## LIBERALS OF SOUTHAMPTON READY FOR THE FIGHT

Southampton, June 3—The annual meeting of the Liberal General Committee of Southampton Front was marked on Saturday evening by circumstances of more than usual interest.

A few minutes before none o'clock the President Mr. George S. Ingraham took the chair and called the meeting to order. Mr. J. H. Freeman was appointed secretary pro tem. After briefly explaining the object of the meeting the President declared the first business to be the election of officers for the ensuing year.

Mr. Geo. S. Ingraham and Mr. F. C. Brown were re-elected president and secretary respectively.

Mr. Wendall Phillips of Greenbush, Mr. Allen Fox of Lower Southampton and Mr. G. A. Stairs of Campbell Settlement were then elected vice-presidents, and the president, secretary, Wendall Phillips, William Cronkite of Lower Southampton and Weyman Wright of Lower Southampton, members of the executive.

### A ROUND OF SPEECHES

Two gentlemen, Messrs Geo. F. Burden, ex-M.P.P. and Mr. Norris Tompkins of Green Bush were present the evening before at the Great Liberal Meeting in the Gibson Opera House, Woodstock, and they gave a very interesting account of what took place at the gathering Mr. Tompkins said: "The only trouble with the York Liberals is that THEY'VE GONE TO SLEEP; but surely when the Tories themselves admit a deficit of \$56,000 with nearly double the revenue the old government had, when the roads are bad enough to shake the teeth out of your head. They have added \$1,000,000 to the debt of our little province and are now in the act of handing us over body, toots and soul to a trait corporation, they will wake up and assert their rights like men." Said he: "If we had the organization our Liberal friends in Carleton have and their fighting spirit WE COULD WIN YORK."

Mr. Burden told the committee how Mr. Richard Wheeler of Bath, Car. Co., A LIFE LONG CONSERVATIVE with fifteen other Conservatives of the same place were going to vote against these "No Tender" pledge breakers on the 20th inst. He said Mr. Wheeler said at the public meeting in Woodstock "he had never cast a Liberal vote in his life; but, that if we left this GANG OF ADVENTURERS—now the tools of the C.P.R. and the Yankees in office another four years there would be nothing left but BANKRUPTCY and DIRECT TAXATION!"

Another member of the committee said he saw by the 1910 Auditor's report that a resident of Upper Southampton had done work on Grier's Creek bridge of that place to the amount of \$5.25 and that Superintendent Logan was paid \$19.00 to inspect it. "If we had even this \$19.00 it would put a railing on the Farnham bridge that is hanging down by one end and is a menace to the travelling public. But now Mr. Logan's name had been changed by this wonderful combination to Mr. Various Persons and the public can go hang, and break their wagon or their neck or both."

After several other members of the committee had spoken of matters in connection with the present campaign Mr. Burden rose and said he had been telephoned in the afternoon to be present at the committee's meeting and to perform a most pleasant duty. Then in the most felicitous terms, he presented on behalf of the General Committee of Southampton Front a beautiful march-pipe to President Geo. S. Ingraham as a slight token of respect and esteem for that gentleman's faithful and unselfish service to the great Liberal party. Mr. Ingraham was taken completely by surprise and was only able to say "Thank you." The large committee instantly rose and sang "For he's a Jolly Good Fellow."

At eleven o'clock an oyster supper was sent to the hall by Mr. and Mrs. N. W. Brown, who live next door. A hearty vote of thanks was presented to the thoughtful donors by the president and was briefly replied to by Mr. Brown. After ample justice had been done to the luncheon, the committee adjourned to meet at the call of the president. It is needless to say that they are ready for the fight and will fight win or lose.

### EXHIBITION OF BRITISH SILKS

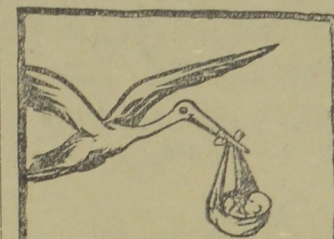
London, June 5—The first public exhibition ever held in connection with the silk industries of the United Kingdom was opened today at the Princess' Skating Rink. The exhibition is held under the auspices of the British Silk Association, which was founded twenty-five years ago by a body of representative women, including several members of the royal family, who were desirous of encouraging and stimulating the silk industry as much as lay within their power.

Few British manufactures have prospered more than the making of silk, although the industry does not occupy the important place that it did years ago. Silk was manufactured in England during the reign of James I. who took great interest in the welfare of the industry, but it was not until 1685 when the revocation of the edict of Nantes sent a stream of persecuted Huguenots into England, that the trade reached the zenith of its prosperity and importance. Among these refugees were many skilled weavers and they established themselves in Spitalfields, where they set up looms in their own homes. For a century and a half this colony was the centre of the silk trade in England, after which period the industry gradually declined until it can no longer be looked upon as a national asset. Of late years the output has been limited, though the higher grades of British silks are still looked upon as the best in the world.
