NEWS FORECAST FOR
THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., July 6—President Taft is scheduled to return to Washington Monday from his brief outing at Beverly. It is expected that some time during the week the sub-committee of nine, appointed from the Republican National Committee, will wait on the president to learn his wishes regarding the conduct of his campaign.

The week will probably see a conference of some of the Democratic national leaders to discuss preliminaries incident to the beginning of the presidential campaign. The third party movement will manifest itself in the holding of conferences in a number of the states to organize in the interest of the Roosevelt presidential candidacy.

Republicans of Iowa are to meet in state convention in Des Moines Wednesday to name candidates for Supreme Court judges and adopt a platform.

The national convention of the prohibition party for the nomination of candidates for president and vice president will be called to order on Wednesday in Atlantic City. Among those now mentioned for the head of the ticket are Dr. Aaron S. Watkins of Ohio, Francis E. Baldwin of New York, Eugene W. Chaffin of Arizona, Andrew J. Houston of Texas, and Madison F. Larkin of Pennsylvania. The Duke of Connaught, accompanied by Princess Patricia, is due to arrive in Winnipeg Tuesday to begin his tour of the Canadian west. On the day following his arrival in the western metropolis His Royal Highness will officiate at the opening of the Canadian Industrial Exhibition.

Thursday is the day fixed for the general elections in the Province of Saskatchewan. A spirited campaign is in progress and both parties appear confident of victory. The result of the election will be of more than local interest as it is expected to afford an indication of whether there has been any change of views on the part of the people of Western Canada on the subject of reciprocity with the United States.

The most important events on the program of the Olympic games in Stockholm will be decided during the week. These events will include all of the principal athletic fixtures in which the Americans will take part. Saturday will see the finals in the standing high jump, the discus throw, the 400-metre and team race. On the following day will take place the great Marathon race, in which America hopes to repeat her victory achieved at London two years ago.

The convention calendar of the week will be unusually well filled. Among the most important gatherings will be the conventions of the National Education Association, in Chicago; the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, in Portland, Ore.; the National Municipal League, in Los Angeles; the United States League of Local Building and Loan Associations, in Atlantic City; the International Association of Chiefs of Police, in Toronto; the Fire Merchants' Association of North America, in Detroit; and the biennial singer-fest of the Norwegian Singers' Association, which is to be held in Fargo, N. D.

JUDGE SUMMING UP
IN CAMORIST TRIAL

Viterbo, Italy, July 6—The presiding judge in the Camorra trial today continued his summing up of the testimony given during the two years' trial to the culpability of the accused in the murder of Gennaro Cuccolo. He did not omit any of the details in explaining the case to the jury and referred at some length to the flight of "Ericone" Enrico Angano to America.

Ericone bit his lips until they were bleeding but nevertheless although evidently suffering from the most intense excitement kept his promise not to interrupt the judge.

PLATTSBURGH HONORS CHAMPLAIN

Plattsburgh, N.Y., July 6—An imposing monument to commemorate the three hundredth anniversary of the discovery of Lake Champlain was dedicated here today with an interesting program that included literary exercises and military parade. The oration of the day was delivered by Francis Lynde Stetson of New York city.

The memorial consists of a huge granite pedestal surmounted by a statue of the famous discoverer, Samuel de Champlain. At the base of the monument is a canoe with the figure of an Indian peering anxiously out as if at the invasion of the white stranger. The memorial occupies a commanding position at the mouth of the Saranac river on a rise of ground overlooking the harbor of Cumberland Bay where was fought the famous battle of Plattsburgh, September 11, 1814.

MADE PEOPLE'S HAIR
STAND ON END

Chicago, July 6—Residents of Rogers Park, witnessed a strange phenomenon yesterday afternoon. About the middle of the afternoon the sky above Rogers Park became overcast. Some of the people became overcast or almost so by the oppressive heat and they strolled to the lake shore at the foot of Morse Avenue. As the crowd watched the sails on the black river, their hair suddenly stood up and it was not from anything they saw either. Their hair just naturally turned upward toward the overladen sky. Little girls whose hair was untripped by rats or any other contrivances, presented a strange appearance as they ran around with a circle of hair above their heads like Indian war chiefs.




