SEVERAL LARGE DONATIONS MADE TO VICTORIA HOSPITAL

Regular Monthly Meeting of Trustees Held Yesterday--Large Expenditure Made on Improvements

The holiday somewhat affected the attendance at the meeting of the hospital trustees. After some delay business was started with Warden Rogers holding the gavel. Several matters of importance were considered. Among those in attendance, in addition to the warden, were Mr. Sterling, Mr. Moore and the Secretary Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

The financial statement, submitted by the treasurer, showed a large expenditure in August and this officer submitted a complete statement of the expenditure connected with the enlargement of the Dow Wing.

MATRON'S REPORT.

From the report of the matron it was shown that thirty-two patients were discharged cured and two died. Many donations were received by the matron and these included generous supplies of ice cream from Ward Rogers and F. Vanwart and bread, cake and pies from the Women's Aid of St. Paul's Church. The secretary treasurer reported on the result of the recent examination of probationary students for training, and the report of Dr. Atherton upon one of the young ladies who has just completed her probation.

NORMAL SCHOOL OPENS WITH RECORD ATTENDANCE

Enrollment Shows Total of 329--Manual Training Students yet to Come--One Change in Faculty

The Provincial Normal School opened this morning for the academic year 1911-12 with the largest enrollment of students in the history of the institution. The number of students who will take the ordinary course is 308. In addition there are 21 students taking the French course making the total enrollment 329. That number will be further increased by those who will take the course in Manual Training. That course will not begin until next week.

The classification of the students is as follows:--Class I, 64; Class II, 179; Class III, 65; French Department, 21. Last year the enrollment on the opening day was 319 less than this year.

Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, principal of the Normal School, and the other members of the faculty were busy this morning arranging the classes. This year but one change has taken place in the faculty. Mr. T. B. Kidner resigning the position of instructor in Manual Training and being succeeded by Mr. F. Peacock.

The trains and steamers which arrived here yesterday all brought their contingents of intending Normal Students and the presence of the latter in the city is already noticeable.

HEAVY SALMON RUN.

STREAM DRIVER ROBBED OF ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS

Local Man Arrested on Suspicion of Committing Crime--Says Money he had was Given Him

A man named Brewer who recently came off the Corporation Drive complained to the police yesterday that he had been robbed of upwards of one hundred dollars. The robbery he said had been committed late Friday night while he and a number of companions had been on the veranda of the B. & B. Club House in a state of intoxication. Brewer was not able to give any details of how the robbery was accomplished.

The police later in the day arrested John Beatty of this city on suspicion of robbing Brewer. He was taken before Police Magistrate Marsh and remanded until tomorrow to enable evidence in the case to be collected.

The money which Brewer states was stolen from him was found on the prisoner when the arrest was made. The prisoner informed the police however, that he had had money but that it had been given him by a friend and afterwards stolen from him.

The police did not put much faith in the prisoner's story but are investigating.

ADMINISTRATORS NAMED IN JOHN GIBSON ESTATE

Letters of administration in the estate of the late John Gibson were granted on Saturday. The administrators appointed are Messrs. Arthur H. Gibson and Fred H. Gibson, sons of the deceased.

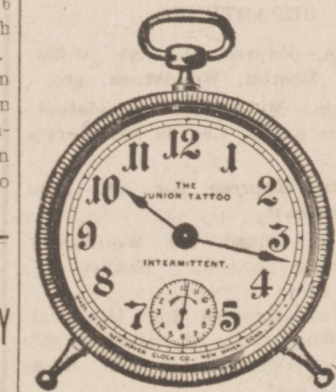
The estate has been sworn at \$41,000 of which amount \$25,000 is real property and \$16,000 personal property. The real estate is composed largely of lumber lands in this county, situated on the branches of the Nashwaak River. The personal property includes that portion of the stock-in-trade of John Gibson & Son which was owned by the deceased and an interest in the schooner Arthur M. Gibson. There is also real property in Marysville and Fredericton. Gregory & Winslow acted in the matter on behalf of the heirs.

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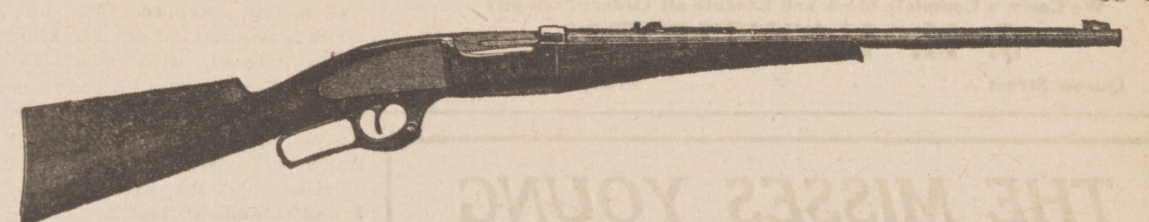
