DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence.

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem.

Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.

GRAND LODGE I.O.G.T. TO BE ASKED TO SUPPORT DRASTIC AMENDMENTS

Ald. H. H. Stuart of Newcastle was in town yesterday en route to the I.O.G.T. Grand Lodge which meets this afternoon at Plaster Rock. On behalf of the Kent-Northumberland District Division Sons of Temperance Mr. Stuart will request the Grand Lodge to co-operate with the North Shore Sons of Temperance in demanding from the Dominion and provincial governments the following amendments to the Canada Temperance Act and the Provincial License Law:—

1.—From the Dominion Government:
(a) That no liquor shall be imported into a district under the Canada Temperance Act by private individuals, all liquors required for legal purposes to be purchased from vendors appointed by the said Government and residing within said district;

(b) That all persons arrested for drunkenness be compelled to tell where and from whom they obtained their liquor, imprisonment being the penalty for those refusing to tell;

(c) That each government Vendor of alcoholic liquors be required to actually publish a complete statement of business done by him during the year.

(d) That the privilege of obtaining prescriptions for liquor from Medical men residing outside of district under Canada Temperance Act be done away with, the only exception to be the case in which the medical man nearest the patient resides in an adjoining municipality.

2.—From the Government of New Brunswick.

(a) To prohibit the importation of alcoholic liquors by any person or persons into any non-license district in said province;

(b) That all persons arrested for drunkenness whether in license or non-license districts be compelled to tell where and from whom they obtained their liquor, imprisonment to be the penalty for those refusing to tell.

3.—From both governments such improvements in the methods of enforcing liquor laws as will bring the Canada Temperance Act and New Brunswick License Law to as effective a standard as the Prohibiting Law of Nova Scotia, viz:

"The finding of liquor on any premises to be, until contrary is proved deemed evidence of intent to sell, although no bar room appliances may be present; law officers to have power to search for and seize liquor without warrant; the finding of liquor concealed or falsely labelled to be prima facie evidence of intent to violate the law; prosecutions for second offence to immediately follow first conviction, and no appeal from decisions of Stipendiary Magistrates"


COLORADO LABOR MEN MEET
