## MR. J. BRUCE ISMAY ON TITANIC DISASTER

London, June 4—Lord Mersey, the head of the court which is inquiring into the disaster to the White Star liner Titanic, repeated the question whether the witness thought the captain justified in his action, adding: "At either day or night."

Ismay replied in the affirmative. Ismay was the star witness when the investigation was resumed today. He told the court that the chief engineer had arranged before the steamer left Queenstown for New York that the weather being favorable on either Monday or Tuesday, the vessel would be driven at full speed for a few hours.

Attorney General Sir Rufus Isaacs, who was examining the president of the International Mercantile Marine Company, asked if they would necessitate additional boilers being lighted. Ismay said that it would. The attorney general pointed out that Fireman Barrett of the Titanic had testified that additional boilers were lighted on Sunday morning.

Ismay also said that a wireless despatch which Captain Smith had handed him on Sunday had indicated to him that the Titanic would reach the ice region on Sunday morning. The collision occurred shortly before midnight Sunday night.

The witness said that there was nothing in their mail contracts to compel the company's vessels to steam at the rate they usually did in crossing the Atlantic, and that there was no penalty for delays. Ismay insisted that he had nothing to do with the navigation of the ship, but Sir Rufus pressed him regarding the speed of the Titanic and the warnings of ice in her path which they received.

The witness's answers were not always clear, which led Lord Mersey to remark sharply: "Answer the questions."

The attorney general also complained that the witness was not frank. The attorney for the White Star protested that Sir Rufus' remark to this effect was unwarranted.

Ismay said that he had not attached importance to the captain's action in handing him the message from the steamer Baltic regarding the ice, and that he had not had any conversation with any officer with respect to the message.

"Why did the captain hand it to you?" asked the attorney general. "For my information," was the reply.

Examined as to the speed of the vessel with a view to show that he had something to do with it, Ismay persisted that he had spoken to no one about the speed after his conversation with the chief engineer at Queenstown. He admitted that the vessel had not been slowed down after the warnings of ice had been received and said that he had not expected the captain to slow down so long as there was nothing to prevent the men seeing the ice.

Sir Rufus asked: "What was the use of going at full speed through the ice at midnight?"

Ismay—"I suppose they wanted to get out of the ice. They would not want to wait and take a change of fog coming down. They were justified on a clear night in going through as quickly as possible and even might have increased the speed to get out of the ice fields."

## WANT RECIPROCITY PACT REPEALED

Washington, May 31—Responsibility for Canadian Reciprocity was debated in the House today during consideration of the Military Academy Appropriation Bill. Representative Shackelford of Missouri (Dem.) asserted that the Reciprocity Bill, a House Metal Tariff Revision Bill, by repeal of which was placed on the Senate, was the work of President Taft and a "former President."

Representative Price, of Illinois, (Rep.) retorted that the Democratic speaker of the House was a bed fellow of President Taft on the Reciprocity question.

Mr. Price insisted that the people would hold the Democrats responsible, Representative Lloyd backed Mr. Shackelford in reiterating that President Taft fathered the measure upon the advice of an ex-President.

Representative Stearnson of Minnesota presented a petition signed by 31,079 "farmers (who farm)" asked for the repeal of the Reciprocity Bill lest Canada at some time accept its terms. Representative Good, of Iowa suggested it be passed over to "the Democratic members to sign."

"Better send it to President Taft," suggested Representative Lobeck of Nebraska.

Representative Gudgeon of North Carolina wanted to know if the petition was signed "before or after Col. Roosevelt changed his mind."

Mr. Stearnson said he was very proud Col. Roosevelt had changed his mind and only wished the Democrats would do likewise.

## MATTER OF FIRE-STATION SITE WAS SENT BACK

He moved in amendment, seconded by Ald. Burchill, that the matter be referred back to the Fire Committee to select another site.

ALD. GUTHRIE.

Ald. Guthrie stated that on account of the public opposition to the proposal he would have to vote that the matter be referred back to the Fire Committee.

Ald. Calder was of a similar opinion. Dr. T. C. Allen had given the opinion that the city could be compelled to purchase the Hill property and return it to the Burying Ground, as the property was held by it in trust from Christchurch Parish. Mr. A. J. Gregory, on the other hand, had given the opinion that Barton had obtained possession from the Hill estate by legal purchase. He advised delay in action until the aspect of the case could be definitely decided.

### REFERRED BACK TO COMMITTEE

Ald. Cruikshank stated he was perfectly willing to wait some days although of the opinion that the title to the land was sound. He withdrew his motion.

Ald. Wilkinson's amendment became the original motion.

The City Clerk stated that in 1886, when the act was passed, the city on legal advice, had stopped ejectment proceedings with regard to the Hill property showing that at that time it was considered that the negligence was not on the part of the city but on the part of the church.

In amendment Ald. Cruikshank moved that the matter be referred back to the Fire Committee to report again. The amendment was carried, Ald. Wilkinson and Ald. Burchill opposing.

### REMOVAL OF TREES.

Ald. Moore brought up the matter of removing unnecessary trees from the streets. He felt that there were places where the trees could well be thinned out. He thought the Local Improvement Association should co-operate in the matter.

He was informed that the Roads and Streets Committee by resolution, had power to act in the matter.

### CIVIC ENTERTAINMENT.

Ald. Cruikshank brought up the matter of the civic entertainment of the British Manufacturers' Party, which will visit Fredericton on the 11th. The party he said, would be here from 2 p.m. until 8 p.m. He thought the City Council, the Board of Trade and the provincial government might co-operate in this. An auto-ride about the city and vicinity had been suggested. A committee might well be appointed. He asked for an expression of opinion.

On his motion a committee of three was appointed to act with the mayor in the matter. The three aldermen are Cruikshank, Calder and Guthrie.

### IOWA ELKS IN SESSION




