BIG ATTENDANCE
AT EXHIBITION
IN SPITE OF RAIN

Turnstiles Recorded 4,465 Yesterday Judging of Cattle and Horses Going on Today

The attendance at the Fredericton Exhibition yesterday in spite of rain was 4,465, a figure which surpassed the expectation of the management. was only about six hundred less than that for attendance on the corresponding day of the 1909 fair. With the weather changed today for the better the largest attendance of the fair is expected. The judging of cattle and horses is being continued today. The awards in dairy products and part of the cattle section are published today.

OUTDOOR ATTRACTIONS

The Aeroplane Ladies gave their first performance last evening and greatly delighted a vast crowd of spectators. On Friday and Saturday there will be an entire change of program in the Amusement Hall entertainment.

JUVENILE THIEVES
WERE OPERATING
AT FAIR GROUNDS

Seventeen Small Birds and Cages Stolen from Concession Holder—Pickpockets Left City

City Marshal Roberts who is acting as chief of the Exhibition special police arrested two young boys who during the past two years have made a most unenviable reputation for themselves for small thefts and similar offences. The most recent charge is the theft of seventeen little birds and the wooden cages in which they were kept. The birds and cages are given, as prizes at one of the Wheels-of-fortune which is situated with other outside attractions on the eastern side of the Main Building. The birds were kept in a tent at the rear of the concession. On Monday night the two boys entered the tent and stole the birds.

The young fellows were very bold concerning the theft and attempted to sell the stolen property on the Exhibition Grounds. On being questioned by the police they said they were selling the birds for the men who were running the Wheel-of-Fortune. On this story being proven false the youngsters confessed to the theft.

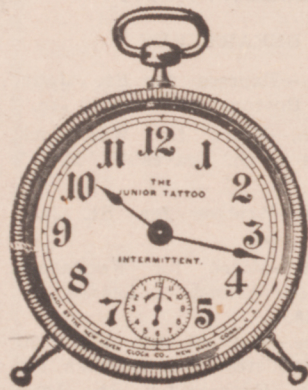
PICKETPOCKETS ORDERED OUT

The men were ordered to go out of town and left on the next train.

EIGHT THOUSAND
ELECTORS QUALIFIED TO VOTE

Early Voting Urged upon all Electors --1,842 Voters Qualified to Cast Ballots in City

The Dominion General Elections take place tomorrow, the polls opening at 9 a.m. and closing at 5 p.m. It is expected that the vote polled will be the largest ever recorded in the County of York, as both parties are making every effort to bring every possible elector to the polls. The list of eligible voters in York County contains 8,165 names, the largest number ever put on an electoral list in the constituency. In 1908 when the last general election was held, the list for York County contained 7,880 names. The number of votes cast in that election was 6,449, with 32 ballots rejected.

EARLY VOTING NECESSARY.

The necessity of casting ballots early in the day is impressed on all electors, as toward the close of polling time the booths are apt to be crowded.

In Fredericton the qualified voters number 1,842. Of that number 1,000 are to vote at the City Hall and 842 at the Court House.

An alarm from Box 24 called the fire department out at 5.30 this morning for a fire in the kitchen of the City Hotel, Queen Street West. The fire originated in an over-heated range. 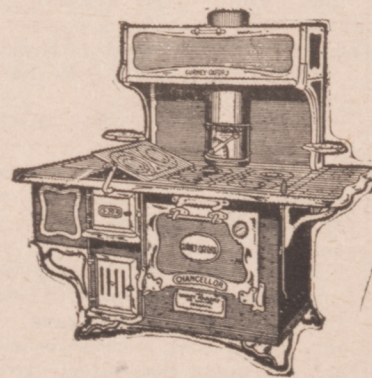
