



## WHEN TORIES SIGNED AN ANNEXATION MANIFESTO

"When I hear the Conservatives, not only in this province but through out the dominion raising the loyalty cry I cannot help contrasting the condition of affairs which exists today with those which existed years ago when the leading Conservatives of the day signed that famous manifesto demanding of the mother country reciprocity with the United States and threatening annexation.

"That same manifesto which was sent over to England and was signed right in the loyalist city of St. John by all the then prominent Conservatives of the day.

"It may sound like ancient history" remarked the Senator, "but it was only sixty-two years ago. It was a business proposition then and not a question of loyalty. Matters reached such a state, in fact, that England, in order to arrange matters satisfactorily, asked Lord Elgin to negotiate a treaty for the Canadian provinces. The reciprocity treaty of 1854 followed and, strange to say, reciprocity, which today Conservatives fear will bring about annexation, resulted then in burying the annexation cry."

## A STATESMANLIKE APPEAL

"To you my fellow-countrymen of New Brunswick, I now appeal. The issue is in the hands of the Canadian people. Let New Brunswick do as she did last time; let Quebec do the same—and she will do it let me tell you—(applause), let Ontario do as she did—and I hear she will do better—(loud applause)—and within three months the great boon of reciprocity will be ours. I appeal to you to support a policy of moderation and conciliation in developing a united Canadian nationhood. I appeal to you against the unholy alliance of the Nationalists in Quebec and the jingoes in the other Provinces. In my own Province I am branded by the trumpets and organs of Bourassa and his allies as a traitor to the French race. In other Provinces I am denounced by the jingoes as a traitor to the Empire. What I have sought to be is a true Canadian and true British subject. I have kept the double connection before me throughout the whole of my public service. It has been to me my cloud by day and my pillar of fire by night. I have followed its leading earnestly faithfully, and I hope, may I believe, with happy results to the four times you have summoned that aim by your votes, and I depend upon you, I am sure, as sure as I am of the verdict of my own Province of Quebec for the renewal of that policy on September 11." ## NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D.C. Sept. 2.—President Taft in the intervals between his games of golf and other outdoor amusements at Beverly, is expected to put in more or less time blocking out his speeches on the tariff, currency reform, reciprocity and other subjects on which he will speak on his coming western trip.

The political campaign in Canada will be carried on vigorously during the week. Sir Wilfrid Laurier will continue his speech making tour in support of reciprocity, in Ontario, with meetings in Windsor, Stratford, Sudbury and other places. Mr. Borden the Opposition leader will carry his campaign into the Maritime Provinces.

The week will see the opening of the big Government day in the Ohio River at Fernbank, near Cincinnati, the largest movable wicket dam in the world and the only one made entirely of concrete and steel. The completion of the dam marks one of the most important steps in the plan to make the entire Ohio River navigable the year round.

The cities and towns of Ohio will hold their first primary elections next Tuesday under the new Kimball corrupt practices act. The new law provides for the widest publicity in the matter of campaign expenses. The penalty for the violation of any of its provisions is forfeiture of office, in addition to fine or imprisonment.

The New York Legislature will convene Wednesday to take up the matter of the proposed new charter for the City of New York.

Thursday is the day set for the Democratic primaries in Virginia, the result of which is expected to determine the two United States senators. Senators Martin and Swanson are candidates for re-election and are opposed by Representatives Glass and Jones.

Governor Harmon is to speak at a Democratic barbecue to be held in Boston Saturday. The event will be of interest to political circles as the speech will be the first that the Ohio governor has delivered in the East since his name became prominently mentioned in connection with the presidential nomination.

The important gatherings of the week will include the conventions of the National Farmers' Union at Shawnee, Okla.; The United Typothetae of America, at Denver; the National Association of Letter Carriers at Rochester; the National Association of Postoffice Clerks, at Jacksonville, Fla.; The International Photo-Engravers' Union at Detroit; the Ohio River Improvement Association, at Cincinnati; the American Institute of Banking, at Rochester and the International Tax Conference, at Richmond, Va.

### DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence.

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem. Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.

Further information can be obtained on application to the Secretary, Department of Naval Service, Ottawa.

"Under the Conservative regime people were flying from Canada as from a plague-stricken country. That 1891 census—and he reiterated the gravest doubts that the records were truly kept—showed an increase of only 30 souls in New Brunswick, and of but 1-5 of 1 per cent. in Nova Scotia.
