Meanwhile, as a neighborly beginning, could you not give our products tariff entrance to your markets on the same terms which we accord to yours in our market? . . . This would be an earnest of good feeling and might dispose us to further converse."

DECEIVING THE FARMER

Notwithstanding the fact that the Tory organ is able to see "the last days of Laurierism," and that Mr. O. S. Crockett has a "dead sure thing," in York, it finds it expedient to indulge in the most flagrant misrepresentation when dealing with the trade returns of Canada and the United States. On Saturday featured on the first page some statistics under the caption of "Farmers Beware the trap Baited with Reciprocity," which were false from beginning to end and were prepared with the sole object of stampeding the farmers into voting against reciprocity. The organ in the first place pictures Canada as importing from the United States in 1910 live stock to the value of \$4,087,462, and selling to that country live stock worth only \$1,246,789. In order that there may be no misunderstanding we here reproduce the organ's figures:

As will be seen by the above instead of Canada importing from the United States live stock to the value of \$4,087,462 as claimed by the Tory organ, our imports totalled \$1,085,988, or about \$3,000,000, less than the organ would have the people believe. On the other hand our exports to the United States in live stock amounted to \$1,805,341, or \$558,652 less than the figures given by the graft organ and \$716,353 more than the United States sold to us. In the item of hogs sold to Canada by the United States the organ's figures are correct; in all other cases they are false and misleading. What the organ hopes to gain by such misrepresentation it is difficult to conceive.

Any intelligent man who examines the correct table as given above need not be ashamed of the showing made by Canada. Considering the fact that the American tariff is higher than that of Canada, it is remarkable that the balance of trade in live stock should be upwards of \$700,000 in our favor. It certainly bears out the statement of Sir Wilfrid Laurier that once the tariff barriers were removed "trade would flow from Canada to the United States like water over a mill race."

CRISIS APPROACHING
IN THE ORIENT

Washington, 13—In the opinion of students of Oriental affairs, China is rapidly approaching a great crisis in her history. AMERICAN FARMERS AFRAID

Mr. Feig of the Minnesota delegation (page 183 Senate Committee Reports): "Resolution adopted by a mass meeting of farmers held in Minnesota on April 11: That this trade agreement, this proposed trade agreement with Canada, would be of inestimable damage to the people in our section of the country and to all the agricultural interests whatever they may be in this country. We farmers and business men of Minnesota, in mass meeting assembled at St. Paul (Minn.), do most earnestly and sincerely protest against the ratification by Congress of the pending treaty with Canada in its present form. In doing so we hereby announce and publish the following reasons: First, that the treaty is unfair, unjust, and discriminating against the agricultural interests of the United States, giving these interests practically nothing in return for what it deprives them of. * * * Fourth, it creates an unfair competition inasmuch as it will compel our farmers to compete in our markets with the cheap-produced products of alien competitors. We contend that our home market belongs in the first instance to our own citizens."

UP WITH THIS MAN

Mr. Bourassa is the man the Conservatives rely on to save the Empire by taking a majority out of Quebec.

What did Mr. Bourassa say about Sir Wilfrid Laurier's imperialism? Here it is in a signed letter to Le Devoir, the paper of the Conservatives are freely circulating in Quebec province. Mr. Bourassa wrote it in July last:

MUCH SUFFERING
AMONG THE POOR

New York, Sept. 13—There is more suffering in New York this summer than last year, according to a report last night by the New York Association for relieving the conditions of the poor.

The association's figures for July and August show a decided increase in the number of families dependent on charity, in whole or in part. Striking features are the fact that temperance has charged to it in the report, less than two per cent. of all distress and that 43 per cent. of families cared for are recorded as being reduced to poverty by sickness. Unemployment is second on the list of causes, with a percentage of twenty five. Insufficient incomes sent twelve per cent. of the total number of families to each relief.

LABOR AND RECIPROCITY

At the big Fielding meeting in Halifax on Saturday evening, H. J. Logan in the course of his speech read the following letter from J. G. O'Donoghue, the Solicitor of the Dominion Trades Congress, representing over 200,000 organized Canadian workmen:

Dear Mr. Logan:
You ask me where the organized workers stand on the question of Reciprocity? They themselves have already answered that in their annual conventions. They are undoubtedly for it, because it means the removal of a tax that has been imposed upon the whole people for the benefit of the few, and the workers are always against class privileges. As a member of over thirty Boards of Conciliation, I have had a lot to do with the question of the cost of living of the workers, and it is my firm belief that the adoption of Reciprocity pact will mean a cheaper breakfast and dinner table to the workers. That means a couple of dollars a week to the workingman's wife and as she has to "square" the butcher and the baker and the grocer she deserves every consideration. THE TRADES COUNCILS OF WINNIPEG, TORONTO, OTTAWA AND MONTREAL HAVE DECLARED FOR RECIPROCITY.
