

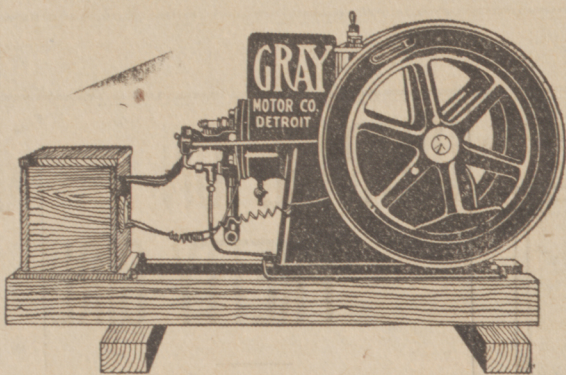

## MAINE FARMERS DON'T WANT RECIPROCITY

Former Sunbury County Man Writes of  
Conditions in Aroostook County

(St. John Telegraph)

Two or three years ago George Seely, one of the most progressive farmers of Blissville, Sunbury County tempted by the success of his brother James C., who was engaged in farming at Presque Isle, Mr. Seely sold his large farm at Blissville and bought a large property on the other side of the line. A third brother remained at Blissville and has one of the best farms in the county. This brother, David M. Seely, has heard lately the argument of the opposition speakers that the farmers of Maine have a poor market and that the Maine farms are not valued as high as farms of New Brunswick. To get first-hand information he wrote to his brothers, and James C. Seely, who has resided in Maine for a great many years and has no interest in Canadian politics, answered the letter in which he gives such a crushing reply to the Conservative fallacies that any further comment seems unnecessary. It is sufficient to read the letter. Here it is, published by the permission of Mr. Seely:

"George handed me your letter to-day and wanted me to answer it for him. Perhaps I cannot answer it as well as he could, but I can tell you how I think reciprocity will affect you folks on that side.

"I THINK YOUR FARMS WILL INCREASE IN VALUE RIGHT AWAY AT LEAST FIFTEEN PER CENT. AND ON THIS SIDE OUR FARMS WILL INCREASE AS MUCH OR MORE, FOR THE LAST FIVE YEARS YOU COULD NOT BUY A GOOD FARM HERE IN A GOOD LOCATION FOR LESS THAN \$100 AN ACRE, AND SOME, NEAR A GOOD MARKET, HAVE BROUGHT AS HIGH AS \$125 AN ACRE."

"Everything is booming here now. Potatoes since the first of August have sold at \$1.65 to \$2 a barrel and yield 65 to 100 barrels to the acre. Oats are yielding 50 to 65 bushels, and bring 40 to 50 cents a bushel. Pork dressed, brings ten cents a pound, and beef nine cents. For hay we get \$12 at our barns, and \$3.50 for oat straw. Chickens bring 25 cents a pound, or about \$2 a pair, and eggs range from 25 to 30 cents a dozen.

"Good milk cows are worth from \$45 to \$100, and horses which make good drivers bring \$200 to \$400. Draft horses weighing from 1,300 to 1,800 pounds are worth from \$200 to \$500, and lots of double teams are sold here for \$500.

"The people up here are very much opposed to reciprocity, and I think it will be a great thing for your country, but as for me I hope to heaven it does not pass."

This is what one of the wealthy farmers of the Aroostook says about the prices of farm products and the value of farm lands in Maine. Whoever hears of a 300 acre farm in New Brunswick being worth \$30,000?

## N.R. KING'S WORK FOR LABOR MEN

Berlin, Ont. Sept. 3.—Mr. D. Campbell, Third Vice-President of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers, addressing the joint meeting here on Saturday night said in part:—"I want to say that I am a Canadian citizen, the Canadian officer of our organization, and that I am here of my own volition, because the newspapers have made certain statements in regard to what has been said about the Minister of Labor, and in so far as I am concerned as a representative of labor men I feel that those statements mean one of two things: an invitation to come here and speak at this meeting if the Minister of Labor had done what was square and right with the labor people of this country, and if he had not it was a challenge to us to come here and say so. I have come here as I say, of my own volition, with the consent of the President of our organization. My reason for coming was because I did not believe that it was the proper thing to have misrepresentations in this constituency against the Minister of Labor. I have been familiar with the Minister of Labor with his conduct for the last eight or ten years. I have gone to him many times as a representative of labor for a square deal; that is all labor has ever asked, that is all there is to ask for and I have never yet failed to have a square deal from Mr. W. L. Mackenzie King. (Applause) In view of that fact I would be either an ingrate or a coward if I did not come here and I am neither, for I heard the minister of Labor has been criticized very severely. And I want to say to you now that so far as I am concerned I have not one bit of interest in either of the political parties of the country today I am a member of the Independent Labor party, if you please. (Applause)

"All that Mr. Murdoch has said," continued Mr. Campbell, "is also true." Mr. Berry (also one of the labor leaders) he stated, could not come, but he sent word that he heartily endorsed Mr. King.

In conclusion Mr. Campbell stated to the labor men of the constituency that they had a duty to perform to Mr. King. "Mr. King has always given labor a square deal and it is your duty to support him. It remains to the labor men of North Waterloo to support Mr. King, to return him to Ottawa, that he may continue his work for the labor men of Canada. (Applause)

## DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence.

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem. Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.

Further information can be obtained on application to the Secretary, Department of Naval Service, Ottawa.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eight years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
