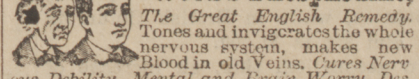

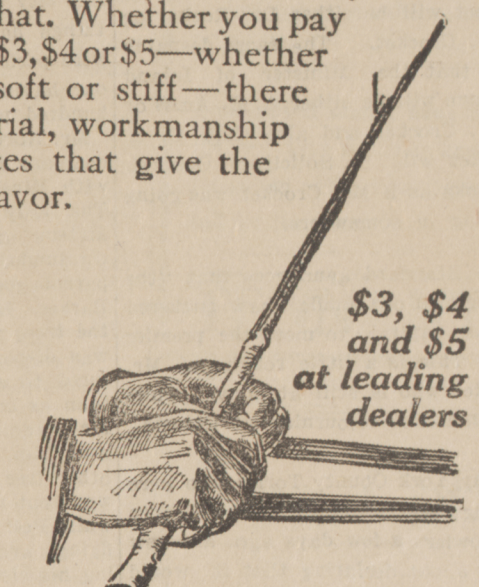

THE BIBLE SOCIETY MAKES AN APPEAL

The ever aggressive Parent Bible Society continues to manifest herculean strength and wonderful vision in penetrating the dark recesses of the earth with the illuminating light of the Holy Bible. The Canadian Bible Society, with headquarters in Toronto, is also doing a splendid work in Canada as well as assisting the British and Foreign Bible Society in its world-wide work. In a few days the local branch will hold its annual meeting and arrangements will be made for the observance of Bible Sunday and the yearly collecting. The following most interesting compilation of facts and general information just published by the Canadian Bible Society will be enjoyed by our readers.

In the history of world evangelization, two practical results arrest and hold attention: The deeper desire among Christians for co-operation and concord; and clearer views of the potency of Holy Scripture to meet and supply the needs of the dispersed multitudes of mankind.

THE PARENT SOCIETY. The British and Foreign Bible Society is the promoter and visible token of such co-operation and vision. The 107th annual report is full of splendid encouragement, and notwithstanding the deficit on the year's accounts, in tone and atmosphere is thoroughly inspiring. On the Society's list of versions, there are now 432 different forms of speech, an addition of eight new tongues during the year. A record circulation in these languages is announced—the total includes 903,827 Bibles in 107 different languages; 1,199,339 New Testaments in 102 more languages; and 4,872,720 portions of Scriptures in 223 other languages and tongues—altogether 6,975,836, as against 6,820,024 last year. The income, including special funds, reached £243,991 sterling; and the expenses were £249,994—a deficit on the year's operations of £6,003.

The Rev. John H. Ritson, M.A., Secretary of the Parent Society, declares that the deficit has one comforting aspect: "It was not due to any falling off in general income, which had increased by £9,286, but to the fact that the Society was compelled to keep pace with the combined development of all missionary societies in the foreign field; and let it be remembered that all the societies are growing in the foreign field."

The Bible Society's alliance with foreign missions is most intimate. With the co-operation of the missionaries, it prepares the translations needed, prints the editions, bears the loss involved by their sales at reduced prices, and sends to the missions of reformed Christians, practically free of cost, all the Scriptures needed in their work. The Society is, therefore, the helper and co-worker of all the churches. Its Colporteurs and Bible women, the advance agents of the Kingdom, are found in all the great roads, foot-paths and streets of the world; visiting lonely homes and scattered hamlets, or mixing with the crowds at markets and festivals. Their self-denying and invaluable labors are receiving ever fuller recognition from those in the mission field, who are best acquainted with their value, and have observed rest-

ing upon them the tokens of the Divine blessing. The missionaries, consequently, are the Society's warmest friends, and most devoted helpers, and bear unanimous testimony to the indispensable assistance obtained from this great missionary association.

THE CANADIAN AUXILIARY.

The Canadian Bible Society—the Canadian Department of the British and Foreign Bible Society—aters upon the second quinquennium, with widening opportunities and increased devotion to the vast undertaking before it. Courage and enterprise characterize the Canadian Auxiliary, and the diagram of circulation shows an increase of 45,000 Scriptures upon the total of the preceding year. A "folder," entitled "The Word of God in Many Tongues"—an exhibit of languages spoken in Canada—contains specimens of 110 different languages and dialects current in Canada and Newfoundland, in which versions of the Scriptures have been asked for, and provided by the Society.

