DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence. Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem. Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.

JOE JACKSON
PRESSES TY COBB
HARD FOR HONORSHonus Wagner Still Leads National
League—George Jackson Second
with Clarke Well Up

Instead of Lajoie being in close pursuit of Ty Cobb for the batting honors of the American League, it is now Joe Jackson, who on Saturday reached the .400 mark, 22 points behind the Tiger. Cobb returned to the game against the Red Sox after a layoff of five days, and his reliable bat stood him well, for he gained six points on the week's work. Jackson, however, had the most successful week since his entrance into the American League, making 16 hits in 28 times at bat.

Lajoie lost 5 points and dropped out of the .400 class. The great second baseman is, however, very much in the race.

Del Gainer of Detroit, got back into the game on Thursday after an absence of almost three months, with a broken arm. His two games last week cost him a loss of 23 points, as he failed to secure a safe hit in six times at bat.

Jimmy Callahan and Briscoe Lord, dropped out of the .300 class last week. Both have been slumping for weeks. Harry Lord, of the White Sox is also tumbling, losing 10 points last week. McIntyre of the same team, seems to be the most consistent sticker and last week he advanced his average 1 point.

All the regulars of the Athletics, with the exception of Eddie Collins, were unable to fathom the various offerings presented them, and as a result their averages took a downward turn. McInnis was the biggest loser making but 4 hits in 25 times at bat, causing him to drop 14 points, Baker suffered a loss of 8 points.

Meyers of the Giants, is another consistent performer with the club, and Frank Schulte of the Cubs, is getting in singles, doubles and triples as well as home runs. Schulte always could pound out home runs and a season has rarely passed when he has not made a good many. With 20 such hits to his credit and the league season still to run seven weeks, Buck Freeman's record is very likely to go by the board.

Marsans, the Reds' Cuban recruit, fell out of the .300 class last week, but his mate, Almeida, did not get a chance to bat and stays up. Sweeney's terrific hitting in Thursday's game with the Cubs gave him his average a boost and he now shows .306. Flaherty also is back among the .300 hitters, of which there are now 21 in the National League, against 20 a week ago. TennisGRAND CIRCUIT AT
GOSHEN THIS WEEK,
AT READVILLE NEXTGreat List of Entries for Readville—
The Eel the Big Feature at Goshen

Boston, Aug. 14—Boston has the Grand Circuit next week at Readville and the entry list which is made public today shows that the management of the two minute track has secured pretty near all of the trotters and pacers who have survived the severe tax of the training season and the campaign to date.

The meeting at this distance looks to be the best New England has had in recent years with fast and exciting contests.

The famous Massachusetts will have an old time field in size and quality among the eligibles being R.T.C., with three \$10,000 purses to his credit; Ankil, winner of the M. & M.; Argot Hal counted by many the crack green trotter of the year; Belvasia, the Massachusetts bred and owned star, and Stroller believed to be a sure comer in the 2:05 list, besides half a dozen others who have raced around 2:08.

The handicaps have filled well, the final closing bringing in several entries to each. The American Derby as the trotting handicap is called has an even score named, including the newest speed sensations, Soprano and Billy Burn along with Willy, who has raced in 2:04 this summer and Joan the Transylvania winner of a year ago who is fast reaching record-breaking form.

The pacing handicap will have the Canadian cracks, The Eel and Hal B. Jr. on scratch with The Able, Ess H Kay, Major Brimo, Ella Ambulator, Hal Akin, Twinkling Dan, Directum Regent and a dozen others in front of them.

THE GOSHEN MEETING

This week the grand circuit swings off its familiar line, Goshen, N. Y., with its historic half-mile track having the date. The name, however, is about all that savors of the grand circuit for the entry shows the names of few horses following the chain from Indianapolis on. Geers, Cox, McDevitt, Murphy, and McDonald have passed the meeting up, some of their horses racing at Columbus, but many of them will have an off week at Readville, which will provide more excitement than the local track generally has in midsummer.

The Little Orange county town is going to have an excellent meeting despite the fact that most of the head-line trainers have decided to keep away. It has been an excellent entry drawn very largely from the men who follow the two-lap tracks through the season. There are enough mile-track performers to add spice to the sport which is certain to be watched by very large crowds.

The meeting opens tomorrow with a free-for-all pace in which The Eel will tackle the half-milers, Major Mallow, Red Bow and Walter Hal. The gray Canadian has not been able to win on the big line and is apt to find the going tough here, although something of a twice around fellow himself. The other classes are the 2:20 and the 2:24 trots.

Wednesday the 2:12 trotters, 2:15 pacers and 2-year-old pacers parade. Thursday the 3-year-old trotters, 2:10 pacers and 2:17 trotters. Friday the 2:14 and 2:27 trotters and 2:18 pacers. Uhlman will be the special attraction of the meeting the wonderful son of Bingen starting on Thursday to lower the trotting record for a half-mile track. Last Saturday Tanner worked him a mile in 2:07 over it so he is expected to shade 2:05.
