THE PROCEEDINGS AT GAGETOWN

Gagetown, Sept. 14.—This unusually quiet village is alive with people today gathered from all points of the compass to hear the nomination speeches. The Elaine brought four hundred from up points, the Hampstead an equal number from down river, and the May Queen brought six hundred stalwarts from Chipman. The arrival of each boat with its contingent was the signal for an outburst of cheering for Col. McLean. Two-thirds of the visitors seem to be for McLean and their enthusiasm is unbounded. Nothing like it was ever before seen here.

The formal nomination proceedings took place in the Court House at twelve o'clock and were uninteresting. Col. McLean was put up in nomination by the Liberals and Luther B. Smith by the Conservatives.

This afternoon the candidates and Premier Hazen are to address the crowd from the Court House steps.

The arrangements are that Col. McLean is to speak first and be followed by Mr. Smith and Premier Hazen. Col. McLean will make the closing address.

ANOTHER CONSERVATIVE FAVORS RECIPROCITY

It is not an Ontario Man Whom Nobody
Knows but Mr. W. M. Jarvis of St. John
--Gives Strong Reasons for Changing
his Political Faith

(Montreal Herald)
W. M. Jarvis, ex-president of the St. John Board of Trade, a gentleman who has always taken a leading place in every public movement and one in whose judgment his fellow-citizens place great confidence, is among the number of those who, as Conservatives have supported Reciprocity all their lives and who in this election are standing by their convictions and will vote for the Liberal candidates as the champions of Reciprocity.

In an interview with The Herald correspondent, Mr. Jarvis said: "I am giving my support to the Liberal party solely on account of its action in negotiating the Reciprocity agreement. I am sorry to have to oppose my good friend Dr. DeLel but I place the interests of the country before party ties."

"I can remember the former period during which we had a Reciprocity agreement with the United States; I can remember the prosperity which we enjoyed at that time, and I cannot remember that it endangered our loyalty in any war or showed any tendency to expose us to the dangers of annexation. I BELIEVE THAT RECIPROCITY WOULD BE OF THE GREATEST VALUE TO THIS COUNTRY AND THAT THE PEOPLE OF THIS COUNTRY SHOULD NOT ALLOW THEMSELVES TO BE FRIGHTENED OUT OF ACCEPTING IT NOW THAT WE HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO SECURE IT, BY THE ALLEGATIONS THAT SUCH A COURSE WOULD BE DISLOYAL AND THAT IT WOULD LEAD TO ANNEXATION."

CHARGES WHICH ARE BEING MADE AGAINST THE LOYALTY OF THOSE WHO ARE SUPPORTING THE RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT. "It might be of interest to mention that there was a period of reciprocity in the history of this Province previous to the treaty of 1854. This was during the progress of the War of 1812. The Northern States which were forced into war by the Southerners, wished to remain neutral, and, throughout the war, while they were deprived of their usual sources of supply, they traded with the greatest freedom with the Loyalist citizens of St. John, who certainly could not have found that it affected their loyalty to Great Britain."

"INTERESTS" FINAL SHRIEK AGAINST RECIPROCITY

Ottawa, Sept. 12.—Public sentiment against the Reciprocity agreement manufactured to order and paid for without one cent of cost to the ostensible purveyors, to wit the Conservative press, will be poured out in a flood this week.

All this is according to the plan of R. L. Borden and the party publicity bureau, with the "patriotic" assistance of The Montreal Star.

And all this final flood of anti-Reciprocity argument to order will be presented in the case of each paper as being the pure and undefiled opinion of the editors, voicing their conscientious belief as to the evils of freer trade with the United States.

It is perhaps unfortunate from the standpoint of the originators of the scheme that the fact is now prematurely made public that the four pages of anti-Reciprocity supplement, to go with the regular issues of the Tory papers, are all manufactured in Montreal, and are paid for out of the party funds.

This may state somewhat against the desired effect on the readers. It may be further noted that this last scheme is a fitting climax to the 10,000 paid-for anti-Reciprocity arguments which have been appeared for months past in the opposition press.

The scheme in detail is disclosed in the following letter sent from The Montreal Star office by B. A. McNab, the editor, to the editors of Tory and Independent newspapers:

"Star Office, Montreal,
September 5, 1911.

"To the Editor:
"Dear Sir—R. L. Borden will be pleased if you will let me know if you will enclose in the whole of your regular issue of next week a special supplement, conformable to the law, and circulate in your county 2,000 to 5,000 extra copies of your paper with supplement enclosed, carefully distributed so as to ensure its being in the hands of the people before Sunday, the 17th. You may send to me your bill of cost for extra paper and distribution and I will remit it to you. The supplement will be designated as a supplement to your paper. The contents will be:

"First page—A patriotic article void of offence, entitled Under Which Flag.

"Second page—The evidence going to show that the farmer is being fooled and the industrial workers menaced in their wages and employment.

"Third page—Evidence to show that Reciprocity means annexation giving extracts from American papers and American speeches.

"Fourth page—Canada's great destiny, great future, if it is worked out by Canadians.

"The supplement will be effective. It will be a credit to your paper. You will be paid for it as your own enterprise, and it will not cost you a cent.

"Please wire me at my expense, send _____ thousand. Must be on _____, to be dated _____, full size of our page — by —. Will carry out as requested.

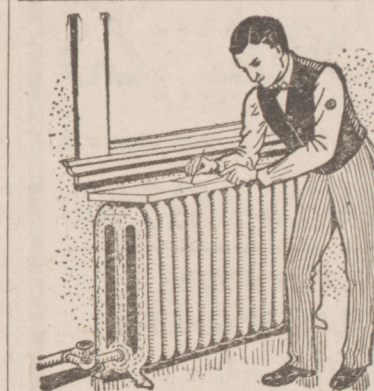