To Canadianize and Christianize the foreign immigrants coming to Canada, moreover, the Bible Society has issued between twenty and thirty Diglot versions—the English and foreign language in parallel columns—for the purpose of teaching these foreign immigrants the English language, and, at the same time, sowing the seed of God's Word in their hearts. These Scriptures are circulated by our Colporteurs and Bible women from Newfoundland to Alaska, and are placed freely at the disposal of the churches of all denominations for missionary purposes.

THE UNBARRED DOORS. To an extent, unexampled in history, the world is open for the entrance of the Word of Life. The enterprises and triumphs of Christian missions are creating as many new and imperious claims upon the Bible Society, which never refuses to publish a duly authenticated version in a new tongue. And opportunities for the wider circulation of the Scriptures are responsibilities assigned by a Master Who expects results. One consideration, impressive beyond others, is "the open and needy world, the heavy cost of necessary expansion, and the urgent need of generous assistance from Canada, for this wide-world work; which must be done without delay, if to be done with the maximum effect in the Providence of God."

OUR OWN COUNTRY'S NEED; AND APPEAL. The Canadian income, last year, was \$125,462.67. This enabled the Committee, after meeting the needs of a rapidly developing field, to forward as a free contribution to the Parent Society, \$24,000. Canada is missionary ground; and our problem grows more difficult and acute with each year, because of the increasing inflow of new citizens of varied nationalities, spreading over an ever widening area of settlement. In view of the imperative claims of the Canadian immigrant, and in order to increase our contribution to the Parent Society—that the demands of the world for new versions of Holy Scripture may be met—the Canadian General Board issues a call to branches and congregations to increase,

The supply of the Bible for the world, a work essential to all missions—home and foreign—is seriously threatened, because the Bible Society is receiving, relatively, a much smaller share of sympathy and support than its purpose and activities demand. The Canadian Auxiliary never had such wide opportunities before it, or such imperious claims upon it, as it has today. And unless the normal income be promptly and permanently increased, it will be driven to refuse new calls, and to reduce present work. Therefore, your favorable consideration of the appeal now submitted is requested; and it is respectfully suggested that you invite, at the earliest date, the attention of your people by special discourse or otherwise, to the unparalleled opportunity now set before the British and Foreign Bible Society and its great Auxiliaries, for the translation and diffusion of the Word of God throughout the world; and adopt such measures as may be necessary to secure from your community the desired increase of eighty per cent. on the givings of last year.

HOT POLITICAL FIGHT IN QUAKER CITY

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 28—It is doubtful if the political pot in the Quaker City has ever boiled at a livelier rate than at present, on the eve of the primaries in which the fate of the Republican "machine" and the political prestige of United States Senator Boies Penrose are about equally involved.

Ostensibly the fight in the primary election to be held day after tomorrow is to decide who shall be the Republican nominee to succeed John E. Reyburn as mayor of Philadelphia and who shall be the county officials. Senator Penrose as one of the leaders of the Taft forces at Washington, felt it incumbent upon him to insure a Republican victory in Philadelphia this fall with the national election so close at hand. Consequently when it was proposed to nominate a candidate unacceptable to him he lost no time getting into the fight.

The Penrose choice for the mayoralty is George H. Earle, Jr., president of the Real Estate Trust Company and prominent in financial circles. Opposed to Mr. Earle is William S. Vare, a member of the Vare family which is said to have made millions out of municipal contracts. The Vare candidacy has the support of Mayor Reyburn, though the Mayor found it advisable to declare his neutrality in the contest after steps were taken for a legislative investigation of his administration.

The Democratic party and the Keystone party, the last-named composed of reformers from both the old parties, are united in their opposition to the Republicans but divided in their choice of candidates. One faction is supporting Rudolph Blakenburg for the mayoralty nomination, while the other favors D. Clarence Gibboney. Both Blakenburg and Gibboney are well known as reformers.

MERGER OF CABLE COMPANIES

London, Sept. 29—At special meetings held today the stockholders of the Anglo-American Cable and Direct United States cable companies gave their approval to the proposed lease of their companies to the Western Union Telegraph Companies. Under the proposed arrangement the two cable companies will be operated in direct connection with each other and with the Western Union land system, bringing the eight cables of the three companies under one control.
