TODD AND RECIPROCITY WILL WIN CHARLOTTE

(Continued from page one)

felt that he was needed, and he had always responded to the call of party service. They had won the victory, bringing Charlotte County into line with the government after thirty years of opposition.

He came before the people again and they would not deny that the county had been greatly helped and improved by many public works during the last three years. 'As a candidate he had but one thought and one idea and that was to give the county the service it desired at Ottawa.

Any mistakes which I have made, have been of the mind, not of the heart, and I can assure you that if I am returned to power the years of progress and gratification of the country will continue with the greatly increased revenue. He felt sure that more could be done than ever before, and with the heart of their noble and gifted guest, firmly set on the county getting its just dues, he could promise Charlotte the strongest support which the county had ever received in parliament. (Cheers.)

Mr. Todd passed on to speak on the prospects of the Liberal party, which, he said, were the brightest with which a party ever faced an election. From the time Sir Wilfrid Laurier came into power there had been a decided change for the better in the affairs of Canada. With a tariff for revenue only and a progressive policy the trade had jumped from about \$236,000,000 to nearly \$800,000,000 in 1910.

HON. MR. PUGSLEY

Hon. William Pugsley was received with cheers. He spoke briefly at the afternoon meeting, first expressing great pleasure that Mr. Todd had been nominated as the candidate, and stating that he had not a shadow of doubt that Mr. Todd would carry the Liberal standard to victory.

From what he had heard since he came to Charlotte he had no doubt that the constituency would range itself in line with the majority of the constituencies of the Dominion in support of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who had so ably conducted the affairs of Canada since 1896.

The government was proud of the foreign trade which had been more than trebled in the sixteen years but the people wanted still greater expansion. They said: "Go on." Everybody with the exception of the Conservative party and the gentlemen who had undertaken to guide the Conservative party. These gentlemen said: "Make all the arrangements you can for a larger trade with all countries of the world except one. Look out for the great republic to the south." (Laughter and cheers.)

Some of the great bankers who met at Toronto to protest against reciprocity had branches in New York, Chicago and San Francisco, and they think they can safely trade in the United States, but they say if the farmers or fishermen increase his export to that country he is likely to become disloyal.

"You open your jaws and roar like a lion," said the minister, and he was greeted with cries of "No, no."

The government came before the people with a policy which had been the policy of both parties since confederation, and the only reason the Conservative bodies objected to it now was because the Liberals had succeeded in making an agreement where the Conservatives had failed.

"I have confidence enough in the people, members of both parties," said the minister, "to know that this offer, which may never again be made will not be rejected and that the opportunity will be grasped." (Cheers.)

A large and enthusiastic public meeting was held in the evening, at which addresses were delivered by Hon. Dr. Pugsley and Mr. Todd.

BIG DAY AT SIMCOE

Simcoe, Ont. Aug. 14—Simcoe is all ready for tomorrow the biggest day in its history. Sir Wilfrid Laurier opens his Ontario campaign here in Lynwood Park. A platform and canopy has been erected for the speakers and seating capacity for 8,000 has been provided. In addition there will be standing room for fully another 8,000.

The park is an idea, place for a political meeting. It is a natural amphitheatre with the river Lynn running at the back. The vast audience which the premier will address will be all around and above him on the rising ground. The station and main streets of the town are gaily decorated with streamers flags and bunting. Here are a few of the inscriptions of the banners:

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Nation Builder; Prosperity for Farmers means prosperity for All; Well Enough is not Good Enough When We Can Get Better; Reciprocity Will Put Norfolk Orchards Within Twenty-four hours of \$5,000,000 Buyers.

LOGGIE'S GREAT CAMPAIGN

Chatham, N. B., Aug. 14—W. S. Loggie held a fine meeting in Lower Nappan this evening. The farmers are busy harvesting one of the finest crops on record, but as soon after dusk as they could get away from their work they walked and drove to the hall. They all seemed intensely interested in reciprocity and more than one farmer after he had listened to Mr. Loggie's speech declared that under reciprocity he would feel justified in extending his production of crops. Mr. Loggie has found this meeting better attended than in any previous campaign and reciprocity is the one thing discussed.

