### YORK LIBERALS WILL FIGHT

At a large and representative gathering of the Liberals of York called yesterday to confer with the provincial leader, Mr. A. B. Copp, it was decided to hold a convention of the supporters of the party in this city on the coming Saturday afternoon to nominate candidates for the House of Assembly. There was only one opinion expressed at the meeting and that was that the dignity, honor and best interests of this old metropolitan constituency imperatively demand that a ticket composed of the strongest men available be placed in the field to oppose the nominees of the government now appealing for re-election. There is nothing in the record of the Flemming administration to commend it to the electorate of York County. It went into power four years ago pledged to the strictest economy and it has kept the pledge by increasing the annual expenditure by \$440,000 and by adding one million dollars to the public debt. It promised to give the people good roads but everybody who knows anything knows that notwithstanding a larger revenue and increased taxation not in a quarter of a century have the roads of the province been in such a damnable condition as they are today. The much vaunted highway act has been a success in so far as it has enabled an army of hungry officials to feed at the public trough but in all other respects it has been a dead failure.

The government solemnly promised to keep the ordinary revenue of the province within the ordinary income but it is a well known fact that last year in spite of the largest revenue in the history of the province, there was a deficit of \$56,000 and the people are now paying interest on that large sum.

Not only has the government been guilty of the wildest extravagance, but its every administrative act has been stamped by glaring incompetency. Conditions were bad enough when Hon. J. D. Hazen was at the head of the administration, but they are infinitely worse today, with Hon. J. Kidd Flemming at the helm. Honey-combed by jealousies and intrigues among its members the government is poorly equipped for administering the affairs of this province in a prudent and businesslike manner. Under their administration party government so far as this province is concerned has developed into a mere scramble for the loaves and fishes, and with such a condition of affairs existing it is only natural that the interests of the country should suffer.

So far as the members for York are concerned, it is hardly necessary to tell the intelligent people of this county that they have utterly failed to make good. They began their term four years ago with a fierce fight for office which resulted disastrously for Mr. Pinder, the senior member who was generally supposed to have the strongest claim for recognition. They have ever since been at one another's throats over patronage matters, and have succeeded in making the county a subject for jest and reproach. They have promoted their own interests and neglected the interests of the county. They have shown themselves to be nothing more than swashbuckling politicians who are in public life merely for the sake of what they can get out of it for themselves and their henchmen. If the people of York County are alive to their best interests they will, on June 20th elect these men to remain at home, and send to the Legislature in their places a team which will work in harmony for the common good.

### SUNBURY IN LINE

Both political parties held conventions in Sunbury yesterday and selected candidates for the Local Legislature. The Liberals chose as their standard bearers Messrs. Arnold R. Miles of Mauderville, and Milton Smith of Blissville, while the Conservatives re-nominated Messrs. Geo. A. Perley of Mauderville, and Parker Glasier of Lincoln.

The Liberals have in Messrs. Miles and Smith two most popular and capable men who are certain to give a good account of themselves. Mr. Miles has long been one of the Liberal stalwarts of the county; he is a gentleman of high intelligence, is well informed on public affairs, has a wide acquaintance and is popular with all classes of the people. He comes of good old loyalist stock and having resided in Sunbury County all his life he thoroughly understands the needs of the county. The Mail speaks a simple truth when it says that there is not in the whole county of Sunbury a finer type of man than Mr. A. R. Miles. If all those for whom he has performed acts of kindness cast their ballots for him on June 20th, he will surely be elected at the head of the poll.

The Liberals of Sunbury were singularly fortunate in securing as a running mate for Miles, Mr. Milton A. Smith. He is one of the successful young farmers of the county and is a young man of tireless energy who will go into the fight with his coat off. Being the only candidate from the western end of the county or "the branches" as it is called, Mr. Smith can be counted on to take a big vote out of that section.

Sunbury in the late Hon. A. G. Blair's time, used to send Liberals to the Legislature, but it has been wandering in the wilderness of Toryism for twelve years. Mr. Parker Glasier has been one of its representatives during that period, and if the electors are not tired of him, they certainly should be. He is the tamest kind of a tame follower of the government and apart from smoking a corn-cob pipe and drawing his sessional indemnity he has taken little or no part in the deliberations of the Legislature or its various committees. As a public man he has been a distinct failure and the electors of Sunbury, if they consult their own interests, will do well to turn this old war horse out to grass for a time.

A drop from Hon. J. D. Hazen, the late member, to Mr. George A. Perley, his successor, is a plunge from the sublime to the ridiculous. Mr. Perley is a big man physically but he is small in all other respects. He has been a member of the House for one session and succeeded in making himself ridiculous in the eyes of friends and opponents alike. The only tangible claim that he has for the support of the electors of Sunbury is his action in kicking over the traces during his first and only session in the House. He explained in justification of his conduct that he had been "treated worse than a colored man" by the government. The electors of Sunbury should resent the treatment accorded their chosen representative by punishing the government responsible for it. In other words, they should keep Mr. Perley at home and thus prevent him from being exposed to further indignities.

The Province of New Brunswick will have a new and progressive government after June 20th and the historic old County of Sunbury should be in line with it.

St. John Times: It is not stated that the Lewisville man who has raised a three-legged calf has been a close student of the Flemming-Landry agricultural policy but his herd never produced a three-legged calf while the old government were in power. It is fair to assume that the credit belongs to the new agricultural policy, of which Hon. Dr. Landry is so very proud. This is economy. This is saving one leg in four, and illustrates the importance of having a gentleman skilled in science and anatomy at the head of the department. The three-legged calf it is announced will be a feature of the Old Home Week celebration. What returned wanderer, beholding this result of an enlightened agricultural policy in his native province could ever think of going away again?

There is one pleasant feature of this campaign—the worrying is all being done by Tory patronage dispensers and office holders.

Messrs. G. E. King and Isaac W. Carpenter will carry the standard for the Liberals of Queens at the approaching election. It is an exceptionally strong combination and stands to win a great victory. Mr. King who is a son of the veteran senator of that name, is one of the largest lumber operators in the county and wields a potent influence in his home parish. Mr. Carpenter who has had legislative experience, is a practical farmer and a vigorous platform speaker. From this distance it looks as if Messrs. Woods and Slipp were due to retire from public life on June 20th.

The local hack organ in its issue of last evening referring to the Sunbury Liberal convention said: "This convention was to have been held at Oromocto but at the request of Col. H. H. McLean and Senator King the meeting has been postponed until this evening." This is a case where the hack organ did not know it all. The convention was held in the afternoon and the names of the candidates were announced in last evening's Mail. Col. McLean and Senator King came to the city by auto and arrived here before six o'clock.

We were told by members of the Local Government a few years ago that they had arranged to cooperate with the Canadian Pacific Railway Company in a colossal scheme for advertising and developing New Brunswick. Outside of a little two cent booklet which the big corporation got out, what has been accomplished. Let some of the apologists of the Flemming administration answer this question.

If the bluff and bluster of the Tory candidates at the recent convention in York means anything it means that a contest is something they do not want at the present time. They are afraid it will expose their weakness.
