TRIBUTES TO MEMORY OF LATE THOS. ROBISON

Premier Hazen, Solicitor General McLeod and Mr. Tweeddale Make Reference to Death of York's Member in the Legislature--A Good Representative Says the Premier--House Adjourns as a Mark of Respect.

The House met on Monday at three o'clock.

Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to establish the Jordan Memorial Sanitarium. Also a Bill to legalize certain marriages; also a Bill in aid of local Sanitariums; and to amend Chapter 76, Consolidated Statutes relating to the solemnization of Marriage. He explained that the latter Bill was to make it the duty of the heads of Denominations and Sects to notify the Provincial Secretary of the removal of any Minister from the Province so that Licenses to solemnize marriage held by those removing, may be promptly cancelled in accordance with the provisions of the Act.

Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to amend the County Courts Act and explained that it made the time for appearance in County Court cases ten days and thus made the Act in harmony with the present Judicature Act.

Mr. Shipp on behalf of Mr. Cyr presented the petition of the Town of Edmundston in favor of a bill to incorporate the Town of Edmundston for light and power purposes. Mr. Munro presented the petition of the directors of the Carleton County Hospital, also of the Trustees of the Estate of the late Lewis B. Fisher in favor of a Bill relating to the Estate of the late Lewis P. Fisher.

Hon. Mr. Landry presented the annual report of the Hospital of St. Basil Madawaska Co.

MR. ROBISON'S DEATH

Hon. Mr. Hazen made the following statement to the House:

"Mr. Speaker, I have to announce the death of Thomas Robison, Esquire, one of the representatives for the County of York in the Legislature, which sad event occurred at his home in the Parish of Manners Sutton, last evening. In doing so I comprehend how feeble and ineffective are words to express our deep sense of the great loss that has been sustained. Having represented his parish in the municipal council for many years and having served as warden of that body, he was in 1908 elected by his fellow citizens to a seat in the Legislature and in the discharge of the duties consequent thereon, was attentive, industrious and painstaking and his wide experience and fairness made him a valuable member of committees which were influenced in no small measure by his suggestions and advice, which was always practical and abounding in common sense. As a party man he was loyal, steadfast and consistent. As a representative of the people he was faithful and conscientious and ever true to the public trust reposed in him. As a friend he was sincere and generous at all times and on all occasions and was a devoted husband and father. He always approached the consideration of any question calmly, moderately and intelligently and the party with which he was associated, and over whose councils he often presided, realize that they have sustained a very great loss. Possessed of a keen sense of humor, and of other social qualities, sincere and steadfast in his friendships and honorable in his political associations and alliance he will long be held in affectionate memory by those who have been associated with him in the work of the Legislature. My own relations with him were always of a most agreeable character and by his death I lose not only a staunch political adherent but

a warm and valued personal friend as well."

Mr. Hazen also announced his intention to move that when the House adjourned it stand adjourned until tomorrow night at eight o'clock. He said that arrangements had been made to have a special train leave here by C. P. R. at 12.30 o'clock noon tomorrow to convey Members of the Legislature who wished to attend the funeral to Harvey. The funeral would take place at three o'clock and the train would leave Harvey at 4 o'clock on its return to this City arriving at 5 o'clock and the debate on the speech from the throne would be resumed tomorrow night.

MR. TWEEDDALE

Mr. Tweeddale said,--In the absence of Mr. Robinson, the hon. leader of the hon. leader of the opposition, I wish to express the regret of the Members on this side of the House at the death of the late Mr. Robison. The member for York whose death occurred so suddenly was known as a genial man and a painstaking representative in the legislature. I concur in the remarks of the Premier and the expression of regret and condolence which I have just heard.

MR. McLEOD'S TRIBUTE

Hon. Mr. McLeod said, I feel that I cannot let this occasion pass without making some expression concerning the late Mr. Robison as my colleague and my friend. I have been intimately acquainted with him since I was a boy and I have known him always as a straight and conscientious party man. During many years while he was a member of the municipality of the County of York, for the Parish of Manners Sutton, I was closely connected with him as auditor of the county.

When, in 1903, I made my first essay into public life as a candidate, he ran with me in the forlorn hope of that year. In 1908 he was again my colleague and through all our relations, in business and in politics, I found him always a man of the highest sense of honor, a man whose word was his bond.

As a member of this legislature he brought to the consideration of public affairs, a keen, careful, well-balanced mind and a conscientious regard for the public duty. His qualities of mind and heart were such that they endeared him to all classes of people from one end of York Co. to another. Though a strong party man he was never narrow or bitter and he was highly regarded by men of both political parties. He brought to public life a fearless desire to do only his duty and I believe that no private or selfish consideration could move him from that path. He was a prince among men and he was best loved by those who knew him best. The people of York County have lost a citizen of sterling upright character and we, who had the honor of his friendship, have lost a friend who was tried and true, and it will be with the deepest and sincerest sense of grief that we shall tomorrow pay our last tribute to our departed friend.

Hon. Mr. Hazen moved that the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne be made the order of the day for tomorrow evening at eight o'clock.

The House adjourned at three forty-five.

HON. J. P. BURCHILL