The itinerary that Northumberland's member has mapped out for the next week is as follows: Tuesday, Wednesday, Wednesday, Trout Brook Thursday, Protectionville; Friday, Newcastle; Saturday, Big Baribogue August 21, Boiestown; August 22, Doaktown; August 23, Blackville, August 24, Renous. Other places and dates will be announced later.

The meeting at Newcastle on Friday of this week is expected to be a very big one as Hon. H. R. Emmerson, of Moncton, will speak in Mr. Loggie's behalf.

FOUND A VICTIM

Dalhousie, N. B., Aug. 14—The Conservatives held a convention today in Marquis hall, Campbellton. Every parish was represented by four delegates. James Jardine presided. Arthur Culligan, seconded by Frank Blackall, W. S. Montgomery, mayor of Dalhousie was unanimously chosen as the standard bearer of the Conservative party in Restigouche. A resolution expressing confidence in R. L. Borden was passed.

Brief speeches were made by the candidates, Councillor D. A. Arsenault of Balmoral, Daniel McAllister, Arthur, Culligan, Rene Richard, George Dawson, Frank Blackall and Duncan Cook.

Great interest is being taken in the Liberal convention to be held here on Thursday, which promises to be one of the largest ever held in Restigouche.

POWELL AND DANIEL

The St. John Conservatives in convention last night chose Dr. Daniel for the city and county and Mr. H. A. Powell, K. C., for the city. Dr. Daniel represented the city in the last parliament but the fact that Hon. Dr. Pugsley was nominated for that constituency no doubt influenced his decision to make a change.

London, (Aug. 14)—Among the passengers on the Mauretania which sailed for New York, Saturday, who assembled at Euston Station was the Marquis of Queensbury, who is on his way to Canada. Standing with an old friend and his two sons, the holder of one of the oldest titles in Scotland, was a depressing sight in a slouchy and ill fitting flannel suit of blue and white stripe and a discolored straw hat. He said he was going to try his luck in the Porcupine, declaring that the old order is passing in Britain and that there is no longer room for him. He said "I realize the changes which the focus of my class have not seen. A decade ago, a change in the House was inevitable and they then could have entrenched themselves solidly, but the fools could not see. I am in hopes of a change to do something or other."

RECIPROCITY AND THE SHEEP INDUSTRY

Guelph, Ont., Aug. 14.—"There is nothing mysterious about the importation of United States sheep into Canada at the present time," said Mr. Henry Arkell, of Arkell, one of the largest breeders of sheep in Canada, in an interview recently. "The tariff against Canadian sheep imposed by the United States is responsible for it. If the tariff was removed the Canadian sheep producers would be encouraged to go into the production of sheep more extensively."

"The reason there are United States sheep coming in here at the present is that there is a shortage of the Canadian article. There has been a large increase in the population from the Old Land in the past few years, and they are all consumers of mutton. The tariff restrictions and the tariff by our United States neighbors are responsible for the shortage. This tariff has discouraged the raising of sheep for mutton purposes in Canada and where a man had a large flock of sheep for mutton purposes previous to the passing of that legislation he has not more than five per cent. now of his former flock. ...If the trade agreement is passed and tariff restrictions removed we can look for a remarkable boom in the sheep industry in Canada."

"It is the veriest nonsense to say that the throwing open of the sheep market between the two countries will kill the industry in Canada, for there is really no industry of that kind here to kill. Remove the tariff and watch the Canadian sheep industry grow."

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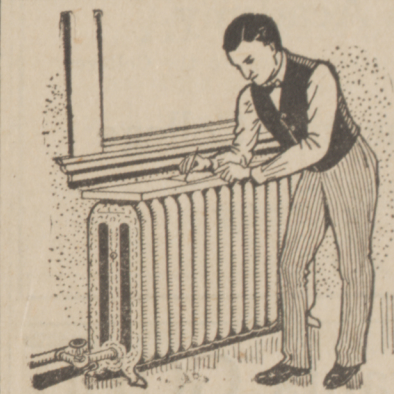

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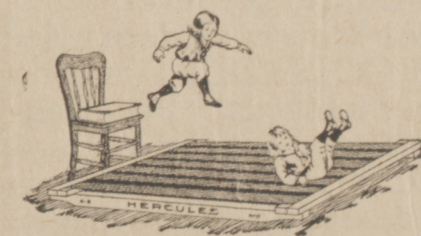
