## AVIATOR WAS USED IN HERDING CATTLE

Houston, Tex., Jan. 28.—Rene Simon, the aviator, known on two continents for his daring, has added new laurels to his record when for the first time in the history of aviation he demonstrated yesterday afternoon that herding cattle with aeroplanes was possible. Simon during the closing flight of the opening day left the aviation field and heading across the prairies, darted directly for a herd of cattle grazing half a mile away. Cow boys were just arriving preparatory to rounding up the animals when Simon descended and circling around the steers soon had them on a trot towards the aviation field. He drove them up to the fence separating the field from the prairie, and then started them off westward delivering them to the cowboys.

SALOON CLOSING IN WASHINGTON STATE

The result of all the recent voting in the State of Washington was that twenty-eight towns voted dry out of a total of forty-nine. Eleven of these had been wet before. On the other hand, six dry towns went back to license, the result being a net gain of three in the number of dry towns. The most remarkable fact in connection with the election, however, is that two first class cities, Everett and Bellingham, each with 30,000 people, both of them sea-port towns, voted "dry," abolishing, in Bellingham, 42 saloons, and in Everett 38. By reason of these elections, 112 saloons cease business from January 1, 1911.

PROMOTING TEMPERANCE WORK IN NEWFOUNDLAND

The Catholic Total Abstinence Society is a strong organization in St. John's, Newfoundland. A member of it, who is also an official of the City Medical Health Department, on a recent visit to Montreal, discussed the progress of the temperance cause in his own country. He said:

"Our total abstinence society numbers at present 900 members, including the juvenile body. In connection with the society we have two bands, a brass and life and drum. We own one of the largest and finest theatre halls in the city, and some vacant land, and the whole property is worth in the vicinity of \$120,000.

"In the city of St. John's we have 52 saloons, and only two in all the other villages and towns of the island, thus making a total of 54 saloons for a population of 250,000 people. In every place where Local Option has been tried it has been carried, and Newfoundland can boast of having 'dry' places, where liquor is never sold.

"We look for a still further reduction of the saloons in St. John's, as our people are prosperous and happy under temperance legislation. Our Protestant neighbors are with us in the cause of total abstinence, and at a recent celebration of the golden jubilee of our society, the Anglican Bishop of Newfoundland, the ministers of the Methodist and Presbyterian denominations, as well as the leader of the Salvation Army, gave the finest addresses and praised in the highest terms the great work of our society."

NEW CAMPAIGN IN CHICAGO  
Chicago has another anti-saloon campaign. Early in the past year, a monster petition to the election commissioner asked for a vote on the question of bar-room closing. There was general alarm among the liquor element over the prospect of a contest and finally the petition was declared invalid, and the movement fell through. Now it is proposed to circulate another petition, to secure the signatures of 85,000 registered voters and to have the question submitted early in the coming year.

## VETERAN RIVER CAPTAIN DEAD AT ST. JOHN

Dt. John, Jan. 27.—Mr. Charles W. Brannen died this morning, aged 80 years. He is survived by two sons, C. H. Brannen and George W. Brannen, of this city, and two daughters, Mrs. F. W. Tapley and Mrs. H. R. McLellan.

The deceased was a pioneer steam boat captain and was well known along the St. John river. He was at one time employed by the Union Line and commanded the steamer Antelope, which plied up the river. His last command was the steamer May Queen.

A CONVENTIONAL DESIGN  
The embroiderer who likes to evolve her own designs should try to try a new motif that is easily adapted to various forms of fancy work.

The figure is worked out with detached over petals arranged to form a horizontal ellipse. The figures alternate, the first formed of twelve petals and an inner row of dots opposite the point of each petal; the next of eight petals and eight dots. In each a petal is at either end and the others spaced equally between above and below. The base of the oval is a sharp point, each pointing to the centre.

Between each two of these figures on an upper row are slender leaves with points turned under and facing in opposite directions in the manner of a V, with the tops slanting downward. From the base of the V on either side is drawn a semi-circular line with four small petals on under side to represent leaves.

This motif is easily understood if drawn on paper. By varying the size of the petals and the spacing it is quickly adapted for use on towels, or a border to a petticoat or tunic, or a deep border to table covers and curtains.

The stitches can be easily varied as well. For all white effects for lingerie all the design save the satin-stitched V-shaped leaves and the stem of the semi-circles can be eyelet work, or the dots can be solid and the petals and foliage eyelet. Again the entire V-shaped motif can be solid and the ellipse in eyelets.

For curtains and table covers the whole design can be developed in satin stitch, variety being given by shading or combination of color. If the petals are made very large, as for curtains, they can be outlined on the edge and filled in with honeycomb, smit or other fancy stitch, in a lighter or contrasting shade.

In making the design, measure accurately before blocking out the pattern so the figures are certain to come evenly to the square.
