SUFFRAGETTES REPULSED
BY HOUSE OF COMMONS

COMPLETE PLAN.

From the evidence it is quite certain that the militant suffragettes acted yesterday on a complete plan of campaign. As soon as they were repulsed by the police drawn up in Parliament Square, they dispersed into small groups, who mixed with the crowds. These were kept in constant movement by the police. Occasionally a missile was hurled from the middle of the throng, but the police were unable to detect the throwers. This gave the militants more confidence and they came within reach of government offices in White Hall and on the surrounding streets. The throwing of stones became more frequent and excited shouts of "Votes for Women" were raised. It was here that most of the arrests were effected. Some of the women fought their captors with great vigor. At the National Liberal Club on Thames Embankment, the excitement reached its height.

The club was full of members and their friends these flocked to the windows as the crowds approached but were soon forced to retreat in order to avoid the showers of well aimed stones which crashed through the lower windows. Many more arrests were made here and also along the Strand, where the telegraph office was attacked as well as a number of stores. Some of the suffragettes rode in horse and motor cabs and from there launched stones when ever opportunity offered. Newspaper offices attacked over a mile away from the house of parliament suffered the assailants succeeded in escaping but in others they appeared to seek arrest.

RAILWAY BUSINESS ASSOCIATION

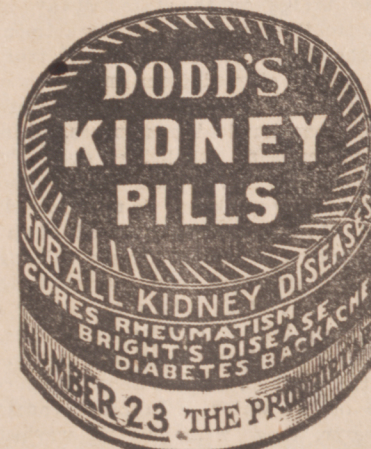

Ralston and erected at a cost of half a million dollars.

HOW BOB ROGERS
SETTLED THE STRIKE

(Regina Leader)

Not even the most critical of the opponents of the Hon. "Bob" Rogers will deny to the Minister of the Interior a great talent for self-advertisement. Occasionally, however, he overdoes it. He did it in the matter of the coal strike "settlement."

Mr. Rogers' performance in this instance was characteristic of the man and his methods.

For weeks Pat Burns, the "cattle king" of Alberta, had been quietly working with a view to effecting a settlement of the trouble at the mines, and towards the end of last month word reached Ottawa that a successful issue to the negotiations might be looked for any day.

The opportunity looked good to Mr. Rogers for getting a considerable amount to credit at comparatively little outlay of personal inconvenience on his part, and accordingly he got busy. Procuring a private Government car he proceeded to Lethbridge, carefully providing himself with a member of the Winnipeg Telegram's reportorial staff in order that the world at large might be fully apprised of all that the great man did, and exactly how he settled the strike.

MODEST TELEGRAM

In due course Mr. Rogers with that modesty which is so marked a feature of all he does, sent off the following despatch to Ottawa:—

"Lethbridge, Alta., Oct. 27,

"Hon. W. T. Crothers.
"Minister of Labor, Ottawa, Ont.
"Have succeeded in getting complete settlement of strike signed by both parties.

"R. ROGERS."

This was followed up in due course by flowery despatches written to order by the Telegram's staff correspondent, in which the Minister of the Interior was hailed as the great pacificator, the heaven-sent settler of strikes. The Telegram went into ecstasies; the Daily Province of this city—in which Mr. Rogers is a large shareholder—spoke in glowing terms of what he had accomplished incidentally describing it as "a brilliant piece of work." The Government press throughout Canada accepted their cue and sounded peans of praise and the hon. gentlemen left Lethbridge in his private Government car in a blaze of glory.

Arrived in Winnipeg a well staged-managed reception was accorded the hero; bands played triumphant music; Premier Roblin and Mayor Sanford

Evans vied with each other in singing the praises of the great man and the Telegram well nigh exhausted its supply of big type and fulsome adjectives in getting off its chest half the good things it had to say about its idol.

All that was nearly three weeks ago.

STILL UNSETTLED

Meanwhile the strike is still unsettled. The so-called settlement trumpeted for the world to hear by Mr. Rogers and his special staff reporter, settled nothing. As a matter of fact, his premature announcement of a "settlement" made for the sole purpose of ministering to the self-glorification of a man whose overweening egotism is one of his principal assets—retarded rather than helped towards a settlement.

The operators and the men are still negotiating, and hopes are entertained that a genuine settlement may be announced any day and that work at the mines will be resumed at an early date.

Meanwhile, if anyone still thinks that the Hon. "Bob" Rogers achieved anything in the way of a settlement, we refer him to the latest despatches from Fernie, in which A. J. Carter, of the District Scales Committee, described the fuel situation as serious, and states that there are still "one or two contentious points that require adjusting" before a final settlement can be reached and work at the mines resumed.
