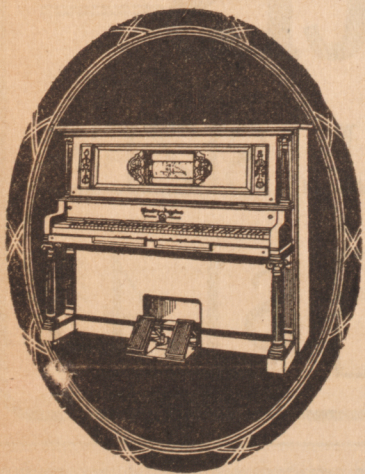

CANADIAN M. P.'S AND THE CORONATION

Ottawa, March 17.—The statement published in certain Conservative newspapers in Toronto and Montreal recently to the effect that some misapprehension had arisen with respect to a supposed invitation to members of Parliament to attend the coronation is causing some indignation amongst the members of the House.

Last July a committee of the members of the two British Houses of Parliament was formed with the object of inviting a certain number of members of the Parliaments of the overseas Dominions to visit Great Britain as guests of the British Parliament during the period covering the Coronation of His Majesty King George. The dissolution of the British Parliament last November interrupted the work of that committee; but since the election of the new Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, the idea having received approval of the Lord Chancellor, the Speaker of the Commons, the Prime Minister the Leader of the Opposition, and the Colonial Secretary, the joint committee of the two Houses at Westminster has issued invitation to 58 members of the Parliaments beyond the seas in the proportions of 18 from Canada, 18 from Australia, 12 from South Africa, 8 from New Zealand and 2 from Newfoundland.

It was never stated in any way officially that these gentlemen would be the guests of the British Government. What is more significant they will be the guests of the British Parliament and the men who have been chosen at all events appreciate the honor very much more than if they had been merely the guests of the British Government. The members of the Parliamentary delegations (whose expenses across the sea and back will be paid by their respective governments), will be the guests of the two Houses of the British Parliament from the date of their arrival in London on June 17. They will be accommodated at the Waldorf hotel in London as the guests of both Houses of the British Parliament until July 1 after which they will be taken on a tour of the United Kingdom and Ireland, also as guests of the British Parliament.

To assert that such a committee as that which is presided over by the Earl of Rosebery, and has as its vice-chairman, the Rt. Hon. James Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, is a self-constituted committee of the British House of Commons and to add that there will be no official representation of the Canadian Parliament is to state what is contrary to the truth. The sixteen members of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada who will go to London in June will go as the guests of the British Parliament as a whole and not as those of any self-constituted committee.

OUTSIDE INFLUENCES ON CHILDREN

The other day something was said in this column of the criticism of an English writer on the youth of our country. He deplored the universal lacon of respect and ascribed it largely to our system of education. There is no doubt that children and young people in Canada are very different from those in the Old Country. As long ago as 1873 Lord Dufferin dwelt upon this difference. "If there is any criticism that I have to pass upon the youth of this country he said addressing the students of our Normal School "It is that I have been struck by that absence of deference and respect for those who are older than themselves to which we still cling in Europe. . . . I trust that the teachers of the schools of Canada will do their very best to inculcate into their pupils the duties of politeness, of refined behaviour, of respect for the old and of reverence for their parents, that they will remember that a great deal may be done by kindly and wholesome advice in this particular and that if they will only take a little trouble they will continue greatly to render Canada not only one of the best educated and most prosperous but one of the most polite countries of the American continent."

Since Lord Dufferin's day matters have moved forward greatly and not to the advantage of the betterment of manners. It is a little difficult to see how youth retains any respect or reverence for old age or parents, when older persons who should know better, constantly set stumbling blocks in the way. Take the question of comic supplements, as everyone knows who has ever glanced at them age and parenthood is held up to ridicule. "Foxy Grandpa" is not a type to inspire respect for age in the youthful mind. Small boys and girls play all sorts of impish tricks on fathers and mothers and it is regarded as a good joke. How can children who see and read such stuff retain any reverence for anything? Besides age all sorts of serious matters are made fun of—the most strenuous hours of mortal life, love, marriage, courtship, birth—witness the eternal twin jokes—even death is not exempt.

Besides this low element in the daily mental food of the great mass of the people, there are a hundred and one other things that do away with reverence, respect and reticence. There are the objectionable if not actually indecent posters, there are

CANADIANS ARE NOT WEAK IN THE KNEES

Gentlemen who address the electorate are entitled to their respective opinion about whether the tariff agreement with the States is good or whether it is bad, but at this distance from the signing of the agreement the Canadian people would be duly grateful if the orators of occasion could avoid the assumption that weakness in the knees is the distinguishing characteristic of Canadians. We grow tired of it. Those who oppose the agreement protest that we are lost if we adopt it, our knees being so weak that we will topple over and sprawl on the ground if the Americans ever show themselves nice to us for three days together. And some of those who support the agreement are equally disposed to assume weakness to our underpinning, for they say that if by any chance we do something the States would like we must straightway hasten to please Great Britain too, by lowering the tariff on British goods through an additional preference. These people, on both sides, ought to be gently but firmly told that Canada is paddling her own canoe, all the time whoever may happen to be the passenger of the moment. Canadians live with their eyes open. They know their geography. They do not claim to be immune from the operation of great natural laws, but neither are they blown about by every summer breeze. Sometimes you would hardly think so, to hear the chatter, but there are a certain number of millions of Canadians whose roots reach back through generations into the soil of this Dominion. And they will take some uprooting too.
