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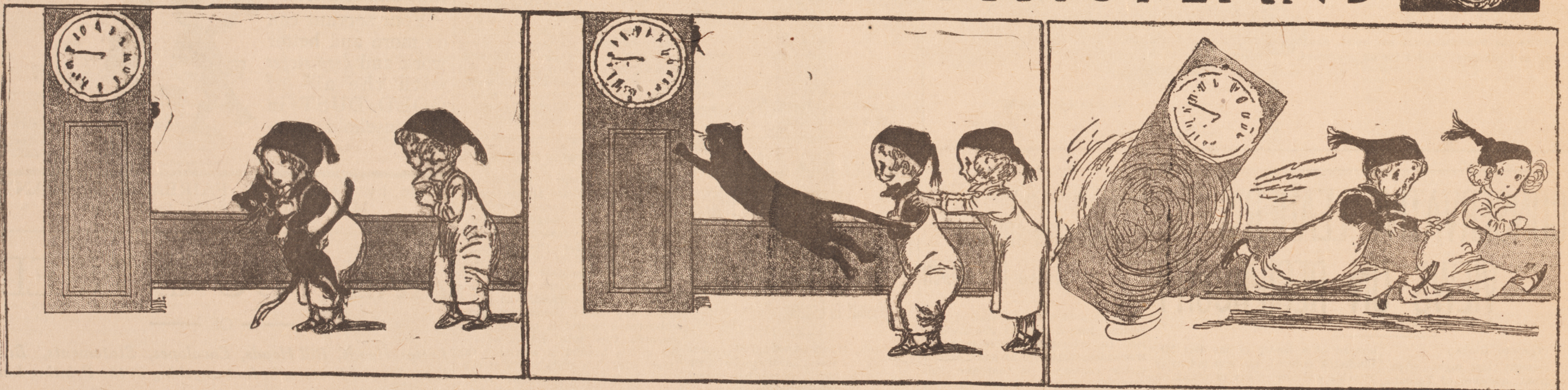

JACK and JILL in FAIRYLAND



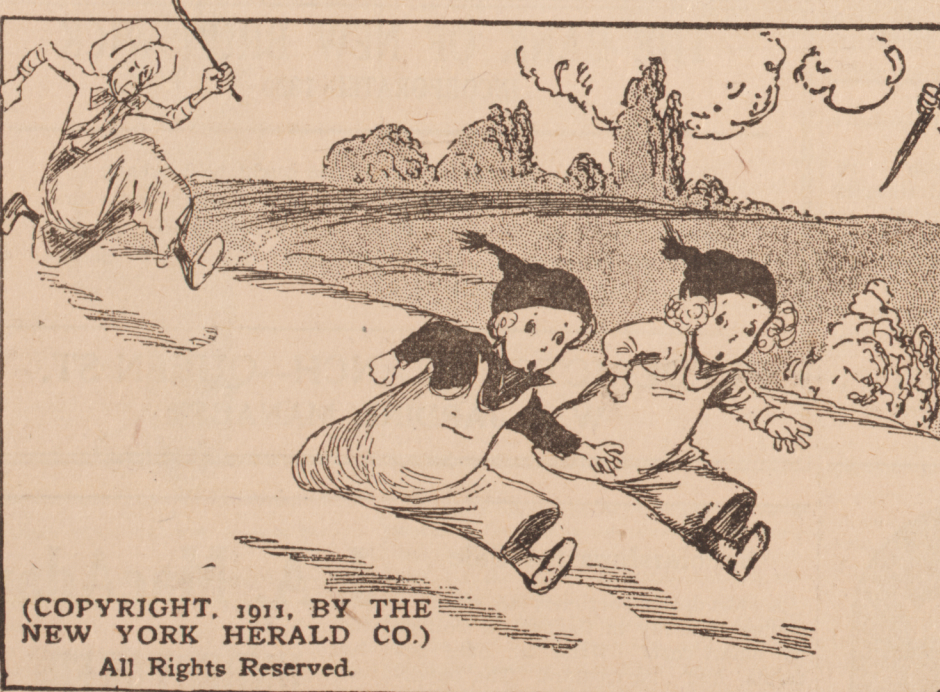
1.—Dickory, Dickory Dock,
