## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

## WISCONSIN LUTHERAN CONFERENCE

WASAW, Wis., August 22—The triennial meeting of the Evangelical Lutheran Wisconsin State conference of the Missouri Synod opened here this morning at Zion Lutheran church, with about 170 ministers belonging to the conference, in attendance. The program includes discussions of various theological topics and a number of addresses on church work. The conference will remain in session three days and tomorrow evening the customary communion service will be held. In connection with the conference the triennial reunion of the alumni of Concordia college of Milwaukee is held here. Many of the ministers attending the conference are alumni of that college.



## INVENTOR OF THE BESSEMER PROCESS

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 22—Today saw the centenary of the birth of William Kelly, who is generally credited with the invention of the Bessemer process for converting melted cast iron into malleable steel, a discovery which revolutionized the steel industry and helped to make Pittsburg and the neighboring towns one of the greatest industrial centers in the world.

Kelly was born in this city August 22, 1811, and early in life manifested an uncommon aptitude for mechanics. In 1845 he removed to Kentucky, where he acquired an iron works on the Cumberland River. Here it was that he conceived the plan of despoiling with fuel in the process of refining and decarbonizing iron by the introduction of a current of air. After several years of experimenting he finally perfected the process, which was long known as "Kelly's air-boiling process," and which was used for the manufacture of boiler-plates before Sir Henry Bessemer was known. When the latter brought out his process in England in 1856, Mr. Kelly asserted that Bessemer process from England in 1856, Mr. Kelly obtained his knowledge of the process from English workmen employed by him in America. Subsequently both inventors applied for patents in the United States, but the commissioner issued one only, to Mr. Kelly, acknowledging the priority of his invention of the process.

## TO OPERATE G. T. P. THIS COMING FALL

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 21—At a conference between the city council and the G. T. P. engineers tonight matters in connection with the G.T.P. terminals here were dealt with and terms agreed upon. District Engineer A. M. Boillon and Resident Engineer L. H. Wheaton were present on behalf of G.T.P. The council agreed to supply water to the railway for fifteen years for ten cents, nine cents, seven and a half cents per thousand gallons, for five-year periods respectively.

The G.T.P. requires twenty acres of the city's land for yards and shops and the council agreed to accept \$125 per acre, the engineers agreeing to recommend this amount.

The G. T. P. asked for a fixed valuation and it was decided to make the price paid for the land the basis of taxation.

District Engineer Boillon stated that the G.T.P. intended having trains running over this section, of the line this fall, while Resident Engineer Wheaton stated that plans were now being prepared for a ferry service to carry cars to complete the connecting link at Levis until the Quebec bridge is built.

District Engineer Boillon stated it was the intention of the G.T.P. to advertise Moncton as a manufacturing centre with a view of creating traffic for the road.

## GOOD WORDS FOR YORK'S LIBERAL CANDIDATE

## AMERICAN CAPITAL TO BUILD PAPER MILLS

(Montreal Herald)  
The vanguard of the American invasion invited by reciprocity is upon us!

But it is an invasion of good sound money—millions of it—that it coming here to build mills; not to exploit Canadian natural resources to provide raw material for American industries, but to manufacture that raw material in Canada with Canadian labor.

The most vigorous opponent of reciprocity in the States was the paper trust, but as soon as the measure showed signs of passing, that vigorous institution rushed men over the border and began to get options on the best sites and the choicest timber lands available.

FREE PULP AND PAPER  
One feature of the reciprocity agreement is the admission of Canadian pulp and paper free into the States, provided the wood entering into its manufacture has not been subject to any export taxation. This, in Quebec and Ontario, bars wood cut on Crown Lands, but applies to that cut on private lands. As a natural consequence, these lands have already experienced a sharp rise in value, which is likely to increase unless the provincial governments modify their Crown Land restrictions.

Already large areas have been taken up by American paper interests near Ottawa and along the St. Maurice, and it is understood that representations will soon be made to the Quebec Government regarding the investment of many millions, if taxation is removed.

A \$30,000,000 PROPOSITION  
One proposition involves the expenditure of \$30,000,000 for the construction of mills, water powers, etc. in Quebec, to manufacture news print card board, and similar products all chemical pulp for further manufacture into higher grades of paper.

One item of this proposition involves the erection of a \$500,000 mill on the St. Maurice, to employ 3,000 men.

And this capital, it is understood is ready for immediate investment through most of it will await the decision of the Provincial Government on the Crown Land Government on the Crown Land timber question.

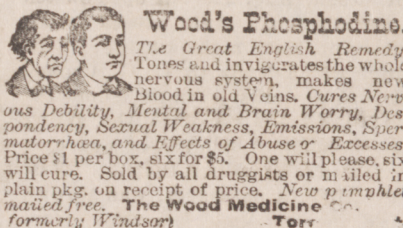

## INSURANCE COMMISSIONERS MEET

Milwaukee, Wis., Aug. 22—Present prospects indicate that the annual session of the national convention of insurance commissioners, which opened in this city today, will be a very profitable meeting. Commissioners, deputies and actuaries representing nearly every State in the Union are in attendance.

Proposed reforms in the conduct of industrial insurance companies will form the most important subject of discussion. Recent investigation, it is said, has developed the fact that some companies, taking advantage of the helplessness of their clients, who are mostly of the poorer class, compromised or adjusted claims, so that thousands of dollars, withheld from victims of accidents or from their widows, children, or dependents, went to increase dividends or surpluses of the companies.

Toronto, Aug. 22—Convocation Hall of the University of Toronto was crowded with members of the veterinary profession today when the forty-eighth annual meeting of the American Veterinary Medical Association was opened today.
