## FLAG-FLAPPING DID NOT BUDGE WESTERN FARMERS

A ex-Haligonian writes from Dauphin, Man., to The Halifax Chronicle under date of November 10th as follows:

Now that the elections are over, the west is settling down to its usual fall vocation—that of shipping the grain to the market—and the late election is, in one sense, history. But the vote given in the prairie provinces—showing a 25,000 Liberal majority—is one that will give pause to all thinking men. What does it mean?

It plainly means that, barring the city influence, the farmers of the west voted for reciprocity. It means that despite the 4,000 adverse majority in Winnipeg, 1,000 in Brandon and 2,000 in Calgary, the hearts of the rural population beat almost in unison on the reciprocity issue, and were not swayed from their purpose by what The Morning Chronicle rightly designates as flag-flapping. It means that the statesman of the future will have to put aside trivial matters and heed the call of the west.

## MUST HEED THE WEST.

They talk about the Maritime Provinces and poor old Nova Scotia in particular, as coquetting with the United States. What of the west? The great west borders on the United States; Nova Scotia does not. It is handy by water, but by rail nearly 1,000 miles away. Nova Scotia has stood by British connection—and will continue to do so—even though she was dragged into the confederacy, while other provinces which have since gained by the pact had to be coaxed in, and only came in when they were given concessions which Premier McBride of British Columbia was in Ottawa the other day to further urge.

Poor old Nova Scotia! She was used as a weapon to bring the other provinces into the confederacy. It is history that the British government, in 1867—when they were very ill informed on our affairs—were told that if Nova Scotia did not join the confederation she would join the United States. And Sir Charles Tupper, the aged statesman for whom we have the most profound respect, was the chief instrument in bringing us in. I imagine it is fresh in the minds of most of the Nova Scotians how the late Hon. Joseph Howe was forestalled on his trip to England and told on his arrival that he was too late.

## SIAM'S KING TO BE CROWNED IN DECEMBER

Washington, D. C., Nov. 22.—Announcement of the appointment of Col. Leo Feltger, commanding the Sixth Cavalry now in the Philippines, to represent the United States as military attaché at the coronation of the King of Siam draws public attention to the ceremonies which will make the city of Bangkok a centre of attraction early next month. The leading nations of the world will be represented at the coronation. Prince Fushimi has been named the Japanese delegation and England is sending an embassy headed by Prince Louis of Battenberg. France, Germany, Italy and other Europeans nations also are sending special ambassadors.

The ceremonies and festivities in connection with the crowning of the new King will extend over an entire week. From every part of the Siamese kingdom the princes and nobles and military and civil officials will assemble in the capital to renew their allegiances to the new overlord. The tenor of the oath that they are required to take on this occasion seems to show how Siam has preserved its own identity. Here are some of the phrases used in it:

"We pray the powers of the deities to plague with poisonous boils and with all manner of horrible diseases the disobedient, the seditious, the traitorous, and the treacherous. When they have departed this life may they be sent to horrible hell."

The new King, whose full name is Somdech Chompha Maha Vajiravahg, succeeded to the throne upon the death of his father a year ago last October. He was born about 30 years ago and was proclaimed Crown Prince when he was 15. He was educated in England and learned soldiering at Sandhurst, Aldershot and Potsdam. Later he spent some time in Paris, and then having acquired a good conversational acquaintance with both English and French, he was sent back to his country to go into training for the duties which he would later have to perform.

## BETTER TERMS ARE OFFERED MANITOBA

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—Premier Roblin of Manitoba, today made the announcement that his government had reached an agreement with the federal administration in a settlement of the boundary question.

"The whole matter of boundaries and subsidy in lieu of public domain will be readjusted," he said, "on a basis giving us equality with Alberta and Saskatchewan. After forty years of struggling, Manitoba's claims of equality in the confederation of Canada are recognized."

A bill to embrace the settlement will be introduced this session and Premier Roblin announced that his government would immediately enter upon a broad policy of developing the great hinterland to Hudson Bay. He and Hon. Colin Campbell left this afternoon for the west.

There were conferences all day yesterday. Archbishop Bruchesi arrived at noon and Mr. Bourassa in the evening. Mr. Borden, Mr. Monk, Mr. Pelletier, Mr. Rogers and Mr. Doherty were all participants in the negotiations.

The basis of agreement is said to be that Mr. Roblin will accept the boundaries proposed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and that in addition to the Laurier offer, Manitoba will be given a more liberal annual subsidy.

Nothing is given out about the adjustment in regard to schools. It is believed, however, that the actual school law of Manitoba will be extended to the part to be added to that province.

The present school law of Manitoba is not satisfactory to Archbishop Langevin. It remains to be seen whether the archbishop and the Quebec bishop have been promised some thing by Mr. Roblin, or whether a clause in the act of parliament will define the status. One way or the other, it would appear that the church authorities are satisfied, for the announcement that the affair is settled follows the conference of yesterday.

## WILL GET DOUBLE SUBSIDY.

Toronto, Nov. 21.—Premier Roblin of Manitoba, who arrived from Ottawa today, stated that through an arrangement with the federal government, Manitoba would have its annual subsidy of \$200,000 increased to \$400,000.

## TO HONOR CONGRESSMAN UNDERWOOD

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 22.—Leaders of the Democratic party throughout the South have been invited to attend the big banquet to be given in this city tomorrow night in honor of Congressman Oscar Underwood. Incidentally, it is designed to call the country's attention to the movement which aims to make the minority leader in the House the head of the Democratic presidential ticket.
