TAFT PROGRAMME IN DES MOINES

Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 28.—The Greater Des Moines committee has put the finishing touches to the programme for the "Taft Day" celebration tomorrow. The President will take breakfast at the Grant Club, where he is expected to make a brief address to a gathering of Iowa editors and business men. Later in the forenoon he will address the general public at the Coliseum, where he will be introduced by Governor Carroll. Senator Kenyon, former Senator Lafe Young, and Congressman Prouty will be members of the presidential escort.

BORDEN PROMISES THEM CONSIDERATION

Ottawa, Sept. 27.—The unsettled conditions which prevail in the Government consequent upon its defeat is causing more or less unrest and much uncertainty among those who have business public or private, pending with the ministry. The broad constitutional question, is whether having lost popular confidence the Cabinet really can do anything at all save possibly the most ordinary routine. It is taken for granted that it cannot make appointments following the Aberdeen precedent of 1896 and it is announced that there is no such intention.

If the existing vacancies could be filled a balm would be afforded some of the defeated candidates or others, but there is little inclination to attempt any such procedure. Of more serious moment is the question of providing funds or credits for public works in course of construction.

The Montreal Harbor Commissioners, for instance, wished to know if the money is to be advanced to them or if they must go to the bank for it.

Mr. Robert Bickerdike, M.P., is here trying to get for the International Bank its belated certificate. It has a million of capital tied up. There are numerous other cases of a similar character pending but in many there is a lack of definite assurance that anything will be done.

Politicians come and go, but there are fewer in town today than yesterday. Mr. Borden stays at his home and is receiving a stream of callers. He is devoting his main energy to the problem of his cabinet. Yesterday afternoon a delegation from the Eastern Townships urged the selection of Mr. Rufus Pope, ex-M. P.

Another one suggested Mr. Samuel Barker of Hamilton, while from all over the country are coming letters begging the chief not to overlook this one or that one. Mr. Borden promises consideration of the claims of all. He is not making any definite promises. There is the best of reasons for the belief that while he may have fixed on some of his cabinet nothing final with regard to the assignments of portfolios has not yet been determined.

Cornell and the Carlisle Indians, both of whom have already started their schedule, will be seen again, the Ithaca players meeting Colgate and the Indians playing Dickinson.

intimates an intention of getting out as soon as possible, it will probably be near the end of next week before he submits to Earl Grey, the resignation of himself and his Ministers. A reasonable delay will not be objected to by the Conservatives, and meanwhile Mr. Borden is given the opportunity of devoting attention to the many problems of Cabinet construction.

An interesting speculation arises with regard to the navy. There is a department of the naval service, but no ship save one in commission. It costs \$70,000 a month now. Contracts were ready to be awarded but they are held in abeyance. The policy of Mr. Borden is the antithesis of that of the defeated government.

Parties tendering will be required to accept the fair wages schedule prepared or to be prepared by the Department of Labor, which schedule will form part of the contract.

Contractors are requested to bear in mind that tenders will not be considered unless made strictly in accordance with the printed forms, and in the case of firms, unless there are attached the actual signature, the nature of the occupation, and place of residence of each member of the firm.

An accepted bank cheque for the sum of \$20,000.00 made payable to the order of the Minister of Railways and Canals must accompany each tender, which sum will be forfeited if the party tendering declines entering into contract for the work at the rates stated in the offer submitted.

The cheque thus sent in will be returned to the respective contractors whose tenders are not accepted.

The cheque of the successful tenderer will be held as security, or part security, for the due fulfillment of the contract to be entered into.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eight acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

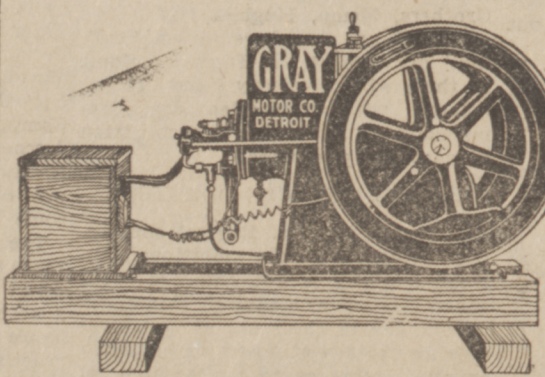
