





mark all season.DEMOCRATS HAVE STRONG
MAN IN GOV. WILSON

(Montreal Witoese)

The long drawn out battle of bal-
lots at the Democratic convention
has ended in a glorious victory. A
victory for progress on the same
lines, for freedom from boss rule and
for the overthrow of demagoguery.
Dr. Woodrow Wilson was for years
president of Princeton University. He
is a man who has read history and
political economy not for the pur-
pose of supporting an argument or a
party's position, as has been Mr.
Clark's lot in his long service in
Congress, but with the purpose of
seeking out the truth. He is a schol-
ar of large attainments and good
judgment. Two years ago his adopted
state, New Jersey, which had been
wallowing in a slough of the most
corrupt boss-ridden politics was
shocked by an ogre of beer and dan-
cing women that took place in its
capital on the closing day of the ses-
sion. Mr. Wilson was asked to give
up his life tenure of a most honor-
able position to jump into the mire
of politics on the chance that he
might carry against the bosses a
majority of the votes and so win for
himself a two year term of office, to
rid his adopted state of its bondage.
The prospect that he had of winning
was on ordinary political calcula-
tions but slight. He must have felt
a strong call to leadership in reform
and a great faith in the power of
right and in the prevalence of desire
for the best among the electorate to
make the self sacrificing plunge. That
he made it and won by the force of
his personal appeal without stooping
to ally himself with a single boss in
a state that had for long known noth-
ing but machine rule, marked him
immediately as a great leader.

Immediately on becoming Governor
he had a chance to show his attitude
toward the rising wave of popular
government in the election of a sen-
ator. The custom has been for the
senators who represent the states to
be elected by the state legislatures.
The new spirit is in revolt against
this and demands that the senators
be elected directly by the people of
the state. At the same election at
which the people of New Jersey had
elected Mr. Wilson to the govern-
ment they had expressed their desire
on a primary ballot for the election
of Mr. Martine for senator. The state
legislature did not like their choice
and would have speedily elected an-
other to the office had the Governor
not stumped the state in favor of
the people's candidate, and brought
such a demand for his election to
bear on the legislators as they did
not dare to disobey. The victory
made him both a progressive cham-
pion of national note, and identified
his voice with that of the people in
all matters of state legislation. One
further thing he did, we are sure sin-
cerely which placed him on the very
top of the rising wave of popular
government. He announced that
though in his classes he had spoken
against it for twenty years, he was
now in favor of the initiative and
referendum in state politics. The re-
call either of judgments or of judges
has never sanctioned, and this
draws one broad line between him
and Mr. Roosevelt. As a progressive
with the hearty support of Mr. Bry-
an, Mr. Wilson will cut the ground
right out from under Mr. Roosevelt's
feet.

The very best incident of the whole
convention is the very worst. To

the very last ballot Mr. Charles
Murphy cast the solid vote of Tam-
many Hall and the State of New
York against Mr. Wilson. In this
way the Tammany leader gave elo-
quent answer to the question that
The New York World has been edi-
torially asking of him for the last
two weeks: "Must a boss be an ass."
No one incident will so strengthen
the hands of Mr. Wilson throughout
the whole country as the undying
haired of Tammany Hall. How dif-
ferent his whole campaign has been
from that of Mr. Roosevelt! He has
not played circus clown, not built up
a machine, nor allied with himself a
hundred bosses and a former partner
of Mr. Morgan. He owes nothing but
to the people, and will, if elected,
enter on his term of office a free
man. Canada has reason to rejoice
as well as the United States in the
nomination, for what works for the
good of one nation cannot but react
on the other for good. As a party
the Democrats are pledged to lower
their tariff wall, which will be an
advantage to us, though not so great
an advantage to us as we have it in
our power to make at any time by
lowering our tariff wall. As a party
the Democrats are against foreign
aggression, and in the present state
of affairs their victory will put an
end to any fear of the annexation of
Mexico which would be in danger of
accomplishment were Mr. Roosevelt
successful. An erratic or self-centred
man, playing in the presidency either
role of demagogue or Caesar, would
be a menace to the peace of the
world. From either Mr. Wilson or
Mr. Taft the world has nothing to
fear, but everything to hope for and
whichever wins can regard the con-
test with equanimity. They are both
friends to all nations and foes to
none.



OF BORDEN'S POLICY

Sydney, Australia, July 6.—Consi-
derable surprise and regret is expressed
here over the Canadian policy of
offering Dreadnoughts to the imperial
navy instead of following the Aus-
tralian precedent. Such a policy is
entirely disapproved of here and there
is a growing feeling among those in-
terested in Pacific problems that the
most advisable course is to concen-
trate Australian, New Zealand and
Canadian forces on the creation of
an imperial Pacific fleet, leaving
England to control the Atlantic. The
premier stated that he welcomed the
proposals of thorough co-operation
along such lines and had taken steps
to secure that consummation.
