MONTREAL'S GREAT RECEPTION TO THE LIBERAL CHIEFTAIN

where they could hear him there. The crush was so great in some places that women had to be removed in a half fainting condition, but after the speaking commenced the crowd adjusted itself much better to the ground and everybody was comfortable. The great banners of welcome that have decked the square for the last week suddenly flared out their message in the sputtering fire of a pyrotechnic display "Canada and Laurier," "The Grand Old Man," "The People Salute Thee," "The Gladstone of Canada," "Honor to Our Chief," "The Grand Canadian," and "Canada First."

THE PREMIER'S REPLY.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in his reply to an address from the Liberal clubs of Montreal, presented by Mr. Leon Garneau, said:

"I cannot hide the emotion which I feel at the words which have been uttered and at the magnificent reception tendered me here. The eyes cannot measure and the voice cannot reach to the limits of this vast assembly. I appear before you now, having returned from England, where I represented Canada for the fourth time. Permit me to add that I am stirred by the fact that you have chosen as an interpreter of your thoughts one who has the honor to have had an immortal man of genius as his ancestor. I refer to my young friend, Leon Garneau, whose grandfather, the great Garneau, revealed our strength to ourselves."

"As you know, my mission to England was of two kinds, and primarily I went as the representative of our glorious country, Canada. And I must say that the crowning of His Majesty King George the Fifth has given me a grander conception of the greatness of the English monarch, more of the elasticity of the constitution under which we live. The King was crowned with the same ceremonies as the Norman kings, but things have vastly changed. Formerly two classes, the nobility and the clergy, alone were represented. Later the middle classes were admitted, but in this year and in the twentieth century the working classes were admitted. (Applause.) It will be a historic fact that in the twentieth century the working class was admitted to the Abbey, for it is to be remarked that only in the nineteenth century the working class was recognized as a part of society. But now there is a new nobility in society—the nobility of labor, who for the first time in English history have been ranked with the clergy and nobility."

"This shows—does it not—that the English monarchial system can lend itself to all developments, and with truth it can be said that under that system there has been for some time more liberty than under any republic."

"But this is not so important as that other mission, which I had to fulfil with Mr. Brodeur and Sir Frederick Borden. I refer to the Imperial Conference. I will teach you nothing new if I say that two months ago there was much doubt in the public mind as to how we should emerge from that conference. People were saying that Laurier would find a shoal on which he would be shipwrecked. But if even my friends, or my adversaries, had any doubt as to the outcome, I had none at all. You, in the address presented, have been good enough to refer to the part I played in that conference. But there was nothing new or surprising in the policy enunciated there, which was only the supreme expression of a policy I have declared and held since I became leader of the government."

Twenty-three years ago I was elected leader of the Liberal party, and I have often repeated what I now repeat, that I was not ambitious for the post. I knew the difficulties and I hesitated. I knew I represented a minority, with the majority Anglo-Saxon. But I accepted, and my colleagues, English and Protestant, offered it. I accepted it because I considered it was the best way of showing to the rest of this continent the equality of race and religion as it existed here. The principle, as it stood twenty-three years ago, as a vindication of our rights as British subjects, I still maintain today. This guided me and I can place my conduct during all those years for public examination and I defy any one to say that I swerved from my accepted path."

"Our relations with the Mother Country were discussed anew at the conference, the sovereignty of the British crown and the autonomy of Canada, and the principle was recognized that each nation should govern according to the public opinion within that nation. An Imperial Council was proposed. But I did not wish it. It was advanced that in that council the representatives from the different quarters of the globe should decide upon questions like the navy and that all power should rest in that council. I did not wish that. I proposed, and what I think you will approve, that all responsibility for each colony should rest with that colony. Those are the relations I wish to see exist."

Cobalt, Ont., July 13.—George Green, who was in South Porcupine when the fire struck that town, and was also in the same canoe from which Mr. Moore was drowned, said he would not be surprised if there were 500 deaths. To add to the terror of the situation besides the fire there were scores of horses, cattle and dogs running wild through the towns and their scorched bodies are lining the streets, with the bodies of men and women.

