## SUNBURY COUNTY PATIENT DECLARED TO BE INCURABLE

Has Been in Victoria Hospital Two Years But According to Rule Must be Removed.

The regular meeting of the Hospital Board was held at the hospital yesterday, with President Randolph in the chair. The other gentlemen present were Vice-President Barry, Mayor Thomas, Warden Rogers, Mr. Sterling, Dr. McGrath, Mr. McMurray and the Secretary Treasurer. Considerable business was transacted and plans outlined for future operations.

In the treasurer's report, items were shown of a fairly large expenditure for the month, but he did not report any cash donations for February. To offset the receipts was an expenditure overlapping the receipts, but not to a serious extent. The matron in her report, showed that twenty-five patients were treated during the month, two of whom died.

## ACCEPTED ON PROBATION.

Miss Ethel Harvey has just completed her three months' course of probation and upon the certificate and recommendation of Dr. Holden, and the matron, was accepted as a student-nurse. Before obtaining a diploma, she will serve in the institution for three years.

## PLANS FOR ALTERATIONS.

The president laid on the table a series of plans, prepared by Architect Minue, showing the proposed changes in the Dow wing to accommodate more than one contagious disease at the same time. While the estimate of cost was not provided, it is believed that between one and two thousand dollars will be required. In view of this, some of the members favored the idea of looking more to the future by the erection of an entirely new building. The present plans only furnish three additional beds and if these cost about \$500 a piece, it was claimed the change would be too costly. However, the building committee, which is composed of President Randolph, Judge Barry and Warden Rogers, was authorized to call for tenders as per plans and specifications just prepared.

## MR. TENNANT'S SUCCESSOR.

Since the retirement from the Board of President Tennant in January in accordance with the expiry of his term of office, no successor has yet been appointed. The trustee board, by unwritten law, is supposed to be composed of representatives from the different religious bodies, and the present vacancy is from the George Street Baptist Church. Owing to the union of the Baptist churches it was suggested that one representative from the united church would be sufficient, but this view was not heartily accepted. The names of several gentlemen have been considered and yesterday another was recommended. Action was deferred in the matter until next meeting.

Dr. McGrath from the committee appointed to have a report of the hospital work for the past year published, reported progress and thought the committee would shortly be in a position to ask for tenders for the work.

## CASE DECLARED INCURABLE.

For about two years a patient from Sunbury County has been tenderly cared for in the hospital and by her long occupancy of a bed in the free ward, has been a favorite with the staff as well as visitors. It has frequently been claimed that the case is an incurable one and as such cannot be retained in the hospital, according to the by-laws. This matter was brought to a close yesterday when one of the visiting physicians reported formally to the Board that the young woman so long an inmate of the hospital, is possessed of an incurable disease. The secretary treasurer will at once notify the interested parties to remove the patient and that until she is transferred the usual fee will be exacted. An opportunity may now come to the commissioners of Sunbury's poor to do a little mission work.

After disposing of several routine matters, the Board adjourned.

## FREE SITE AND WATER WITH TAX EXEMPTION OFFERED

City Council Considers Application of Chestnut Canoe Co. for Assistance—Interest Not Guaranteed.

The City Council, in committee last night, considered the application of the Chestnut Canoe Company for financial assistance and certain concessions from the city, and decided what it would be prepared to offer the company. The application of the Chestnut Canoe Company was made some time ago, the city being asked to guarantee the interest on a loan of \$10,000 for a term of years and to grant exemption from taxation and free water for a similar term. The city was also asked to furnish additional land on which the company guarantees to erect another building. The company further agreed to increase the output of the factory.

## CONCESSIONS OFFERED.

The members of the Council after considering the matter, decided to offer the company exemption from taxation for ten years for free water for a similar period. On the surrender by the company of the lease of the lot north of that occupied by the factory building, the city agrees to grant a lease of the lot south of that occupied by the factory, the rental of the two lots to be the nominal sum of one dollar per year, the lease to extend over ten years. The terms of the lease are also to be altered so as to permit of the manufacture of snow-shoes by the company.

## BIG TIMBER DEAL.

An Edmundston despatch to The Globe telling of the purchase by the D. Fraser & Sons, Ltd., of all of the property of Messrs. James Murchie's Sons' Company, in Madawaska county and at Lake Temiscouata, says the sale includes 70,000 acres of timber land at Lake Temiscouata and on the Madawaska River, the mill property at Edmundston with two miles of piers and booms along the Madawaska River, the store and twelve dwelling houses at Edmundston. The price paid is understood to be \$342,000.00, and in addition the actual cost of the present season's cut of lumber. It is likely that Messrs. D. Fraser & Sons, Ltd., will enlarge and alter the mill at Edmundston so as to greatly increase its capacity.

## NUMBER OF FROZEN WATER PIPES GREATER THAN EVER BEFORE

Winter of 1911 One of Most Severe on Record—Long Period of Continuous Cold Weather.

The winter of 1911 will go down in the history of Fredericton as one of the coldest known to its inhabitants. The official records for February, taken at the meteorological station at the University, showed that the average temperature for the month was four degrees below the average for that month during the past thirty-seven years. March bids fair to keep up the record made by February as there has hardly been a night since the beginning of the month that the mercury did not go below the cipher. Last night according to the record kept at the city pumping station, the lowest temperature was 10 degrees below zero.

## SERVICE PIPES FROZEN.

The present winter has been most remarkable on account of the freezing of service pipes. In previous winters water pipes were frozen, but never so often as this winter. Mr. D. J. Shea, a well-known plumber of this city, who has had many years' experience here, says that without doubt the continued cold is more severe than for at least twelve years past. Extreme cold at night, followed by comparatively mild weather in the day-time, has enabled the frost to penetrate the ground farther than in former winters. His advice to householders is, when water is observed running slowly to allow it to run continuously. All plumbers report calls for frozen water pipes more numerous than for many years past. Several service pipes have been frozen during the past few days.

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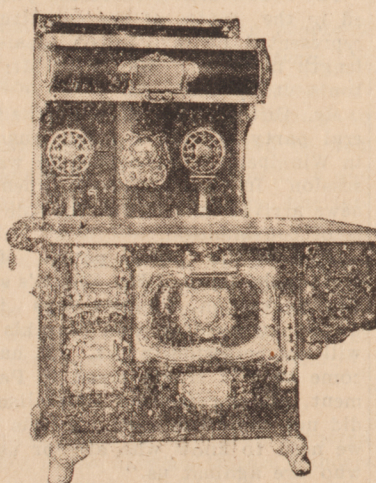
