

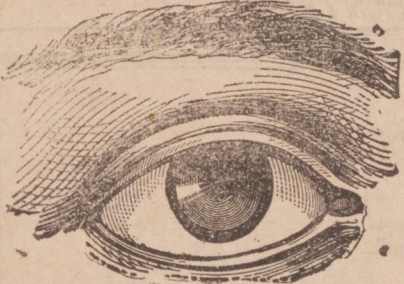

(Canadian Press.)

New York, Dec. 21.—Rose Eyttinge, at one time one of the most popular leading women on the American stage is dead at the Brunswick Home, Amietville, Long Island, from a paralytic stroke. She had been an inmate of the home since last August.

Miss Eyttinge was born in Philadelphia in 1835.

WANTS SHORTER HOURS  
FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

Shorter school hours and more frequent recesses are recommended for school children by Dr. Rowland G. Freeman, an authority on pediatrics in the current number of the New York Medical Record.

"The school days," he writes, "while much better adapted than formerly, is still usually poorly adapted to younger children. A child of five should not have more than an hour a day at school and this hour should be divided by periods and exercise every ten minutes, for a child of this age has power of concentration for only the shortest period and endurance for exercise for only short periods. Children can run hard for a moment in play, but to walk a mile is fatiguing and injurious to them."

"Duration of the school day may be gradually lengthened, as well as the periods of study, but at ten years of age the child should not be in school for more than four hours a day and should have no home study, and this four hours should be interrupted by frequent recesses every twenty minutes or half an hour. These recesses should be taken out of doors, and every school in our cities should be equipped with a roof garden for use during recess."

"While our school day should be short in private schools, where facilities at home for the care of the children during the remainder of the day are good, I believe that our public schools should exercise supervision as many hours of the day as possible, supervising their play as well as their study. In our large cities the influences about the public school children after school hours are demoralizing. The increased expense of this supervision should not be considered, as such an expense is amply compensated by a later diminution in the expense of the control of crime."

"It is as true of children as it is of adults that it is not work but worry that breaks down the nervous system. We see in our clinics every spring conscientious school children, usually girls, who stand at the head of their class and are studying night and day to keep up, and as a consequence develop anaemia and chorea."

"It is therefore very desirable that classes should be small, so that the teacher may consider each child in her efforts to obtain good results and not or the stupid one who has difficulty in keeping up with the others."

"In conclusion," Dr. Freeman writes, "I would summarize the following essentials for the preservation of the good health of school children: "Frequent recesses."

"Open air or well ventilated and cool school rooms."

"Roof play grounds in cities."

"For public school children a supervision of play as well as study."

"Individual study of backward or feeble children."

"The proper feeding of school children."

"A medical supervisor should have control of the health of school children."

"The exclusion from school of all children with colds, as well as those suffering from other contagious diseases."

"The dismissal from school during the period of incubation of all children who have been exposed to contagious diseases."

Dr. Freeman also takes the ground that, since the city compels the attendance at school of children who are insufficiently fed, the children who may not receive nourishing food at home should be fed at the public expense.

## MISS PULITZER A BRIDE

New York, Dec. 21.—Miss Edith Joseph Pulitzer, the famous newspaper publisher who died aboard his yacht at Charleston S. C., two months ago, today became the bride of William Seville Moore, son of the late Major Clement C. Moor. The ceremony was performed at the Pulitzer home at East Seventy-third Street and was attended only by relatives and a few intimate friends. The couple will sail at the end of the week for Europe to spend the winter.

The bride made her debut in society several years ago. She has three brothers Joseph Pulitzer, Jr., who married Miss Eleanor Wickham of St. Louis, Ralph who married the daughter of W. Seward Webb, and Herbert Pulitzer. She has a younger sister Miss Constance Pulitzer.

Mr. Moore the bridegroom, graduated from Yale in 1906. His father, who died in this city last November, served with distinction in the civil war. The great-grandfather of the bridegroom was the famous Bishop Moore, who wrote "The Night Before Christmas."

NO POLICE ESCORT FOR THE  
PRESIDENT IN NEW YORK

New York, Dec. 20.—No satisfactory explanation has been vouchsafed today as to why it was necessary for the president of the United States to travel through New York's streets last night without a police escort such as has been customarily assigned for his protection during his visit here. The fact remained however, that when President Taft arrived at six thirty last night, at the Pennsylvania terminal on a two days visit to this city, not a blue coated employee of the city was in sight. The presidential party was forced to make its progress to the street and an awaiting automobile separated from the crowd only by ten colored porters whom the station master had hastily pressed into service.

