GOTCH FRACTURED SKULL OF BAHN IN WRESTLING FIGHT

Injured Man Expected to Recover—Champion Threw Him Over His Head—Will Meet Anyone.

Chicago, March 17.—Frank Gotch, champion wrestler, last night threw Henry Bahn, known as Samson, 260 pound German, so hard it caused a fracture of the German's skull. Physicians at the match declared that Bahn, was seriously hurt. The men were to have wrestled for two out of three falls. At the hospital today it was said Bahn would probably recover.

After they had struggled seven minutes and twenty seconds, Gotch obtained a leg hold and tossed the German over his head. Bahn landed on the back of his head, unconscious. The match was awarded to Gotch, who later announced he had signed a contract to meet any wrestler in the world.

New York, March 17.—Freddie Welsh formerly lightweight champion of England arrived in New York today upon the liner Lusitania for a series of fights in this country. Welsh declared that he would seek to get a match with Paddy McFarland, of Chicago. Welsh will also box Pal Moore, of Philadelphia, and possibly Knockout Brown.

AD WOLGAST EASILY RETAINED HIS CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE

Referee Stopped Bout With Memsic in Ninth Round When Champion's Opponent Was Almost Out.

Vernon Arena, Los Angeles, March, 17.—Ad. Wolgast retained his title of lightweight champion this afternoon in his scheduled twenty round fight with George Memsic of Los Angeles, virtually knocking out Memsic and causing the referee to stop the fight in the ninth round.

Wolgast out-classed Memsic from start to finish and the result was never in doubt. He had the Los Angeles man helpless in the ninth and Referee Eytan stopped the contest in accordance with the promise to District Attorney Fredericks that he would intervene the moment either man showed decided weakness.

J. M. ROBINSON & SONS WEEKLY MARKET REVIEW

St. John, Mar. 18.—A very quiet market with small transactions and decided strength has characterized the trading of this week.

Practically speaking, there is nothing new in the situation since last week and no better reason why stocks should be stronger today than they were then except for the fact that money is still accumulating and must find an outlet in some form of activity.

The Mexican situation appears to be clearing up and taken throughout conditions are very much in favor of prices being sustained around the present level or possibly higher for a somewhat extended period.

Two hundred thousand shares of the Philadelphia Company have been listed on the Paris Bourse, trading will begin next Monday. For a long time American financiers have been trying to obtain a foothold in Paris by having some of their stocks listed in this market, but this is the first instance in which their efforts have been crowned with success, it will in all probability open the way for the listing of other American securities there.

It is reported that Union and Southern Pacific will offer valuable subscription rights to their stock holders, probably before the close of the year, through financing for the necessary extensions and additions to their properties.

AMERICAN TOBACCO

Since the first of the year American Tobacco common was too valuable ever to be listed on the New York Stock Exchange, has risen nearly 70 points. It sold Monday at 478. Of this common stock the amount outstanding is \$40,242,400. Though it sells so high, it is inferior in rank to \$78,689,100 preferred stock, which is listed on the exchange and sells a little under par; \$53,341,300 6 per cent. bonds, which sell around 107 and \$47,705,200 4 per cent. bonds selling about 85. Transactions in the common stock are very small, owing to its being so closely held, but a quotation of 470 may be taken, perhaps, as an expression of opinion on the part of the insiders as to what their collateral is approximately worth. That it has been so taken is to be guessed from the requests so many brokers have recently received to buy American Tobacco common on margin. It is not a thing brokers like to buy on margin, and it is so high that only a few individuals can afford to buy it outright except in small amounts for investment. Rumors of the enormous cash resources of the Tobacco Company have had minds a very rich distribution in the effect of suggesting to speculative minds a very rich distribution in the event of a dissolution of the Trust, but the price at which the stock sells is already rather rich.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry, (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