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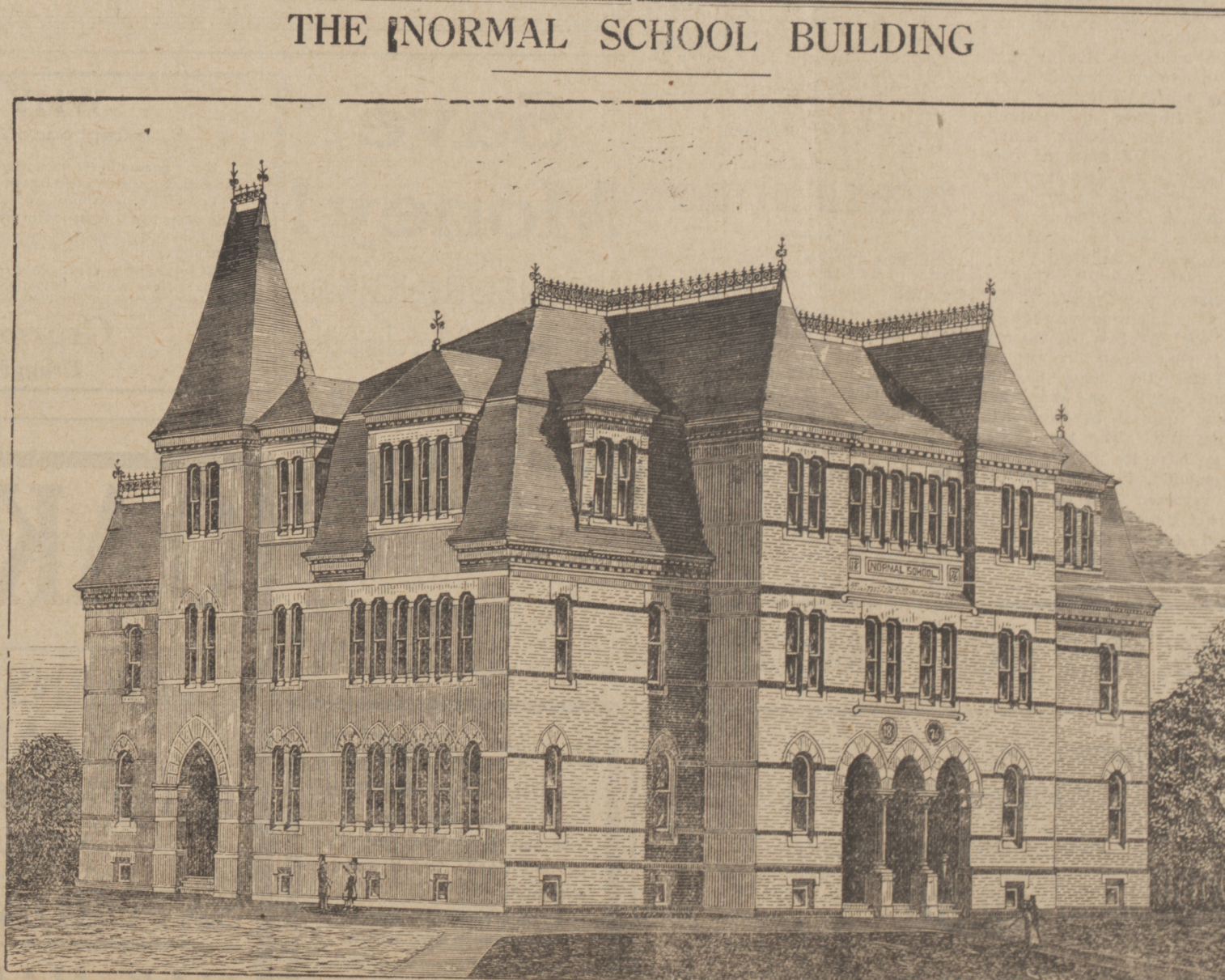
