28TH DRAGOONS
LEAVE FOR CAMP
TOMORROW MORNING

Advance Party Left Today--Q. M. Sgt. Pitt Has Had Extensive Experience in Imperial Army.

The advance party of the 28th New Brunswick Dragoons left for Sussex on the 9.45 C.P.R. train this morning to draw stores and prepare for the regiment which will march into camp tomorrow. The party was under the command of Q. M. Sgt. Pitt and was composed of four men and Sgt. Allen of "C" squadron. Advance parties from other squadrons were picked up as various points on the line between this city and Sussex. Capt. H. M. Hopper, quartermaster, took command of the party at St. John. Q. M. Sgt. Pitt has had a wide experience in the British Imperial forces. He has both King's and Queen's medals for the South African war, the long service medal, distinguished service medal and good conduct medal.

ORDERS ISSUED.

Major F. P. Day, commanding "C" Squadron, 18th N. B. Dragoons, has issued the following orders for the guidance of his men going to camp:

SADDLERY.

NO OFFICERS' MESS.

The 28th Dragoons will have no officers' mess at this camp, but will dine with the officers of the 8th Hussars. A sergeants' mess has been organized by the 28th however, and will be in operation from the beginning of camp. The lines of the new cavalry regiment will be north of the infantry lines and on the ground occupied in former years by the Army Medical Corps, Corps of Guides and Engineers. The ground slopes to the north and is excellently situated.

JOHN A. STILES
PROFESSOR OF CIVIL
ENGINEERING AT U.N.B.

Appointment Announced Today by Chancellor Jones--Young Man of Experience--From Toronto University

Dr. C. C. Jones, chancellor of the University of New Brunswick, announced this morning that John A. Stiles, E.E., had been appointed professor of Civil Engineering and Dean of the School of Civil Engineering at the U.N.B., succeeding Prof. E. A. Stone, who resigned some weeks ago and has since gone to Vancouver, where he will follow his profession.

The new member of the U.N.B. faculty comes to the provincial university highly recommended and will materially aid in retaining for the U.N.B. School of Applied Science the reputation which it deservedly possesses. Prof. Stiles is a graduate of Toronto University, at which institution he pursued a distinguished course. For the past three years he has occupied the position of demonstrator on the staff of the Science School of Toronto University. Dr. Falconer, head of that university, has recommended him to the U.N.B. Senate in the highest terms.

COMING IN AUGUST.

Prof. Stiles is a young man, being thirty-four years of age, but has had wide experience. He will assume his duties at the U.N.B. about the middle of August, when he will take charge of the regular engineering camp, which will begin at that time on account of the college year beginning a fortnight earlier than usual.

BRITISH JOURNALIST
IMPRESSED BY CONDI-
TIONS IN PROVINCE

Urges More Publicity--Fredericton Has Numerous Advantages He Says--Touring New Brunswick.

Mr. J. R. Cogger, special commissioner of "Canada," a publication issued in London, England, in the interests of the Dominion was in the city Saturday returning to St. John in the evening. Mr. Cogger has visited all the important towns of Nova Scotia and is paying similar visits in this province. Mr. Cogger was interviewed by a representative of the Mail and stated that he was very favorably impressed with what he had seen in the province and in Fredericton and stated that both had great possibilities which could be realized by concerted and determined efforts on the part of their citizens. Publicity he said was the most effective means advancement and would do much toward dispelling the dense ignorance with regard to the eastern provinces of Canada which exists in the minds of the majority of the people of Great Britain.

Sydney, N. S., he cited as an example of what could be achieved by advertising. The determined efforts of the people of the town had attracted great industries there and had trebled the population in ten years.

FREDERICTON'S CHANCE

"Fredericton," said Mr. Cogger, "is the capital of the province undoubtedly has a great commercial future before it. The great waterway, the St. John River should be better known than it is. So should also the University of New Brunswick. In fact all of the city's educational advantages, should be advertised. It is quite practicable to attract students from the Old Country, who may wish to settle in Canada to the U. N. B. to complete their courses of instruction. A university course in Great Britain is costly, at least two or three times as much as in Canada.

TIDE IS CHANGING

Continuing Mr. Cogger said that the tide of immigration which had set so strongly toward the Canadian west showed signs of turning toward the East.
