of the firm of W. L. Stevens.

The only statement issued on the Stock Exchange regarding the failure was that the firm was unable to meet its obligations. It was said that the firm had been short on Steel and other active stocks and was caught in the recent bull market.

BANKERS AGAINST INSPECTION.

Montreal, November 11.—Very little information is leaking from the banking quarters regarding the considerations of the bankers at yesterday's annual meeting, though it is known that the bankers are holding informal meetings today and tomorrow to settle what they want in the way of Bank Revision.

It is also stated that the bankers have decided that they would prefer having the Bank Act revised at the forthcoming session of parliament rather than have their charters extended further. While no official announcement was made regarding the outcome of the discussions, it is generally believed that the Board did not recommend any drastic changes in the present Bank Act. Some changes in form of inspection will probably be recommended although bankers will certainly not recommend government inspection.

President Taft returned to Washington and will begin work on his annual message. He favors legislation specifying more clearly acts constituting violation of Sherman law. He says he expects republican victory in 1912. Reported Attorney General Wickersham has rejected International Harvester reorganization to avoid prosecution under the Sherman law.