Unescorted by police the president went to the home of his brother, Henry W. Taft on West 48th Street. It was there that the first sight of a police officer detailed for duty with the party was had. The detachment

was made up of three bicycle policemen. On his former visits ten policemen on wheels have been assigned to travel with him and ten patrolmen to control the crowd which frequently gathered at the railway station on his arrival. The three bicycle policemen waited outside until the president appeared some time later to go to the Economic Club dinner, at the Hotel Astor where he was to deliver an address and they accompanied him there. The same sized force formed his escort when he crossed Brooklyn to attend the New England Society dinner at the Academy of Music and the Young Republican Club dinner.

It was stated that police commissioner Waldo when asked for the escort had replied that in his opinion no greater escort was needed for the protection of the president here than for the mayor of the city when he travels about and that no greater one would be furnished on this occasion. He considered the president no better than the mayor.

NEW BRITISH DREADNAUGHT  
WILL BEAT EVERY RECORD

Phenomenal speed records are expected to be made by the super-Dreadnought cruiser Lion, now approaching completion at Devonport Dockyard. At the present moment Germany holds the record for Dreadnought speed my the fraction of a knot, but it is confidently anticipated that the Lion will restore the lead to the British Navy.

It will be remembered that with the first three Dreadnought cruisers the Indomitable, Indefatigable, and Invincible, Great Britain secured three armored ships which completely shattered all existing records for armored ship speed. The best of the trio was the Indomitable, with 23.7 knots to her credit.

These records remained until the Indefatigable surpassed them on her trials towards the end of last year for this ship, designed like the other for 25 knots, succeeded in making 23.13.

In the meantime, Germany had produced two fast armored cruisers—the Blücher (26.4 knots) and Germany's first real Dreadnought cruiser the 19,100 ton Von der Tann (27.63 knots).

In spite of easily verifiable and well-known facts to the contrary, the Vonder Tann was heralded in Germany as "the fastest armored ship in the world," and under that description she was sent on her advertising cruise to South America.

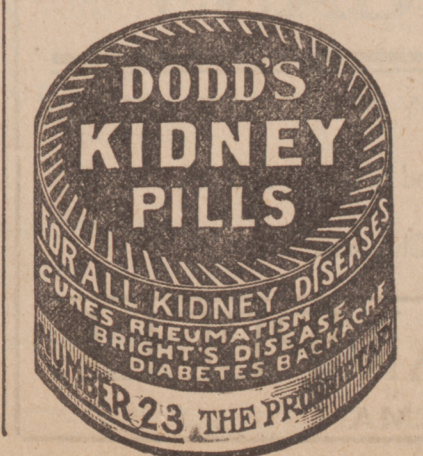

She was really slower than the Indomitable, the Invincible, and the Indefatigable.

Since then, however, Germany has undoubtedly taken the lead, she claimed nearly a year ago, for recently the battle-cruiser Moltke, on her trials, succeeded in making 29.5 knots.

She will not, however, hold this position for long. The Admiralty have given us no figures whatever about the Lion but it is known that in spite of her huge displacement, of 26,350 tons a speed of well over 30 knots is confidently expected. The actual designed speed is 28 knots, but if the invincibles, designed for 25 knots (with engines of 41,000 horse power) made an average of 23 what will be the Lion mave (with 70,000 horse power engines), having been designed.

The answer would seem to be somewhere between 31 and 32 knots, but in any case the regaining of the blue ribbon for speed may safely be taken as certain.

The new ship is 680ft. long over all. Her armament consists of eight 12.5-inch guns, mounted in four turrets on the middle line, and 20 4-inch quick-firers for repelling torpedo attack.

Japan is the only other Power besides Britain and Germany that is building Dreadnought cruisers but details of her vessels are not definitely known yet.

## FASHION HINTS

Hand tucked tulle blouses are worn with silk suits. They are made quite simple, trimmed only with tulle or net jabots or plisses.

Serge, velvet, liberty cachemire de sole, mousseline de sole, some shot taffeta with trimmings of lace, fringe and fur, are being used separately and together for tailor made and visiting dresses.

Jabots or plisses are extremely wide and long. In the majority of cases they extend to the waist line and over as far as the shoulder. The shape is generally broader at the top than at the bottom.

Lace and the most gorgeous of brocades threaded with gold and silver and worked in flowers of wool or silk or both, make up the most handsome of evening gowns. But beaded net is also used, with a softening note of old lace on the shoulders.

The young girl's simple frock for school wear is made of light weight wool material or of the serviceable with smartness added in the way of mohair, and designs are most simple plain satin or silk pipings, bands or collars and rows of small buttons.

Buttons always give a smart and dashing look when used plentifully, and dozens of tiny metal buttons, set in rows, are used for the brightening of little girl's dresses. Soft sashes of satin or chiffon, weighted with freings, are also used on the models designed for young misses in their teens, and these sashes lend a graceful and charming touch. Skirts are usually in tunic style, or with band trimmings that suggest the tunic, and bodices cross over in surplice fashion fastening with cord loops or fancy buttons. These dark school frocks are made dainty and girlish by the addition of narrow, hand-embroidered collar and cuff sets.
