SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE
WILL HAVE RECORD ATTENDANCE

Public Meeting at Normal School This Evening Opens Sessions—Addresses to be Delivered—Four Hundred Teachers Attending.

The twenty-fifth annual session of the Summer School of Science for the Atlantic Provinces of Canada will open this evening at eight o'clock. The opening session will be a public meeting, to which everyone is invited. Addresses will be given by the officers of the school and by prominent educationalists. The work of the school will begin tomorrow. During the time the school is in session, July 12th to August 2nd, the mornings will be devoted to lectures and the afternoons to field and laboratory work. The Provincial Normal School and the High School Buildings are to be used by the school.

PUBLIC MEETING.

The public meeting tonight will be held in the Assembly Hall of the Normal School. S. A. Starratt, B. Sc., of Roxbury, Mass., will deliver an address on behalf of the school. A. H. McKay, D.D., of Halifax, superintendent of education for Nova Scotia, will also address the gathering, and there will be speeches by several of the directors of the school. On behalf of the City of Fredericton, His Worship Mayor Thomas will welcome the visitors. There will also be addresses by Dr. C. C. Jones, chancellor of the University of New Brunswick, and by Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education for New Brunswick.

FOUR HUNDRED ATTENDING.

Mr. J. D. Seaman of Charlottetown, secretary-treasurer of the school, who has established his office in one of the rooms of the Normal School, stated this morning that about four hundred teachers would be present to attend the Summer School, a number greater than ever before in the history of the school. A large number of the teachers are already in the city and others will arrive today. Mr. Starratt and family and the visiting teachers from Massachusetts are here, together with the members of the faculty. The school will be running smoothly tomorrow.

FIRST IN FREDERICTON.

The present session of the Summer School of Science is the first ever held in Fredericton, although the school was first established in 1887. Those in attendance from outside places have expressed great pleasure on account of the arrangements made for the school.

SPECIAL RATE.

The secretary has informed the mayor that in consequence of the generous grant awarded to the school by the City Council and citizens, any bona fide resident of Fredericton will be admitted to all lessons of the school for a nominal fee of one dollar and will be considered a full member of the school.

FOUR MONTHS
IMPRISONMENT
FOR ASSAULT

Lloyd Arnold Sentenced to That Time in Jail--Cathedral Fire Assault Case Closed.

Lloyd Arnold of Marysville this morning was found guilty of assault on Mr. J. J. F. Winslow on the morning of Tuesday of last week. Police Magistrate Marsh sentenced him to four months imprisonment in the county jail. Smith and King the other men concerned in the assault were fined twenty dollars each. Arnold according to evidence kicked Mr. Winslow in the face twice while he lay on the ground. The others struck him. The difference in the mode of assault had evidently some relation to the differences in sentences imposed.

COWARDLY ASSAULT

His Honor in sentencing Arnold alluded to the assault which had been proven against him as most cowardly of which he had heard. Arnold yesterday called a witness to prove that he was not at the scene of the assault at the time it took place. The fact was not proven however, by the evidence of either witness or prisoner.

TORY BARNSTORMERS AT
THE DOUGLAS BOOM

Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., and Mr. F. P. Robinson, secretary of the Public Utilities Commission held a political meeting at the Douglas boom house last evening. As the booms closed down last night to allow the men to take in the Orange men's excursion today there was not much of an audience to greet the M.P. He repeated the Tory stock arguments against reciprocity but neglected to say anything about the repeal of the Pike law which is a matter of great importance to those employed in the lumbering industry on the St. John River. Logs cut in Maine and manufactured in this province are now allowed entry to the United States free of duty. This will be taken away next month when the act repealing the Pike law goes into effect. Reciprocity is strongly favored by the lumbermen because under the terms of the agreement rough lumber is to be admitted to the United States free of duty.
