GETTING HARD KNOCK

The Borden Cabinet is undoubtedly the weakest combination formed by any prime minister in Canada since confederation. Liberal newspapers and independent newspapers have been knocking it right and left while many partisan journals of the type of the Fredericton Gleaner apparently can find little or nothing to say in its defence. The Toronto Telegram which bitterly opposed the Laurier government, constrained to observe that "the Borden government seems to have been chosen with the due sense of high public responsibility that might be expected from the premier of mock parliament in a students debating society." That was certainly a cold crack but it is mild in comparison with the following criticism handed out by the Toronto Saturday Night, an independent newspaper of high standing:

"We have had a few Federal Cabinets in this country since Confederation, but the present one will unquestionably march through time as having received the record number of hard knocks. If the personnel of the present body is satisfactory to anyone, he has not been heard from; and as to the Hon. Mr. Borden justice, I doubt very much if he is himself altogether tickled over the result."

To the English-Canadian, and to many French-Canadians, THE MOST DISCOURAGING FEATURE IS THE THOUGHT THAT THE PREMIER DEEMS IT NECESSARY TO CATER TO THE NATIONALIST ELEMENT OF THE PROVINCE OF QUEBEC. Here we have Monk, Nantel and Pelletier, and Monk with the most important portfolio, aside from that of Finance, safely tucked away in his coat tail pocket. One of them might have passed without serious criticism, but three is too much for even the most ardent Tory that ever cast a vote. If catering to these men and their up-sit-down notions of retarding the growth of the country because the French-Canadian can't and won't keep pace with his English speaking neighbor, had been a political necessity, the Hon. Mr. Borden might have possessed something in the way of an excuse, but with the Conservative majority back of him such as the new premier has—without taking Quebec into account at all—HE HAS NOT A POLITICAL LEG TO STAND ON.

Under no account am I to be understood as wishing, or even insinuating a desire to deprive the French-Canadians of the Province of Quebec of proper Cabinet representation. That is their right, though the giving of at least one portfolio to a representative of the English race in Quebec would have been no less than what is due, considering the importance of the English-speaking interests within the confines of that Province. Of course, it is quite possible that the Premier figures Mr. Monk as representing the English element but as the aforementioned Mr. Monk is an out and out Nationalist—a little Canadian—he comes as far from being a representative English-Canadian as do Messrs. Bourassa and Lavergne. As a matter of fact, there is nothing English about the Hon. Mr. Monk, but his name.

However let us hope for the best. Let us think that someday we will be in Canada GET BEYOND THE POINT OF TRADING POLITICALLY IN MEN RELIGIONS, FOR NATIONALISM, AS IT STANDS, IS, AFTER ALL, THREE-QUARTERS RELIGION AND ONE-QUARTER NAVY. Let us at least imagine that this his travesty, this burlesque of trafficking in a man's God, of making political capital of his Creator on the election platform and before the ballot box, will cease by reason of our being ashamed to further utilize such methods."

It looks as if Sir Wilfrid and his lieutenants are going to have no end of fun during the approaching session of parliament.

Hon. Mr. Hazen since accepting a portfolio in the Borden Cabinet seems to have forgotten there is such a place as Fredericton on the map. Former premiers of the province

In the first Laurier Cabinet we had Sir Oliver Mowatt, Hon. A. G. Blair and Hon. William Paterson, and the government which went down to defeat on Sept. 21st, included Messrs. Paterson, King, and Templeman. This condition of affairs ought to furnish a theme for some of the orators who are usually much in evidence at the annual dinner of the Fredericton Society of St. Andrew.

It must be kind of discouraging to York Tories who worked so hard during the recent campaign to have the semi-official announcement made from Ottawa that the Borden government has no intention of introducing the spoils system.

In view of the great decline in the rural population, it will be the duty of Governments, both Dominion and provincial in future to give more serious attention to the man on the farm.

Premier Fleming has gone to Ottawa to confer with the Dominion government in regard to the Valley Railway. Surely he ought to be able to accomplish something this time.

It is reported from Ottawa that Dr. Sproule, a prominent Orangeman will be speaker of the House of Commons, and that the deputy speaker will be Mr. P. E. Bordin, a blatant Quebec nationalist.

According to reports his home life was not as happy as he would have liked it; still there are no known reasons for supposing that anyone within his own family or among his relatives had anything to do with the crime.

(Continued from page 1) mother, and then she sobbed while Mrs. Edmunds stroked her hair and pleaded with her to be calm. "God will see that justice is done, my daughter," her mother told her. "We must trust Him."

The evidence that the police are mercilessly piling up against Mr. Richeson is being kept from the sorrowing girl. Chief Dugan, veteran of thousands of criminal cases, declares this is the most diabolical crime he has ever been called upon to solve.

"It makes me shudder," he said, "when I think of the fendishness of the man who gave an innocent girl cyanide of potassium, the most deadly of poisons, and told her to take it that she might be relieved of a condition that was causing her the deepest anguish."

RICHESON NERVOUS.

At police headquarters, Mr. Richeson was ushered into the office of Chief Dugan and questioned by the chief and the deputy superintendent. He was guarded in his replies, but very cool.

When he was confronted by Mr. Hahn, the druggist who says he sold him the poison, he was reading a newspaper account of his arrest. He heard Mr. Hahn's footsteps, and, glancing over the newspaper, recognized the druggist.

"Why, how do you do, Mr. Hahn," he said, getting up and walking toward Mr. Hahn, smiling and with his hand extended. "It's a fine morning, isn't it?"

"Yes," answered Mr. Hahn, dazed by the nerve of the man he thought would flinch from meeting him. The two shook hands cordially, and then Mr. Hahn, at the suggestion of Mr. Watts, related his story of the purchase of the poison by Mr. Richeson. He laid down his papers and followed

the statement with keen interest. "I knew him, and put up a little bottle of cyanide of potassium," said Mr. Hahn. "I said, 'Of course you know, Mr. Richeson, this is a very dangerous poison, and you must use a great deal of caution about having it around. When you get through using it on the dog be sure to destroy the balance.' Mr. Richeson said 'Yes, I'll be very careful.' He then took the package and went out of the store."

Captain Dugan then turned to Mr. Richeson and said:

"You have heard what Mr. Hahn has said. I warn you that whatever you say may be used against you. Do you care to make any statement?"

Mr. Richeson, after hesitating a moment, replied:

"No; won't say anything at all." "We lack only one link in this case," said Chief Dugan. "That is the actual delivery of the cyanide of potassium to Miss Linnell. We have not yet been able to find out where she dined on Saturday, but I am positive that she met Mr. Richeson between two and five o'clock that afternoon."

Money rather than love, the police will allege when Mr. Richeson is placed on trial, was his incentive when he wooed and won Miss Edmunds. Under the will of her grandfather, the late George D. Edmunds, upon the death of her father she will receive three-eighths of the annual income from the \$766,135 worth of property left in trust by the late Mr. Edmunds, and should she become sole beneficiary her income on a 4 per cent. basis would be \$30,645 annually. Besides this, she will get a large share of her father's estate.

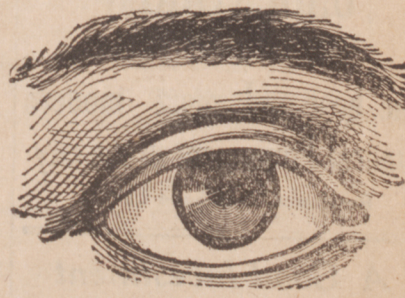
