

READY TO SIGN THE CONTRACT FOR THE VALLEY RAILWAY

Hon. Mr. Pugsley, when asked yesterday if there were any further developments in regard to the St. John Valley Railway produced the following letters, as the latest correspondence on the sub-ect, and which he thought should be given to the public as there is such a deep interest in the Valley Road project:

Dear Sir .-- We are notifying the Premier of New Brunswick today that we have made financial arrangements for building the St. John and Guebec Railway (St. John Valley Railway) from Grand Falls to St. John We trust it will be agreeable to the Department of Railways of Canada to complete the contracts as to subsidy and lease of said road.

We understand the contracts between our company, the Provincial Government and the Dominion Government are to be signed concurrently and we trust it will be convenient for you to arrange the same at an early date.

Dear Mr. Gould :-- I am in receipt of your letter and am very glad to learn that you have made the necessary financial arrangements for building the Valley Railway from St. John to Grand Falls. I have not hard from the Provincial Government since we met in Ottawa, but whenever they are ready to execute the contract I am prepared to ask the Minister of Railways to sign the contract with your Company for the Dominion subsidy


