Montreal, June 29.—That Montreal will have a population of more than a million souls in twenty years' time and that the city will then have grown almost out of recognition, is the opinion of Lieut. Governor Tweedie, of New Brunswick, who is staying at the Windsor.

Caught in the rotunda of the hotel, His Honor explained that his visit was a purely personal one and that tonight would see him starting for home.

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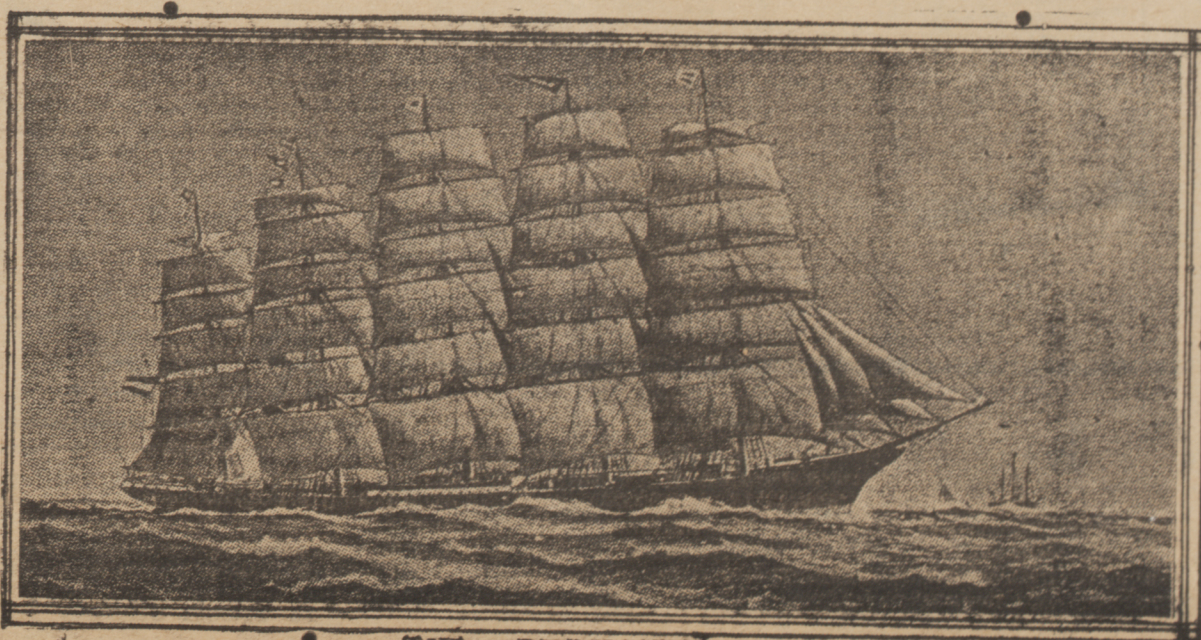
HENWOOD FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER
