GYPSUM MILL

AT PLASTER ROCK
HAS BEEN LEASED

Stinson-Reeb Co. of Montreal Now in Control and Will Start Operation Next Month—A Big Contract.

The Stinson-Reeb Builders Supply Company, Limited, of Montreal, have leased from the C. P. R. the plaster mill and quarries at Plaster Rock, Victoria County, and will begin operating the same early next month. This announcement was made yesterday by Mr. Kennedy Stinson, managing director of the company, who was here in company with Mr. H. P. Timmerman, industrial agent of the C. P. R., and Mr. C. E. Barrie, chief analyst of the Canada Cement Company.

The plaster mill referred to has been closed down for some years, and the resumption of work will mean much to that section of the country.

OUTLOOK GOOD

In a brief chat with The Mail Mr. Stinson spoke very encouragingly of the outlook at Plaster Rock. He said that the supply of gypsum at Plaster Rock was apparently inexhaustible and there would be no difficulty in finding a market for it. Already he had made a contract with the Canada Cement Company for twelve thousand tons to be delivered at Montreal. The company also proposed to supply land plaster to the farmers to be used as fertilizer and expected to be able to dispose of a large quantity in this way at \$5 per ton.

MILL IN GOOD CONDITION

Mr. Stinson said that he had recently visited Plaster Rock in company with Messrs. Timmerman and Barrie and they had looked over the ground carefully. The mill and machinery were in good condition and with some slight repairs and operations they would be able to start work next month.

Mr. Stinson went on to say that they would employ from 30 to 50 men all of whom except the foreman and manager would be local men. The gypsum would be ground up and shipped to Montreal and the rock wall plaster would be put on the local market.

NEW DEPARTURE

Mr. Stinson thinks it quite likely that in the near future the company will install a calcinating plant and manufacture plaster board. He said that one million square feet of this product is now used in Canada and it all has to be imported.

Mr. Stinson is a native of St. Andrews, who has made his mark since going to Montreal. He is very much pleased with the prospect of being able to assist in the industrial development of his native province.

ENGLISH FIRM MAY LOCATE
LARGE FURNITURE FACTORY HERE

Abundant Power and Light Required—J.E. Stewart of Andover Claims That the St. John River Electrical Power Company Would be in a Position to Furnish Both—Bill to Incorporate Company Will be Up Next Week.

The bill to incorporate the St. John River Electrical Power Company will come before the Corporation Committee next week and Mr. J. E. Stewart of Andover, who is largely interested in the project for the furtherance of which the company is being organized, is in the city in connection with the matter. Mr. Stewart expects strong opposition to the passage of the bill but is confident that it will be passed.

The principal object of the St. John River Electrical Power Company is the development of power at or near Pokiook. The power is to be obtained by the building of a dam across the St. John River at the place mentioned. The power developed will be distributed among places along the St. John River. Mr. Stewart is of the opinion that power could easily be transmitted to Fredericton and be profitably used by local industries. The company will also furnish light to places along the St. John valley.

Mr. Stewart says that the proposal is to erect a dam with a height of thirty feet, which will be furnished with most modern sluices for the running of lumber and with a fish-way which would furnish ample means for fish to reach the waters of the Upper St. John. According to those promoting the bill neither fishing nor lumbering would be interfered with by the dam.

OPPOSITION EXPECTED.

In spite of what is promised, it is expected that there will be determined opposition to the passage of the bill by both the lumbering interests and by those interested in fishing on the Upper St. John and its tributaries.

LARGE INDUSTRY POSSIBLE.

An English capitalist named Fowler, who is now in the province, has been looking for a suitable site for a furniture factory. He desires power and light in abundance and it is probable, says Mr. Stewart, that he will select Fredericton as the place in which to locate his factory if there is a possibility of electrical development taking place near this city within the near future. Mr. Stewart is of the opinion that ample power

for this and similar industries could be obtained by damming the St. John River as proposed by his company. The furniture factory mentioned would require when in full operation 20,000,000 feet of hard-wood annually as raw material. The cutting of that quantity of lumber would furnish employment to a large number of men.

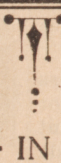
