MONTREAL TORIES ENDORSE RECIPROCITY

(From the Gazette, of 11th February 1891)

"A large and influential meeting of leading business men was held yesterday afternoon in the Temple building. Hon. Mr. Drummond occupied the chair, and among the many present were Messrs A. W. Morris, Sadler, E. K. Greene, Samuel Finlay, D. A. McCaskill, H. R. Ives, R. W. Elmenhorst, A. Beaumgarten, R. Forsyth, J. S. Hall, M.D.A.; John C. Watson, R. Gardner-Beattie, of the Dominion Oil Cloth Company; Sclater Wm. Johnson, H. A. Budden, C. Martin, Senator Murphy, S. E. Dawson, H. M. Allan, Frank Paul, J. R. Cowans, Robert Mitchell, A. F. Gault, J. Worthington, Richard White, W. McMaster and others.

"Letters were read from Messrs W. W. Ogilvie, James Crother and others, expressing regret at not being able to be present and their thorough sympathy with the objects of the meeting.

"The following resolution moved by Mr. A. F. Gault, seconded by Mr. H. M. Allan was unanimously adopted: 'Earnestly desiring a fair and wide measure of reciprocal trade with the United States, as proposed by the government of Sir John Macdonald, we shall at all times give our support to such a policy.'

TERMS OF THE AGREEMENT

"The government of the two countries having made this agreement from the conviction that, if confirmed by the necessary legislative authorities, it will benefit the peoples on both sides of the border line, we may reasonably hope and expect that the arrangement, if so confirmed, will remain in operation for a considerable period. Only this expectation on the part of both Governments would justify the time and labor that have been employed in the maturing of the proposed measure. Nevertheless, IT IS DISTINCTLY UNDERSTOOD THAT WE DO NOT ATTEMPT TO BIND FOR THE FUTURE THE ACTION OF THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS OR THE PARLIAMENT OF CANADA, BUT THAT EACH OF THOSE AUTHORITIES SHALL BE ABSOLUTELY FREE TO MAKE ANY CHANGE OF TARIFF OR OF ANY OTHER MATTER COVERED BY THE PRESENT ARRANGEMENT THAT MAY BE DEEMED EXPEDIENT. We look for the continuance of the arrangement, not because either party is bound to it, but because of our conviction that the more liberal trade policy thus to be established will be viewed by the people of the United States and Canada as one which will strengthen the friendly relations now happily prevailing and promote the commercial interests of both countries."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
