MR. BORDEN IS YOKED UP WITH THIS MAN

Mr. Bourassa is the man the Conservatives rely on to save the Empire by taking a majority out of Quebec.

What did Mr. Bourassa say about Sir Wilfrid Laurier's imperialism? Here it is in a signed letter to Le Devoir, the paper the Conservatives are freely circulating in Quebec province. Mr. Bourassa wrote it in July last:

"Mr. Laurier did not stop at the violation of the Canadian Constitution, from his own admission, by taking, without authorization, the money of the Canadian people to arm the Canadian troops and to have Canada participate in this infamous war (South African war); his cynicism carried him to the point of proclaiming—in the full light of parliament—that this war was the most just that England had ever carried on. No responsible statesmen, not even Mr. Chamberlain, had ever dared to go so far.

"Yes, the Nester of the Imperial Conference, the Canadian Washington, found it right and good that 50,000 men should be massacred, millions of farms to be burnt and ravaged, peaceful homes to be pillaged, women to be outraged and little children to be shut up in pestilential camps, where they died like flies.

"English and Afrikaner soldiers who fell on the field for the glory of Chamberlain, women who died from shame or misery for the glorification of Laurier, children whose entrails have dried up in the concentration camps for the honor of the Empire! What do you think of the man?"

LORD MOUNT STEPHEN FAVORS RECIPROCITY

London, Sept. 18.—Lord Mount Stephen, one of the founders of the Canadian Pacific Railway, in a message to the Belfast 'Telegraph,' says reciprocity between Canada and the United States will be a good thing for both countries and do no harm to Great Britain. The talk of it leading to the annexation of Canada to the United States, he says is utter nonsense.

FOR THE WORKING MAN

"Where does the Working Man get His?" is the question often asked. Much has been said and written by the Liberals and Conservatives. The Liberals are trying to show the farmers where Reciprocity will be a great benefit and the Conservatives on the other hand, are trying to show that it means destruction and in the end annexation.

There has been some difficulty in showing how, if the Farmer "gets his" the Working Man gets his, too. Every Working Man who has a family to support and pay rent and taxes will naturally ask "What is Reciprocity going to do for me?"

He will listen to arguments that the Farmers' prosperity is everybody else's downfall. He is inclined to distrust the farmers' willingness to keep the home prices down because his export surplus of natural products will bring him a lot of easy money from abroad. He is not sure that the Farmer has not more than evenly divided the forty per cent. of increased cost of living in the last ten years with the commission-men dairy-men, beef- and pork-packers and the canners trust or combine whose monopoly Reciprocity promises to break up. His past experience is that the producer has always had a tendency to apply reductions in duty to his own rather than for the consumers' benefit. The answer to the problem is this:

The Working Man will not be at the mercy of either food-producer or middleman. The same argument that gives the Farmer two markets gives the Working Man that check on greed, namely competition.

The Working Man benefits to the extent of the removed duties on Southern States fruit and vegetables that he eats in winter and spring. The Farmer who cannot grow for the early market on account of our for his superior northern products he gets in the United States market climate benefits by the higher prices when they are in season and when that market is exhausted the Working Man Catches him and the United States farmer, too, on the come back. There are about twenty-five elements of diet which come into Canada for nothing and twenty-five more on reduced duties. Now the Working Man can see that he can choose from those half-hundred articles which comprise his daily food which can be produced under the circumstances of competition that helps him who buys and does not hurt him who sells. The Working Man gets his three cheaper meals a day. The British Preference gives him cheaper woollens and Reciprocity will give him his three square meals cheaper.

Mr. Working Man, vote for Reciprocity!

LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE

"Let well enough alone" is one of the opposition cries in this campaign.

Well, the premiership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been "well enough" in Canada for fifteen years.

It has been "well enough to bring Canada from the position of an unregarded colony into that of one of the great trading nations of the world.

THE REAL TRAITOR.

"So long as Canada remains a part of the British Empire, Canada's position geographically is such that she must either be a hostage or a link of union between Great Britain and the United States. I speak as great English statesmen would speak were they here, as Grey or Asquith or Balfour would speak, when I tell you that as matters now stand in Europe the man of English birth and English lineage who endeavors to sow the seeds of discord or promote ill-feeling between England and the United States is of all living men the worst traitor to the British Empire and to the British race."—Sir Richard Cartwright.

ELECTORS READ THIS

In 1851 Fredericton had a population of 4,450, in 1861 it had grown to 5,652, and in 1871 to 6,006. The increase during the twenty years, when there was reciprocity with the United States was 1556. From 1871 to 1891 when there was no reciprocity Fredericton's population increased from 6,006 to 6,502, or just 496 souls. Electors do you want Reciprocity again. Then vote for Ather-ton.

When confronted by Mr. Heyd with the record of his opposition to the British tariff law of 1897, under which goods imported from the Motherland pay from a quarter to a third less in duties than similar goods from foreign countries, Mr. W. F. Maclean cried:

"I'd do it again. Preference for preference is my plan."

So: This ultra-loyalist who makes a special appeal to the British-born would wipe away the British preference and re-enact it only when the people of Great Britain consent to the taxation of their food. They have voted three times against food taxes which would greatly increase the misery of the poor, but Mr. W. F. Maclean stands upon a tariff platform of no tariff favors to Britain till she consents to tax her people's food.

Here's a spectacle for the British-born and for loyal Canadians who want to give Britain the best of it in trade. In fifteen years from 1882 to 1896, under Conservative rule the imports of British goods into Canada decreased from fifty million dollars a year to thirty-two millions. In the fifteen years since the adoption of Fielding's British preference the imports of British goods have increased from twenty-nine millions in 1897 to a hundred and nine millions in 1911.

The British preference that has aided materially in bringing about this result Mr. Maclean would smash unless he could get "preference for preference." The Liberal trade policy is founded on British preference, which is not affected by the reciprocity agreement.

Vote for Laurier, the British Preference, and untaxed food on both sides of the Atlantic.

UNDER TORY RULE.

"Under the Conservative regime people were flying from Canada as from a plague-stricken country. That 1891 census—and he reiterated the gravest doubts that the records were truly kept—showed an increase of only 30 souls in New Brunswick, and of but 1-5 of 1 per cent. in Nova Scotia. Canadian Pacific was worth fifty cents in the dollar in 1896, and the value of the whole common stock issue was but \$32,000,000; today it was valued at \$425,000,000.—Sir Richard Cartwright at Toronto.
