## MARYSVILLE AND FREDERICTON FAILED TO BREAK TIE IN OVERTIME

Referee Staples Collided with Fred McLean and was Knocked Out in Third Overtime Period---Game Stopped Teams Failing to Agree on New Referee---Score 2 to 2---Marysville Aggressive Throughout Game---Fredericton's Defence Strong.

Fredericton, 2; Marysville, 2.

That was the result of last night's N. B. H. L. fixture here, the second game between Fredericton and the Marysville Crescents. The game was characterized by the fast skating of the Marysville forwards and their almost continual attack on the Fredericton net and the magnificent work of the Fredericton defence, particularly "Tart" Titus, the goal keeper.

Thirteen and a half minutes of overtime was played in an attempt to break the tie but without success. Both teams were gradually getting fagged out, with Marysville showing the better condition, when the game ended in a most peculiar fashion, the referee, Mr. Sandy Staples, being unintentionally knocked out by one of the Fredericton forwards. Fred McLean, the Fredericton rover, collided with the referee almost in front of the timers' box, knocking him against the side and severely injuring him about the body. The referee fell to the ice and was carried to a dressing room, where he was revived. He was able to get on the ice again but was not able to continue as referee. A dispute ensued, Fredericton wishing to declare the game a tie and replay it at some future date, Marysville demanding that it be played out once. Fredericton balked on the question of referee.

Manager Stevenson of the Crescents offered to play the game with Leonard Inch of Marysville and J. D. Black of Fredericton acting under the double referee system. Mr. Black declined to act, however and Fredericton would not play with Inch as re-

It was finally arranged to replay the game at some future date.

### INTERESTING GAME

The game was one of the most interesting ever played in Fredericton, and the excitement was great. There was a big bunch of Marysville rooters, who did some loud cheering when Marysville took the lead, almost at the first of the game and showed up well all through. The strength showed by Marysville was rather a surprise. On the other hand Fredericton's showing was disappointing. The forwards were away off color, not playing together as they did against U. N. B., and displaying lack of condition. At times they displayed flashes of individual play.

McLean was aggressive at all times. All through the game, however, the forwards played below their usual standard.

### FREDERICTON DEFENCE STRONG

The work of the Red and White defence was the redeeming feature of the Fredericton team's play. In fact, if

the three defence men had not played as they did Marysville would have won by a big score. However, defence men are for the very purpose of keeping scores down.

"Tart" Titus was the star of the evening. Hockey fans thought they had seen all that he had to offer in the way of goal tending, but last night he proved that he proved that he had a few new ones in his repertoire.

Marysville's first goal was the direct result of lack of judgment on the part of Walker of the Fredericton point, who passed the rubber from behind his own net to Bird, who scored.

"Axhell" redeemed himself, however, by his checking, and his rushes. Every Marysville man whom Walker bodied knew it. He also carried the puck well.

Archie Babbitt at cover point was as reliable as ever. One of Fredericton's goals was scored on a pass from him after he had carried the puck up the ice. He also checked hard.

### MARYSVILLE'S STRENGTH

Marysville's strength lay in the ability of the forwards to outskate Fredericton and to stand the gruelling pace better. As far as shooting was concerned the Red and Blue forwards were away off. The two wings, Dennison and Hovey, were continually offside. Hovey was penalized for this, but Dennison escaped.

Other Marysville men played and loafed offside whenever opportunity offered.

Wade and Brogan were prominent throughout the game with their rushes down the ice and the assistance they gave their forwards. In goal Fullerton played his usual game. Marysville's forwards went back to help out their defence, a thing that the Fredericton forwards seldom did. Robertson and Bird were the best of the Crescents' forwards.

When the teams meet to play the game again there should be a record crowd in attendance.

### THE GAME

From the face off play went to the Fredericton and where it stayed, Fredericton being unable to relieve the pressure for a couple of minutes. Babbitt finally took the puck down. It came back and Hovey shot only to have Titus save. Marysville kept the play at the Fredericton end. There was a face-off right in front of the net but Fredericton took it away. Titus scored again and again Fredericton could not get going. Duncan finally got away with the rubber. It came back however. Walker passed out from behind his own net direct to Bird, who shot scoring in 9 minutes.

### MARYSVILLE 2, FREDERICTON 0

Robertson came back and scored in 2 minutes. Babbitt rushed but the rubber came back.

Walker did the same. The Fredericton forwards failed to get together however and the Red and White defence had its hands full.

Referee Staples was letting Dennison and Hovey get away with a lot of offside loafing. He caught Galloway tripping and gave him 2 minutes with the timers.

### FREDERICTON SCORES

A man short, Fredericton was hard pressed. Robertson was cautioned for tripping.

Play stayed at the locals' end. The Fredericton forwards finally got away with the rubber, but Marysville brought it back. At this point Archie Babbitt started one of the best plays of the evening, which netted Fredericton's first goal off Galloway's stick.

Babbitt went down the ice right afterward but shot wide. Fullerton stopped a hot one immediately afterward. Play stayed at the Marysville end for a time. Walker's rushes became continuous and he checked hard.

Hovey got three minutes for offside loading which was an offence Marysville was adept at. Walker tripped Brogan and was penalized 3 minutes.

The half ended with each team playing six men and the score 2 to 1 in Marysville's favor.

### THE SCORE TIED

The score was tied mainly through Babbitt, who pulled off the best play of the game running through the whole Marysville team with the puck. He lost the rubber near the Marysville net but recovered it and Duncan scored on his pass to centre ice. After the face-off "Axhell" Walker distinguished himself by making a long rush hurling sticks. Dennison was guilty of some flagrant offside play. The puck went from end to end, Robertson got several shots in but all were wide. Marysville made a determined attack on the Fredericton net but Titus was ready and blocked all shots. On one occasion the Marysville supporters yelled for a goal, but the goal-judge did not signal. Until the end of the game play stayed at the Fredericton end.

### OVERTIME.

It was decided to play five-minute periods of overtime until the tie was broken. McLean carried the puck down but Brogan prevented him from shooting skating him into the side. Shortly afterward Titus got another chance to save a goal. McLean was caught tripping and was sent off for three minutes when his team needed him most. Play had hardly recommenced before Walker got the same dose. Fredericton playing five men to Marysville's seven beat off the attack. Robertson took up the fashion and tripped a Fredericton forward, with the result that he went off for three minutes, evening matters a little. All players were back on the ice when the first period ended with the score still 2 to 2.

The second period opened with Marysville rushing matters. Brogan tried to rush but was checked hard by Babbitt. Walker relieved with a rush up the ice.

The third period began with the players showing signs of playing out. Fredericton's forwards were in the worse shape, however. Three and a half minutes of the period had been played when Referee Staples was knocked out and the game ended.
