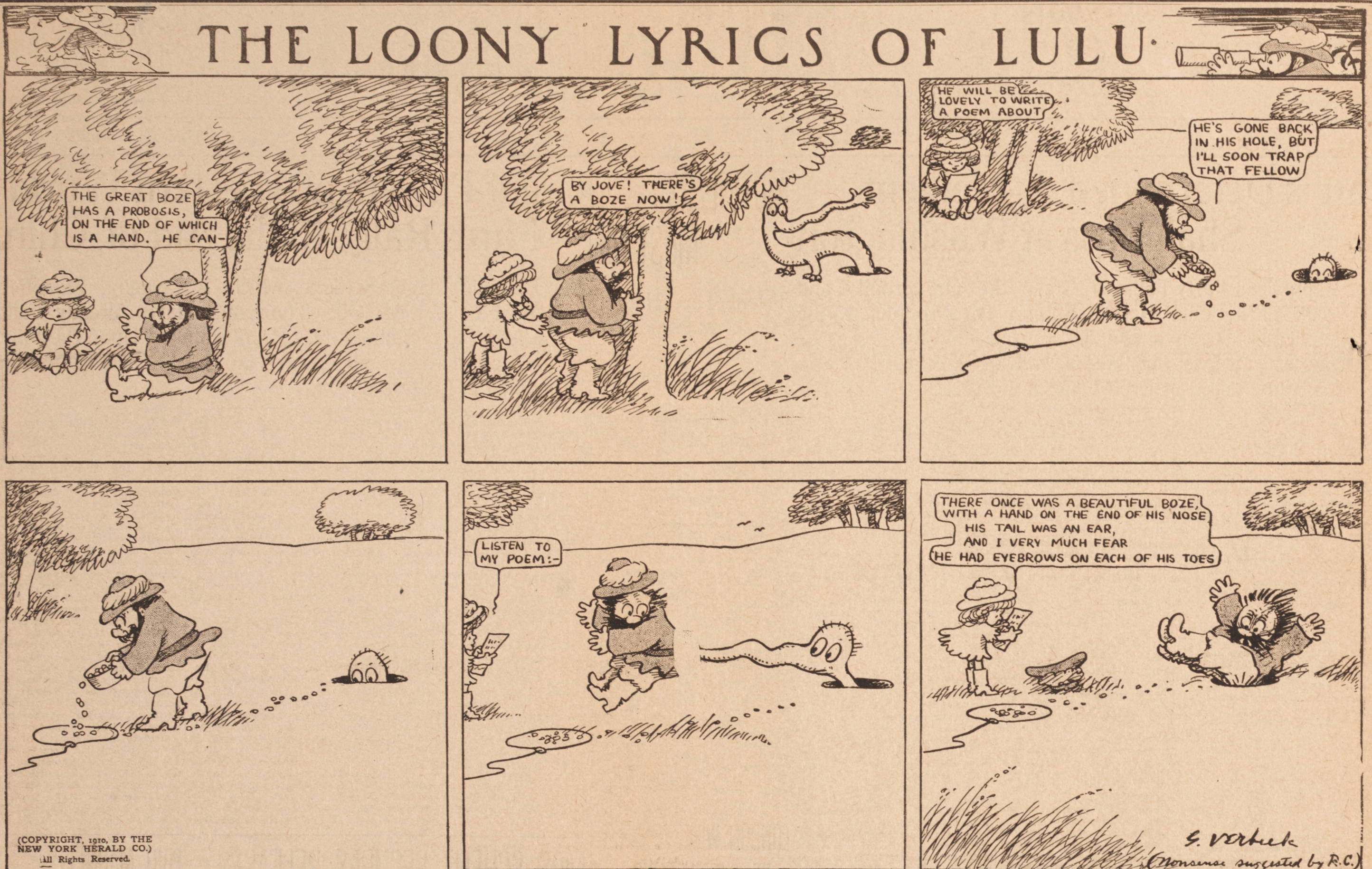

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WHAT CANADA CONCEDES

Schedule "D" consists of articles on which Canada makes reductions in duty but the United States does not make the same change.

The first figure is the rate of duty now proposed by Canada, and the second figure the reduction made by Canada.

Cement (Portland) per thousand pounds—11 cents, 1 cent.

Fruit trees of all kinds—2½ cents, 1 cent.

Condensed milk, the weight of a package to be included in the weight for duty—2 cents per lb., 1½ cents per lb.

Biscuits without added sweetening—20 per cent., 5 per cent.

Fruits in air-tight cans or other air-tight packages, weight of cans or packages to be included in weight for duty—2 cents per lb., 1 cent per lb.

Peanuts (shelled)—1 cent per pound 1 cent per pound.

Peanuts (unshelled)—1 cent per lb, 1½ cents per pound.

RECIPROCITY RESOLUTIONS

Ottawa, Jan. 26—Reciprocity resolutions to be proposed by Mr. Fielding in committee of ways and means: That it is expedient to amend the customs tariff, 1907, and to provide as follows:

1. That the articles, the growth, product or manufacture of the United States, specified in schedule A, shall be admitted into Canada, free of duty when imported from the United States.

2. That the articles, the growth, product or manufacture of the United States specified in schedules B and D, shall be admitted into Canada upon payment of the rates of duty specified in the said schedules when imported from the United States.
