## DAVID RUSSELL ACCUSES GREENSHIELDS

(Continued from page 1)

Asked what he meant by saying that his brother was in the plot the witness replied that he had meant that John had been misled.

When the woman began sending these messages attempting to make appointments with me, I feared that a badger game was on.

The witness stated that by the badger game he meant that a woman, should make an appointment, would manage the circumstances to make them appear incriminating. Then the man who was supposed to be her husband would appear and assail or threaten Russell.

"This would have put me out of the land deal," said Mr. Russell.

Montreal, Sept. 28.—David Russell, the plaintiff in the suit for \$250,000 against the Pinkerton Detective Agency, and his brother, John Russell, jr., of St. John, were the chief witnesses today, and each gave sensational testimony. John Russell made clear the part he played in the plan to have his brother confined in a sanitarium and told how he quickly retired when he learned the facts.

In the first place, he came here after he received a telegram from Moses Cochanthaler, a prominent Montreal jeweller, and a supposed friend of David, saying that Dave's mind was affected.

Rushing Montreal, he was met by J. R. Gilliland, the C.P.R. terminal superintendent; McNamara, Montreal manager of Pinkertons, and Cochanthaler, who told him that his brother had become entirely deranged over an attempt to play the badger game on him.

Then a plan was devised whereby David Russell was to be enticed to New York, examined by alienists, and sent to a sanitarium.

John Russell said he was surprised at the whole thing and wanted to see his brother, but he was told it would only make "Dave" worse.

John Russell then accompanied McNamara to New York and consulted alienists, who finally became suspicious and would have nothing to do with committing a man to an asylum until they examined him or consulted his lawyers.

Dr. Prichard, one of the experts, finally communicated with Mr. Rose, David Russell's New York solicitor, and received such a rebuff that he immediately retired from the whole affair.

After Dr. Prichard had gone, witness went to the phone and called up Mr. Rose, who dressed him down very severely; called him a fool, and told him to go back to St. John.

SAW HE WAS DUPED.

"I told Mr. McNamara that Dave's lawyers said my brother was perfectly sane, and on this information I was going home by the first train I could catch. I said about the same thing to Mr. James and afterwards suggested I ought to see my brother David, but he would not agree to this."

Witness added that Mr. McNamara maintained his former attitude, which was one of anxiety, that witness should not meet David Russell, and to avoid the possibility of such a meeting in New York, they joined the train for Montreal at an outside station.

On the way to Montreal witness told Mr. McNamara repeatedly that he was mistaken about David Russell. Mr. McNamara replied:

"You have done what any other man would have done for his brother, but he will never discover it."

Witness replied:

"I wish I was as sure of going to heaven as he is of discovering it."

Witness stated in further conversation with Mr. McNamara that he offered to pay the detective all his charges. Mr. McNamara said there would not be any charge as David had paid Pinkertons \$2,000 and they had not done \$1,200 worth of work for him.

At the afternoon session, after Dr. Wesley, the Windsor hotel physician, and Dr. Kennedy, a personal friend of the plaintiff, and Austin Mosher, a newspaper reporter, testified that they had intimate acquaintance with David Russell for several years and never saw anything to indicate mental derangement, Mr. Russell himself took the stand.

ALL IN LEAGUE AGAINST HIM.

According to his testimony, the persistent attempts of a woman registered as Mrs. J. S. Patterson, of Pittsburg, with her "hub" at the Windsor hotel to make his acquaintance, aroused his suspicion, and he engaged the Pinkertons to find out who the couple were. Mr. Russell said he was thoroughly alarmed about this time because he had been shadowed and twice attacked near the Windsor hotel. He had a big law suit on hand and he suspected it all had something to do with it.

The Pinkertons, through McNamara reported to him that Patterson was a respectable Pittsburg millionaire. He did not believe the report and investigated for himself, only to learn that the Pinkertons had de-

ceived him. He then discharged McNamara, his private secretary, Bush, and his clerk, Charles Racine, whom he thought in league with the Pinkertons to deceive him.

He had personally gone to Pittsburg with private detectives and his secretary, and they all tried to convince him that he was wrong in his impression about Patterson, whom the Pinkertons reported worth seven millions.

Then he secured the services of a Pittsburg firm of lawyers, as well as W. J. Burns, the famous detective, with the result that it was learned through a commercial agency that Patterson was a man of no financial standing.

After he discharged the Pinkertons and entered action for damages, McNamara tried to persuade him to drop the proceedings and he would endeavor to get him a settlement of the million-dollar land suit. McNamara assured him he could do it. He did not consent to the deal, but said he would be in New York the next day and would hear the proposition. Going to New York, he accidentally met McNamara on the train who asked him to lie low, as he had the "goods" with him in regard to the land case.

The "goods" proved to be Sir Donald Mann, vice-president of the C.N.R., who was concerned in one of his land actions.

When he arrived in New York he found that Sir Donald, then Mr. Donald Mann, was there and registered at the Plaza.

The court then adjourned till tomorrow.

In the course of his evidence, Mr. Russell also testified that Chief Detective Carpenter and Detective Gorman, one of the Montreal staff who had been working for him, had also been false, so he dropped the whole bunch. Up to this time he had not learned of the plot to place him in an insane asylum.

Mr. Russell's evidence was clear cut all the way through. He was precise and showed a remarkable memory for dates and details of the affair from the beginning to the end.

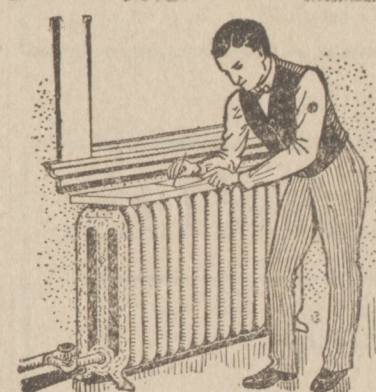

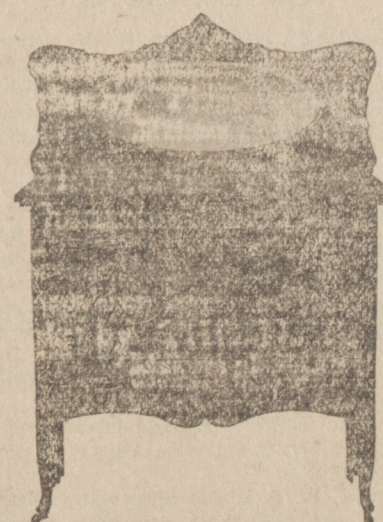
